## SECTION I (C) SIGNIFICANT ORGANIZATION AND UNIT ACTIVITIES (U)

1. (U) PURPOSE: In accordance with para 12a (1) (b), AR 1-19, this report covers the significant activities of activation and deployment of Company D, 58th Infantry during the period 1 June 1966 to 31 October 1966 and the 127th Military Police Company during the period 1 August 1966 to 31 October 1966. In addition, this report covers significant activities of all units assigned to the 93rd Military Police Battalion during the required period of 1 November 1966 to 31 January 1967.

2. (U) PERIOD OF 1 JUNE 1966 TO 31 OCTOBER 1966: Company D, 58th Infantry was activated on 1 June 1966 at Fort Lewis, Washington. Assignment of the majority of personnel occurred on 10 June 1966. Basic Unit Training was initiated on 18 June and continued until 18 August 1966.

Originally the unit received an equipment readiness date of 20 August and personnel readiness date of 5 September 1966. On 18 August the unit was extended for a period of sixty days by the Sixth Army Commander. This extension was initiated due to the lack of authorized equipment and additional training required. A five (5) week Advanced Unit Training cycle was conducted during this extension period and the unit went from 50% of all authorized equipment on hand to 90% on hand. Equipment readiness date was extended to 20 October 1966 with personnel readiness date to 5 November 1966. POM leaves were granted from 18 October to 5 November 1966.

During the period of 1 June 1966 to 31 October 1966 the unit participated in seventy-one (71) training days, zero days of operation and zero days of movement. All other days were devoted to administrative details and leaves. Training consisted of five (5) weeks Basic Unit Training, 16 hours of CONARC required subjects and five (5) weeks of Advanced Unit training.

3. (U) PERIOD OF 1 AUGUST 1966 to 31 OCTOBER 1966: The 127th Military Police Company was activated on 1 August 1966 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Assignment of the majority of the lower grade personnel occurred on 13 August 1966. POM training was initiated on 28 September 1966 and continued until 29 October 1966. POM leaves were granted from 29 October to 28 November 1966.

Originally the unit was alerted to deploy on 22 December 1966. On 17 November 1966 the unit movement date was accelerated from 22 December to 2 December 1966. On 23 November 1966 the unit received a port call of 11 December 1966. Training was curtailed from an original six (6) week schedule to five (5) weeks. POM leaves were not affected.

During the period of 1 August 1966 to 31 October 1966, the unit participated in thirty-three (33) training days, zero days operation, and zero days movement. All other days were devoted to administrative details. Training consisted of POM requirements, subjects recommended by the 503rd Military Police Battalion, Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and the Unit Commander.

Preparation and training necessitated hand receipting TOE property from the 503rd Military Police Battalion, Fort Bragg, North Carolina. An Organizational Readiness Test (ORT) was used to test the unit readiness for overseas shipment and was conducted from 24-29 November 1966. The overall rating for the ORT was satisfactory.

4. (C) PERIOD OF 1 NOVEMBER 1966 to 31 JANUARY 1967:

a. (C) Preparation and Movement (Company D, 58th Infantry):  
From 1-3 November 1966 the unit packed its vehicles, Red TAT and general cargo. Equipment was delivered to the docks minus the Yellow Disk TAT.

(1) The advanced party of one Officer, two NCO's, and five enlisted men departed for RVN via air on 15 November 1966. The main body had previously departed by ship (USNS BUCKNER) from Port of Tacoma, Washington, on 9 November 1966 for a 20 day uneventful voyage to RVN.

(2) From 16 November 1966 until 27 November 1966 the advance party received their initial briefing and set about preparing the company area with items on hand. Their main effort was concentrated on a two-story billet for the troops.

b. (C) Arrival in Republic of Vietnam (Company D, 58th Infantry):  
On 27 November 1966 the main body arrived in Qui Nhon harbor, off-loaded and transported to Valley F. Red Circle TAT was off-loaded on 27 November 1966. On 2 December 1966 the bulk shipment of equipment arrived in Qui Nhon harbor.

(1) On 3 December 1966 the unit became operational by assuming the mission of securing the Ammunition Supply Depot, Qui Nhon. Originally the target date had been set for 10 December 1966 but the tactical situation required earlier employment.

(2) On 31 December 1966 the unit was given an additional mission of employing one platoon to secure four (4) bridges located on the MSR out of Qui Nhon. An additional squad was attached to the 66th Military Police Company and assumed the mission of gate guards at the 58th Quartermaster Supply Depot.

(3) During the quarter 1 November 1966 to 31 January 1967 the unit participated in 19 days movement and 58 days of operation. All other days were devoted to administrative details and leave.

c. (U) Preparation and Movement (127th Military Police Company): The unit started packing and crating equipment on 30 October 1966 with an equipment readiness date of 16 November 1966. On 16 November 1966, the TOE equipment, less Yellow and Red Disk TAT equipment, departed Fort Bragg, North Carolina for Port of Oakland, California. On 25 November 1966 the Red TAT equipment departed Fort Bragg, North Carolina for Oakland, California.

(1) The main body of three (3) officers and 155 enlisted men departed Fort Bragg, North Carolina on 11 December via air for Oakland, California and on 12 December 1966 via ship (USNS UPBHUR) for a twenty-seven (27) day voyage to RVN. The advance party of one (1) officer and four (4) enlisted men departed for RVN via air on 18 December 1966.

(2) From 21 December 1966 until 6 January 1967 the advance party received their initial briefings and started work on the unit area in preparation for the arrival of the main body.

d. (C) Arrival in Republic of Vietnam (127th Military Police Company): On January 7, 1967 the main body arrived in Qui Nhon harbor, off-loaded and was transported to the unit area. Red Circle TAT equipment was off-loaded on 7 January 1967 at Qui Nhon. On 16 January 1967 the bulk shipment of equipment arrived and was off-loaded.

(1) Immediately upon arriving in the unit area, improvement of the area began. On 11 January 1967 three (3) military police desk teams, consisting of three (3) members per team, began on-the-job training in the Qui Nhon Military Police Station with 504th Military Police Battalion personnel. On 19 January 1967 sixteen (16) military policemen began on-the-job training with personnel from the 504th Military Police Battalion performing the mission of discipline, law, and order in Qui Nhon city.

(2) On 28 January 1967 the unit assumed the mission of discipline, law, and order in Qui Nhon, relieving the 504th Military Police Battalion of this mission.

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SECTION II (C)  
COMMANDERS OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS (U)

PART I (C) OBSERVATIONS (Lessons Learned) (U)

1. (FOUO) PERSONNEL

ITEM: Activation of Unit

DISCUSSION: The 127th Military Police Company was activated on 1 August 1966. Most officers and non-commissioned officers did not arrive until approximately 1 September 1966, which delayed unit training and preparation for overseas deployment. This problem was solved to a certain extent by the 503rd Military Police Battalion attaching some of their key personnel to the unit.

OBSERVATION: Key personnel were not alerted, assigned, and present for duty on or prior to arrival date of bulk of troops.

ITEM: Personnel Assignments

DISCUSSION: At the time of activation of the 127th Military Police Company and Company D, 58th Infantry, all TOE personnel positions were to be filled by the Department of the Army. In eight (8) instances, positions were never filled in the 127th Military Police Company. These vacancies included such key personnel as Supply Sergeant and Supply Clerk. In five (5) instances, positions were never filled in Company D, 58th Infantry. These vacancies included such key personnel as Platoon Sergeants, Supply Sergeant, and Radio Mechanic. To alleviate this problem key personnel were utilized in double duty.

OBSERVATION: All key personnel positions for units deploying to Vietnam should be filled on the date of activation.

2. (C) INTELLIGENCE

ITEM: Maps of Vietnam

DISCUSSION: Company D, 58th Infantry, did not receive their basic load of maps until just prior to embarkation and they had to be immediately packed for shipment. The basic load of maps issued to them by G-2, Fort Lewis, Washington were of the Saigon area and were not of Qui Nhon area where the unit ultimately deployed. A minimum number of maps of Qui Nhon area were issued to them upon arrival in country and until appropriate maps could be issued.

OBSERVATION: Deploying units to Vietnam should be informed of the general area where they will employ in order to insure that proper maps are issued to them.

3. (FOUO) LOGISTICS

ITEM: Establishment of Equipment Due Date of FOM Units

DISCUSSION: Both the 127th Military Police Company and Company D, 58th Infantry, experienced difficulty in receiving TOE authorized equipment. In the case of the 127th Military Police Company, local policy at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, provided for lateral transfer of TOE equipment which had been ordered but not received. However, this policy dictated that equipment would not be transferred prior to four (4) days before ERD. This resulted in additional workload on the deploying unit in drawing and packing the equipment for shipment. This additional workload was solved due to the fine co-operation of the host unit, 503rd Military Police Battalion. In the case of Company D, 58th Infantry, they did not receive their authorized TOE equipment until an inspection was made by the Sixth Army Commander at which time the unit was extended 60 days until the equipment arrived.

OBSERVATION: TOE authorized equipment was not available for training, proper marking, and packing for overseas shipment.

ITEM: Issuance of WABTOC Package

DISCUSSION: When the 127th Military Police Company departed Fort Bragg, North Carolina, it was assured that its WABTOC package would be waiting at the port to be loaded with the unit's Red TAT equipment. The unit was informed by Port Authorities that they were two weeks behind in shipments, and consequently the unit deployed without the WABTOC package. On 23 January 1967 the unit received a letter stating that the WABTOC package had been shipped with the following shortages: water cooler, ice chest, (400lbs), refrigerator, (70 cu ft), generator, (10 kw), jug, (5 gal cooler). The missing WABTOC items are some of the most important to a unit stationed in RVN. The unit has solved the problem by borrowing and hand receipting generators and other essential items of equipment authorized in the WABTOC package.

OBSERVATION: That WABTOC items be shipped with Red TAT equipment and that the package be shipped complete.

ITEM: Maintenance of Vehicles

DISCUSSION: On 30 August 1966 the 93rd Military Police Battalion Headquarters debarked in Qui Nhon. Approximately seven (7) days later it received assignment of its first company, the 66th Military Police Company, TOE 19-247E. Neither the Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment nor the 66th Military Police Company are authorized maintenance personnel and equipment. On 27 November 1966, Company D, 58th Infantry TOE 7-16L, arrived in Qui Nhon and was assigned to the Battalion on

1 December 1966. This unit also was not authorized maintenance personnel or equipment. It was not until the arrival of the 127th Military Police Company, TOE 19-37F, on 7 January 1967, that this battalion had any maintenance capability. During this four month period, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment had to depend upon assistance given by another unit stationed in the same cantonment area. With the assignment of Company D, 58th Infantry, the same unit assisted them in maintenance whenever possible. The 66th Military Police Company had to depend on the 504th Military Police Battalion for maintenance assistance.

OBSERVATION: When organizing military police battalions, a critical look should be given to authorizations to insure that a maintenance capability exists somewhere within the battalion. Satelliting military police units on other organizations for maintenance is seldom a satisfactory arrangement.

PART II (FOUO) RECOMMENDATIONS (U)

1. (FOUO) PERSONNEL: A problem area of major significance is the deployment of units without certain key personnel. Two companies in the battalion had to organize, requisition equipment, receipt equipment and ship without a supply sergeant. Aggressive personnel action should be taken by responsible agencies to insure that critical personnel shortages in deployable units are filled as soon as possible upon activation.

2. (FOUO) LOGISTICS: Of equal significant importance is the lack of maintenance personnel and maintenance equipment in this battalion. Maintenance should be given as much attention as billeting, feeding, and paying the personnel assigned to the battalion. Maintenance personnel and equipment should be authorized in a Military Police Battalion Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment in all US Army Military Police Battalions.

1. (U) The Operational Report for Quarterly Period Ending 31 January 1967 of the 93d Military Police Battalion is forwarded herewith.

2. (FOUO) This headquarters has reviewed the report, considers it adequate, concurs with the observations and recommendations and adds the following comments:

a. (FOUO) Reference Section II, Part I, paragraph 1, Item: Personnel Assignments: The 127th Military Police Company has retrained a military policeman, MOS 95B, as supply sergeant and awarded him MOS 76K40. That unit is not authorized a supply clerk; however, an armorer, MOS 76K30, is now assigned to the company. Company D, 58th Infantry, is still short three platoon sergeants and a radio mechanic, all of whom are on requisition. Company D has also qualified a unit supply sergeant through on-the-job training and awarded him MOS 76K40.

b. (FOUO) Reference Section II, Part I, paragraph 3, Item: Maintenance of Vehicles, and Section II, Part II, paragraph 2: An organic maintenance capability should be inherent in the organization of a Military Police Battalion Headquarters. MTOEs have been submitted in an effort to rectify this inadequacy. The battalion presently operates a consolidated motor pool, primarily utilizing the personnel and equipment of the 127th Military Police Company.
