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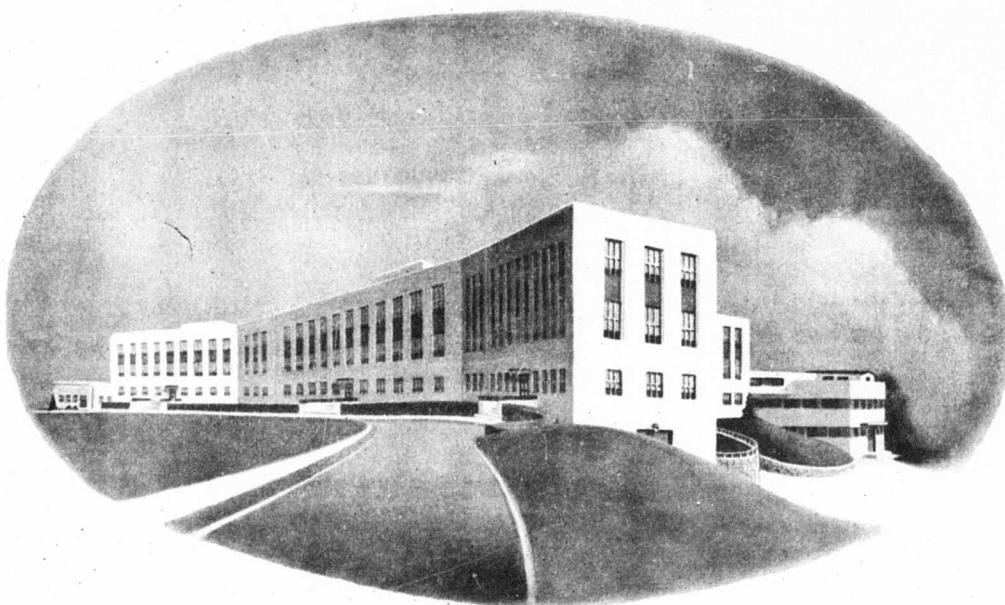

INTIMACY-SCALED STIMULI FOR USE IN STUDIES OF
INTERPERSONAL RELATIONSHIPS

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Research Report

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ABSTRACT

This report describes development of psychometric materials for use in research on interpersonal exchange and self-disclosure. The materials included 671 statements about various aspects of the self which people might discuss as they form interpersonal relationships with others. The items were scaled for "intimacy" and topical category by judges from two different populations.

The item pool was developed in connection with a research program we are now conducting on social penetration processes which occur in the development and dissolution of interpersonal relationships. A general hypothesis of the theoretical approach is that interpersonal relationships develop systematically over time, with gradually increasing mutual interpersonal exploration by dyad members via exchange of personal information, expression of affect, engaging in joint social activities, etc. In conducting this research it became clear that we were hampered by the lack of well-structured stimulus material--a problem fairly widespread in experimental social psychology. Therefore, a battery of 671 statements dealing with various aspects of the self was developed and scaled by the Thurstone procedure of equal appearing intervals. Intimacy and topic category judgements were made by two independent populations (college students and sailors) using IBM Porta Punch Boards. Equal appearing interval analysis was employed to obtain intimacy scale values and Q-scores. Pearson product moment correlations showed high agreement between the two populations.

The validation of apriori category nomenclature indicated that placement of 497 out of 641 statements were agreed upon by at least 8 of 16 judges. An additional 20 statements were reliably categorized by judges in other than the originally assigned topic areas. Thus, there was reliable agreement among judges as to statement topic for 77% of the items. Advantages and suggested usages of the item pool was discussed.

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INTRODUCTION

This report presents a set of stimulus materials for use in research on interpersonal exchange and self-disclosure. The materials include 671 statements about various aspects of the self which have been scaled for "intimacy" by judges from two different populations. The stimuli are grouped according to thirteen topical categories e.g., religion, family, money, and property, etc.

The item pool was developed in connection with a research program we are conducting on social penetration processes which occur in the development and dissolution of interpersonal relationships (see Altman and Haythorn, 1965; Frankfurt, 1965; Taylor, 1965; for a summary of the theoretical position and representative research studies). A general hypothesis of the approach is that interpersonal relationships develop systematically over time, with gradually increasing mutual interpersonal exploration by

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dyad members via exchange of personal information, expression of affect, engaging in joint social activities, etc. The basic developmental process is hypothesized to involve increased amounts of interpersonal exchange (breadth of penetration) and increasingly intimate levels of exchange (depth of penetration). To evaluate these and other relevant hypotheses (e.g., cost-reward determinants of social penetration), it was deemed necessary to develop a large pool of stimulus materials for self-disclosure questionnaires or for use in face-to-face interactions in experimental laboratory settings. A number of questionnaire instruments tapping self-disclosure already exist (Jourard, 1961; Jourard and Lasakow, 1958; Rickers-Ovsiankina, 1956; Rickers-Ovsiankina and Kusmin, 1958; Palmer, 1960, 1963; Taylor, 1965). However, for the most part, none provide a sufficiently large pool of material to satisfy requirements of longitudinal studies. Moreover, no dimensional analysis of existing materials has been conducted, e.g., intimacy properties of items, and no systematic attempt has been made to cover a wide range of topics and to evaluate the reliability of grouping items into topical categories. The present report summarizes a first step to develop such a pool of stimulus materials. Subsequent research will be aimed at more precise definition of stimulus properties, especially identification of key dimensions underlying the intimacy classification of items.

A critical problem in experimental social psychology is the lack of well-structured stimulus material, which, in turn, would be conducive to more precise analysis. Since the main data for social psychologists have been verbal behavior, techniques for its coding and analysis are mandatory.

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Major approaches toward systematic study of social behavior have involved content analysis and observation systems for categorizing ongoing social behavior. These approaches allow behavior to occur in relatively free form, without any rigid prestructuring of available responses by experimenters. From such freely occurring outputs, coding of limited aspects of behavior is done from transcripts or on-the-spot. The use of content analysis has been reviewed quite comprehensively by Pool (1959) and by Marsden (1965) and Murray, Auld and White (1954), the latter with regard to psychotherapeutic situations. Systematic observational systems and their characteristics have been summarized by Heyns and Lippitt (1954) and Altman (1966). Content analysis procedures have been applied to a range of social and individual behavior beginning with Lasswell's pioneering work (1935). In addition to a range of studies of political behavior, a substantial effort has been made to content analyze aspects of the therapeutic process. Illustrative examples include Collier's (1953) scale for measuring the degree of "uncovering", Carnes and Robinson's talk ratio (1948), and work by Rogers and others on self-understanding, discomfort-relief, tension, etc., all of which reflect changes in patient behavior through developing psychotherapeutic encounters (Mowrer, 1953; Rogers, 1942, 1948, 1951; Rogers and Dymond, 1954; Rogers and Wallen, 1946; Muench and Rogers, 1946; Butler and Haigh, 1954).

Approaches somewhat similar to the above are represented by a series of behavior observation systems which have been used to study small group processes. Interaction process analysis (Bales, 1950) is probably the best known and most widely used of these systems. It contains a set of

twelve categories that permit description of the sequential steps in group problem solving and social behavior regardless of its history, function, or composition. Carter and his associates (1951), Stock and Thelen (1958a, 1958b), and others have also developed behavior observation systems in attempts to define dimensions of group interaction. These approaches, although somewhat different in philosophy and technique, aim at describing dependent aspects of social interactions.

The work reported here takes a somewhat different approach to analysis of social behavior in that it is directed toward use of pre-structured social interaction materials. Thus, we are moving in the direction of restricting possible social behavior to permit greater control, rigorous measurement, and ease of data collection and analysis. However, imposition of behavior restriction can markedly affect the trade-off between research control and operational realism (Haythorn, 1962, McGrath, 1964). More specifically, less structuring probably results in a more naturalistic situation and a greater information potential. However, the capability for understanding cause-effect relationships is probably somewhat more difficult by virtue of the richness of the behavioral events. At the other end of the continuum, imposition of structure on possible social behaviors results in a more artificial situation with a lower overall information potential, but a greater likelihood of understanding dynamics of more limited behavioral events. Our intent is to strike a balance between the extremes of this hypothetical continuum, by developing a set of social interaction materials which will have certain predetermined properties, thereby

restricting possible social behaviors, but which also will permit, if desired, relatively free interaction.

METHOD

The scaling procedure employed in the present study is analagous to that of Exline and Long (1965), who used the Thurstone method of successive intervals. More specifically it is an extension of work by Taylor (1965) using the method of equal appearing intervals (Thurstone and Chave, 1929) to scale social penetration stimuli, (e.g. intimacy of social activities, attitudes and values, and personal information about the self).

A pool of 671 statements dealing with various topics about the self was developed from existing personality and self-disclosure instruments. Items were grouped on an apriori basis into thirteen topical categories such as religion, marriage and family, love-dating-sex etc. A list of topics and definitions is shown in Table 1. The items appear in the Appendix.

TABLE 1

List of Topical Categories

A. RELIGION (38 Items)

This topic contains items related to religious activities (praying, going to church), religious ideas, beliefs and values, religious training, feelings about other religions etc.

B. OWN MARRIAGE AND FAMILY (56 Items)

This topic treats views, practices and ideas about the type of person you want to marry, the type of relationship you

want to have with a wife, views on how children should be raised, etc. It deals with your own marriage and your own children, and does not deal with your parents, relatives, brothers and sisters, etc.

C. LOVE, DATING, SEX (71 Items)

This topic covers attitudes, opinions, habits and actual experiences in dating, sex and love. It includes how you feel about dating, sex and love with girls, actual experiences you have had, opinions and morals about dating, love and sex. It does not include matters which are appropriate to one's wife (see B. OWN MARRIAGE AND FAMILY).

D. PARENTAL FAMILY (57 Items)

This topic covers things related to parents, brothers and sisters, cousins, aunts, uncles and other relatives. It includes parents' opinions and beliefs, their good points and bad points, their child raising views and practices, etc. It includes your own views and behavior about your family and relatives, relationships between relatives, facts about your family, etc.

E. PHYSICAL CONDITION AND APPEARANCE (44 Items)

Included here are matters concerning your own physical condition including what you like and dislike about your physical appearance and condition, habits and practices regarding your physical appearance (eating, dress, baths), attitudes about physical state (fears and worries about health), and facts

about physical characteristics (illnesses, sleeping habits, etc).

F. MONEY AND PROPERTY (37 Items)

This topic covers personal attitudes and opinions, practices, and facts about financial and money matters. It includes how much money and property you have, attitudes about spending and borrowing, etc.

G. GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS, CURRENT EVENTS AND SOCIAL ISSUES (53 Items)

This topic covers a broad range of social attitudes and practices including views about government and politics, views about laws and lawbreaking, war, foreigners, ethnic groups and racial problems, international affairs, etc.

H. EMOTIONS AND FEELINGS (52 Items)

Included here are items pertaining to one's own feelings and emotions such as embarrassment, fears, worries, anger, satisfaction and happiness, pride and shame, sadness, nervousness, etc. It does not deal with opinions and beliefs, morals and ethics, etc., but with emotional matters.

I. INTERESTS, HOBBIES, HABITS (65 Items)

This topic treats your hobbies, things you do in spare time, things you would like to do (traveling, adventure, etc.), food preferences and eating habits, etc. It also includes attitudes and views about spare-time activities (gambling, card playing, TV, etc.), food and restaurants, etc.

J. RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER PEOPLE (46 Items)

This topic refers to items concerning one's views and opinions about dealing with other people, being with other people,

friends and friendship, being in social situations of various types, likes and dislikes about other people in general, etc. It specifically refers to one's relationships with others in social situations, etc. It does not refer to you alone as a person (see K. PERSONAL ATTITUDES ETC.), but your relationships with others in social situations.

K. PERSONAL ATTITUDES, VALUES AND ETHICS, AND SELF EVALUATION (52 Items)

This topic includes general opinions and beliefs you hold, attitudes about life and living, codes of ethics, etc. The items do not usually refer to relationships with specific other people, e.g., family or friends, but apply to life in general. It also includes things you like and things with which you are satisfied about yourself, and with which you are dissatisfied.

L. SCHOOL AND WORK (72 Items)

This topic covers matters related to past or present school and past or present work experiences. It includes facts about work and school (how much, where and when), feelings about work and school (likes, dislikes and preferences), relationships with school friends and teachers, or co-workers and supervisors, future plans, etc.

M. BIOGRAPHICAL CHARACTERISTICS (18 Items)

Included here are items of a biographical and personal nature-- including physical characteristics (height, weight, etc.), geographical information (hometown, length of time in Navy, etc.), and other descriptive characteristics.

The pool of 671 items was randomized into sets of 35 and presented to judges in packets counterbalanced to randomize position effects. Each S rated half the total pool of items on an 11-point scale regarding the degree of intimacy or personal character of the information in each statement. Judges were 150 sailors who had just completed recruit training and were about to begin Radioman school at the Bainbridge Naval Training Center. Responses were made directly onto a punch card using an IBM porta-punch board and stylus. Poor judges, defined by Thurstone's criteria, and judges who incorrectly used the porta-punch board were eliminated, yielding a total of 50 raters per item. Thurstone scale values (median judgements on the 11-point scale) and Q-values (inter-quartile ranges) were computed and appear next to each item in the Appendix.

On another occasion, an additional 48 Ss were drawn from the sample and asked to sort statements into one of the thirteen categories listed in Table 1. Each judge was given one third of the items in randomized sets, yielding 16 judges per item.

Intimacy and category scaling procedures were repeated on a freshman sample at the University of Delaware. Fifty Ss made intimacy judgements and 27 Ss were used to classify items into the thirteen topics. Intimacy data for this sample also appear in the Appendix next to the items.

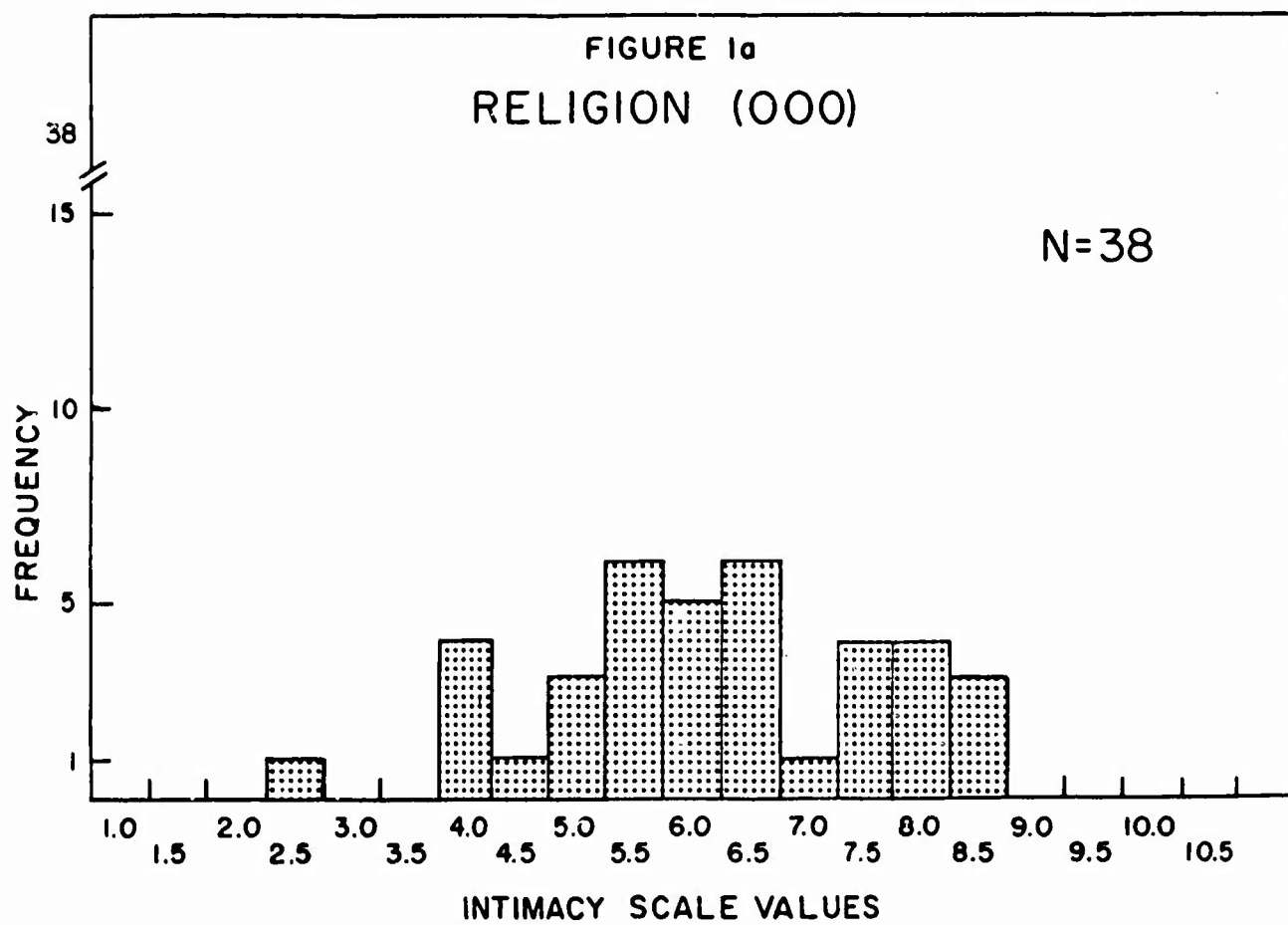
RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

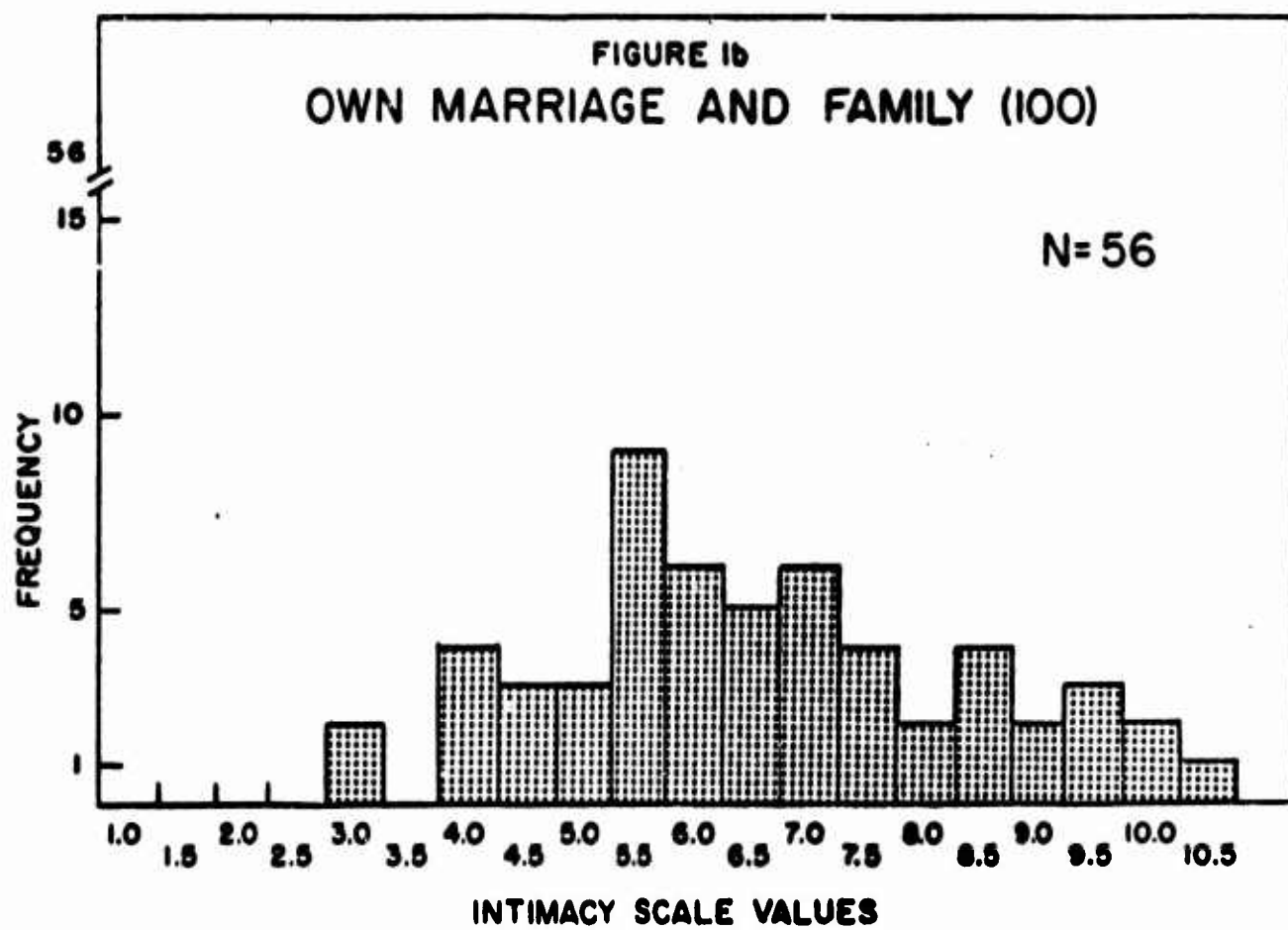
The 671 disclosure statement are arranged by category and listed in the Appendix. Each statement is preceded by two numbers. The first designates the category code and ordinal position of the statement within the category. The second number, in parenthesis, indicates the questionnaire sheet and item position used in the scaling process. Following each statement is its Thurstone intimacy scale value and its corresponding Q-score (inter-quartile range) for both Navy and college populations. Inspection of these values gives some idea of how closely these two independent populations agreed with each other. More objective data regarding this comparison will be presented below.

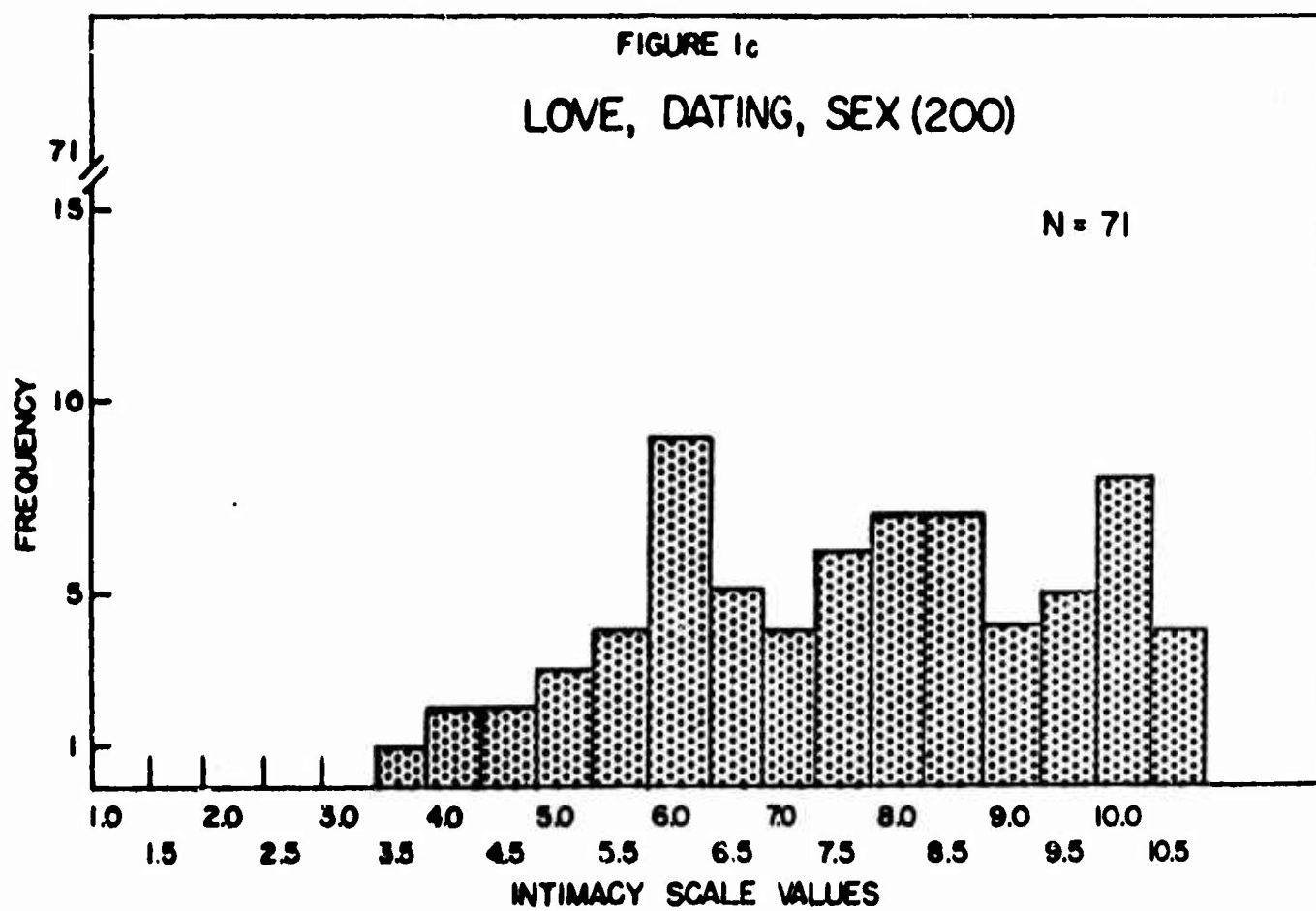
At the end of each set of items within a given category is a listing of the degree of empirical agreement among judges as to how well each statement fits the category description (see Table 1). This information will assist in statement selection for use in specific research applications, along with scale values and Q-scores. Disagreement with the apriori nomenclature is also indicated. On the whole agreement among judges was quite good. Of the 671 items, 408 or 60.8% were coded by 10 out of 16 judges as falling into their assigned category; 89 or 13.2% more were classified by 8 to 9 of 16 judges in their apriori designated category. The remaining 174 items were either not reliably placed in any particular category or were coded in other than the originally designated category. In some instances, judges agreed on the assignment of statements to categories different from the apriori designations. This choice and the amount of agreement is listed in the Appendix.

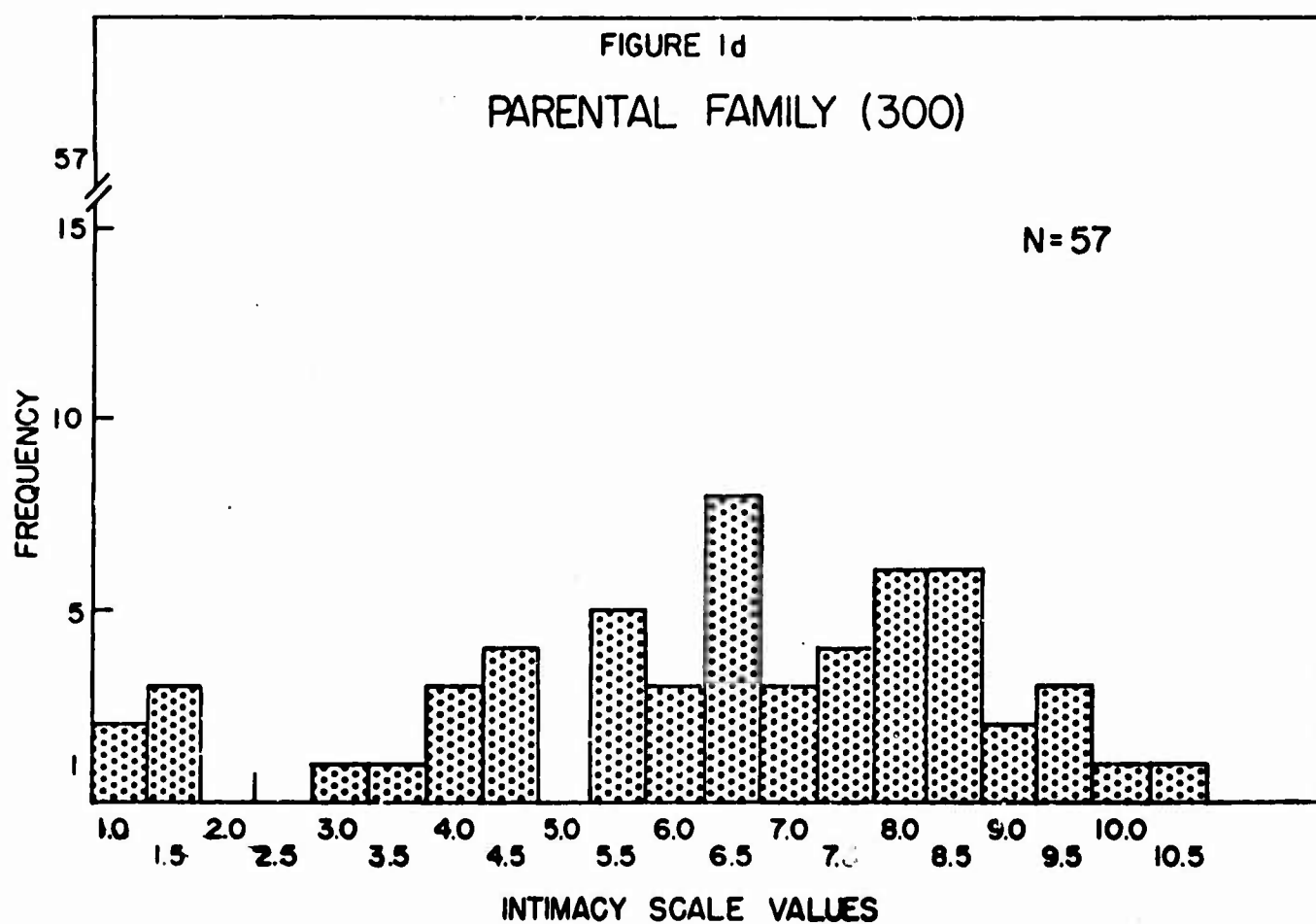
Figures 1a - 1m show frequency distributions (histograms) of the scaled stimulus statements for each category for Navy Ss. Inspection of these figures gives some idea of the representative range of intimacy statements in each of the 13 categories. It can be seen that the spread of items along the intimacy scale is reasonably good for most categories, with only a few having a range less than a scale value of 7 units. It should be noted that a number of category distributions are somewhat skewed. For example, biographical information (Figure 1m) and hobbies, interests, and habits (Figure 1i) tend to contain items of a relatively superficial nature, whereas love, dating and sex topics (Figure 1c) are skewed toward the high intimacy end of the continuum. By combining related categories and renaming, or simply compounding nomenclature, an example of which is shown in Figures 2a and 2b, it may be possible to generate a more evenly spread distribution of statements if the existing pool within a category is insufficient for a specific need. This procedure might be especially applicable for categories containing only a few items.

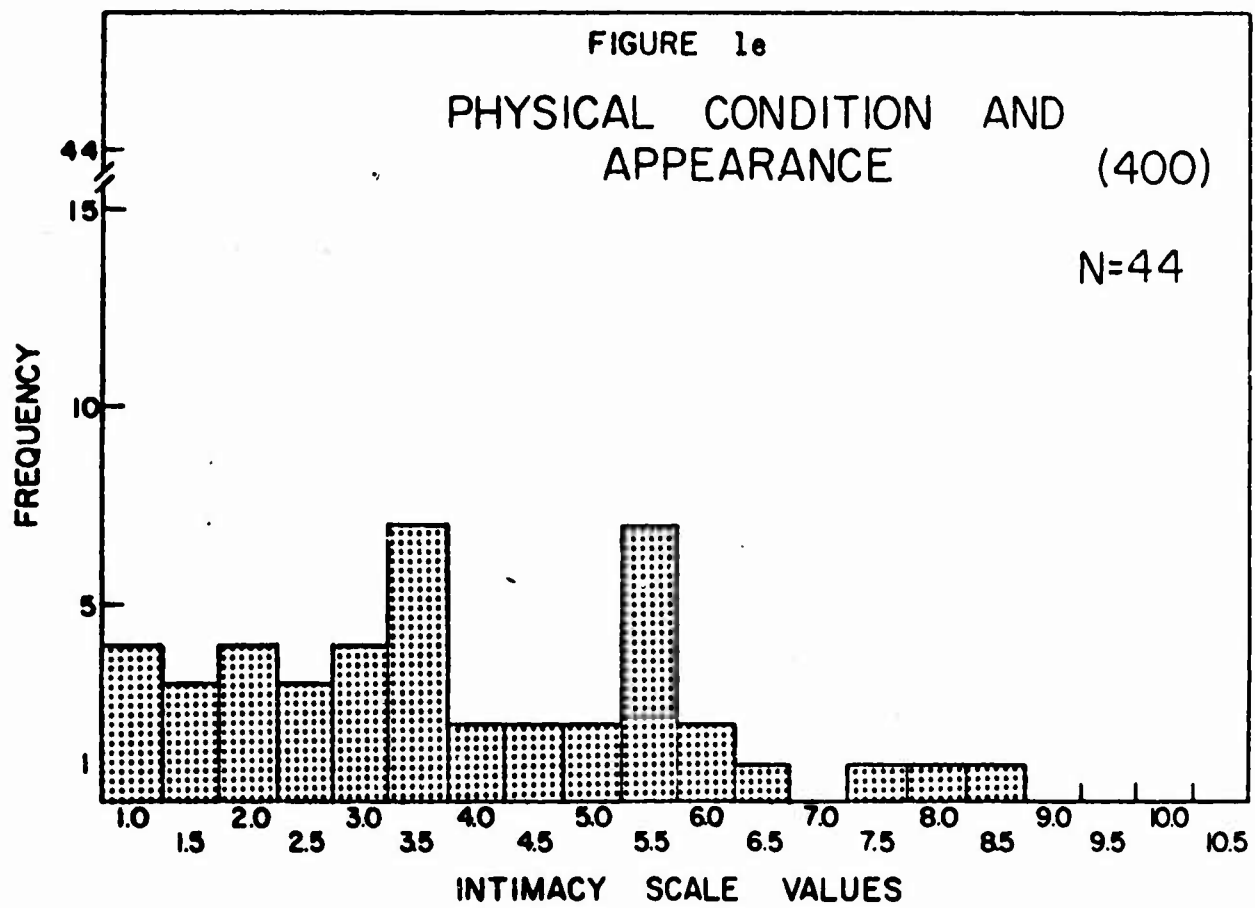
Table 2 presents means and standard deviations of scale values for each category and the total for navy and college populations. Examination of these data shows high overall agreement between populations regarding intimacy level of the stimulus materials. The degree of agreement is further indicated by the high correlations between scale values for individual statements in each category, with inter-sample ratings of intimacy yielding r 's ranging from .76 to .94. It should be pointed out, however, that college students exhibited much more internal consistency or

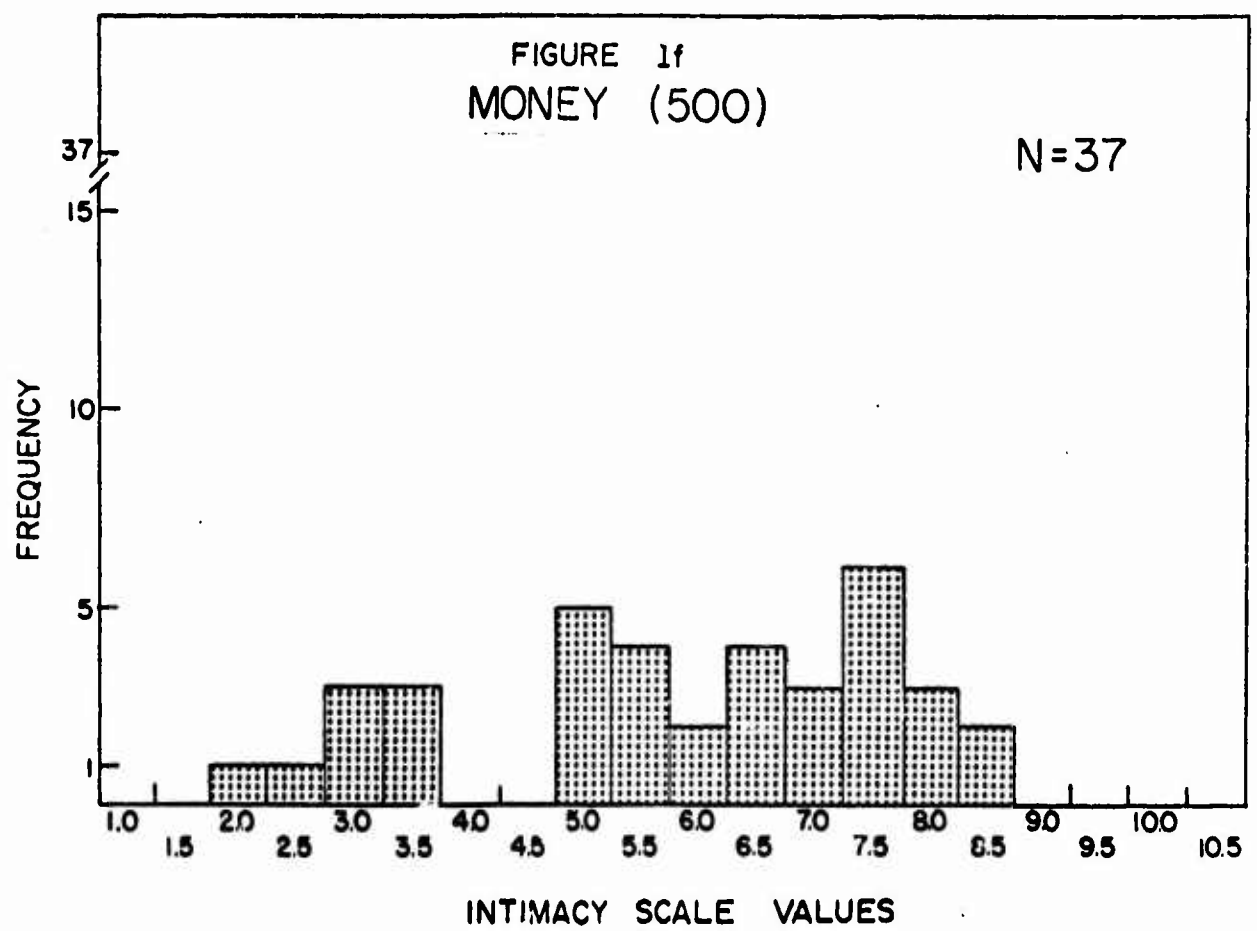












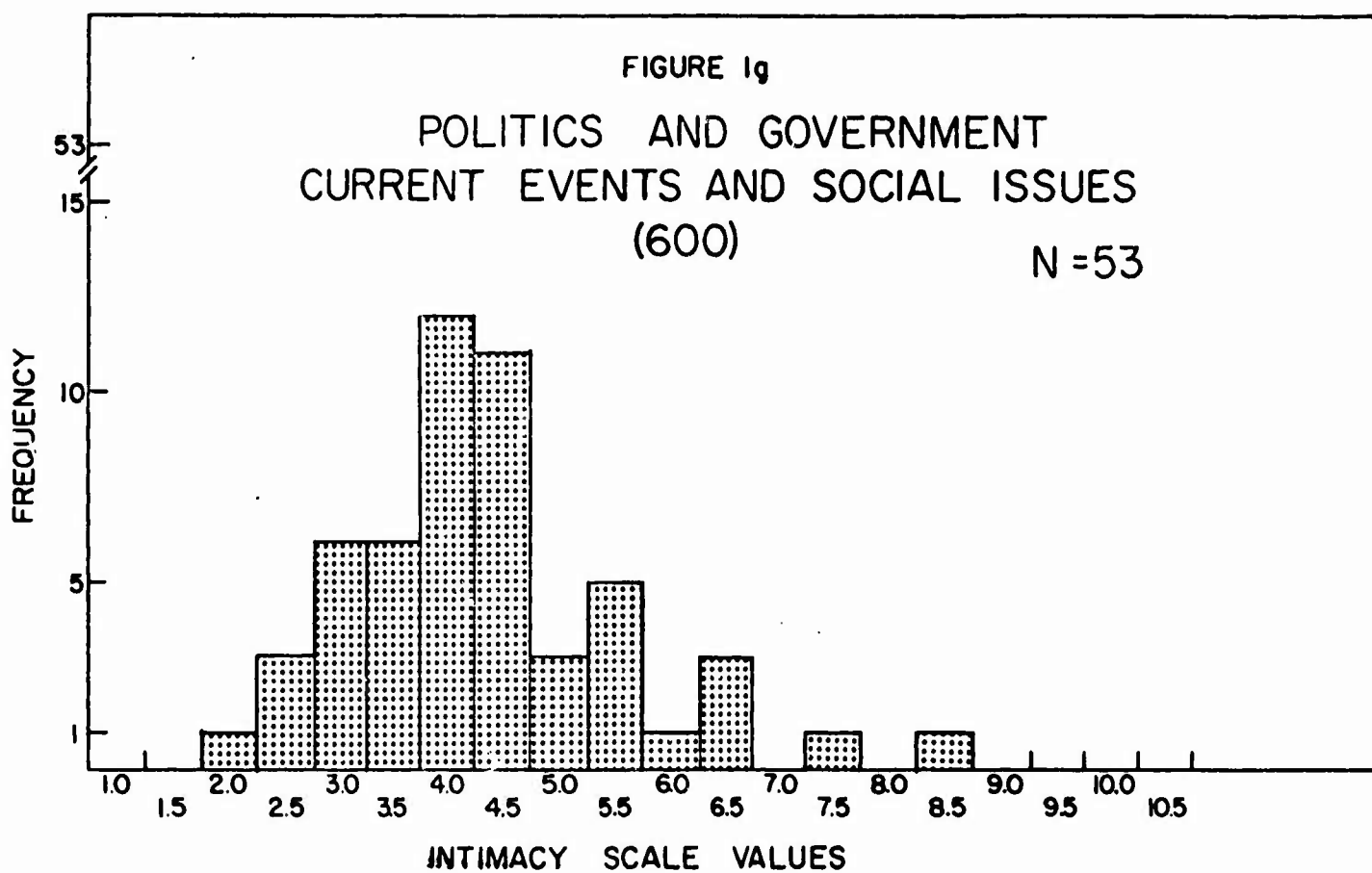
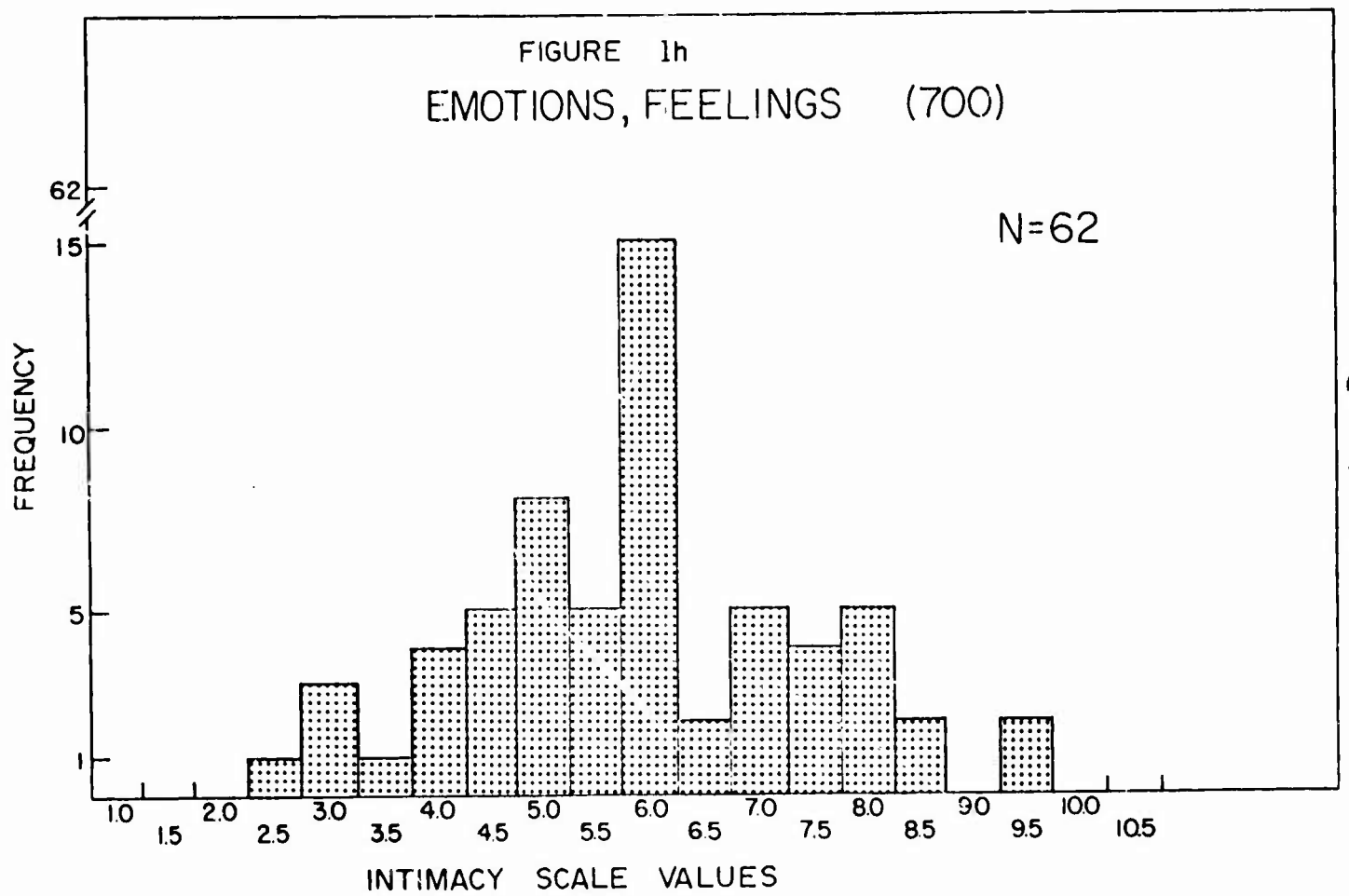
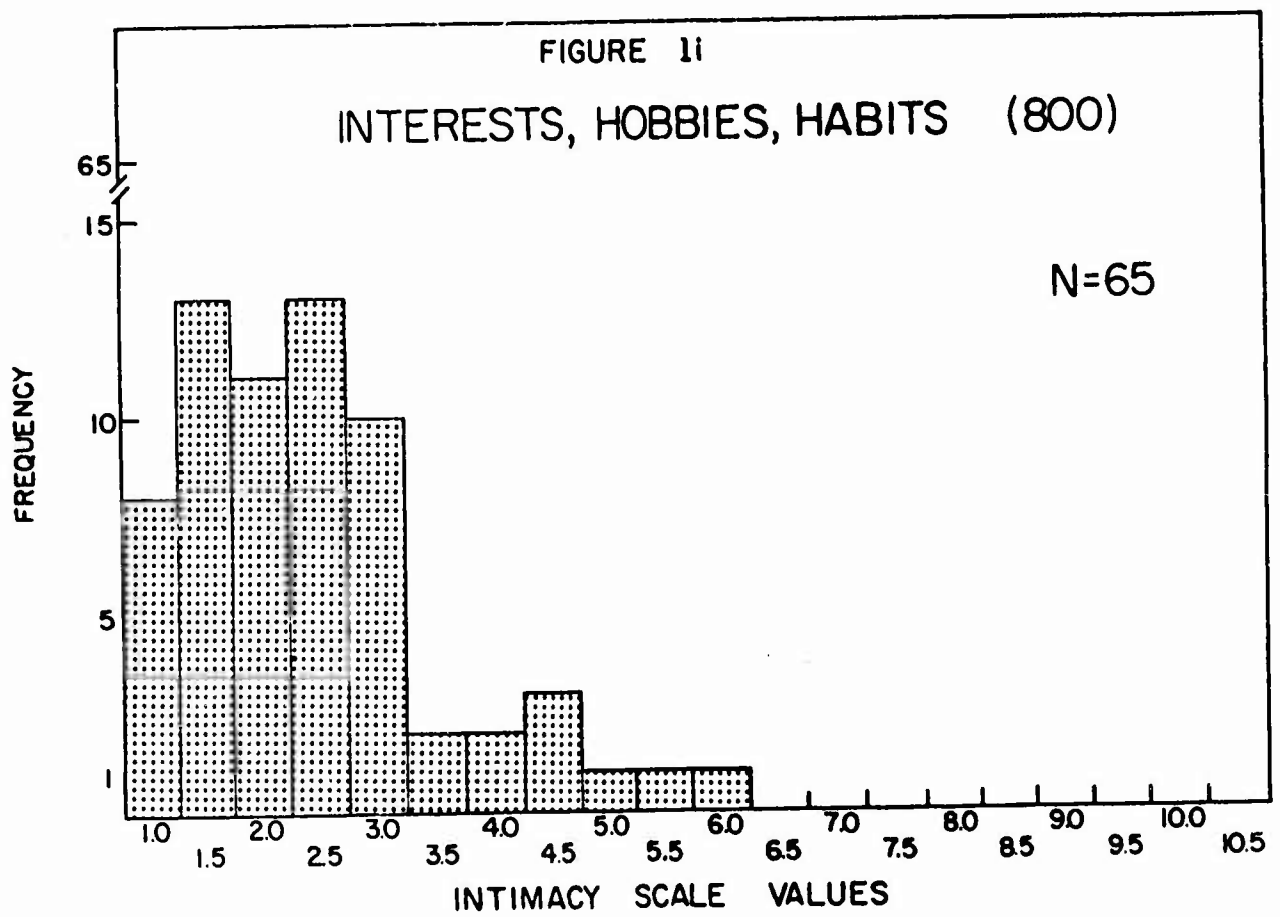
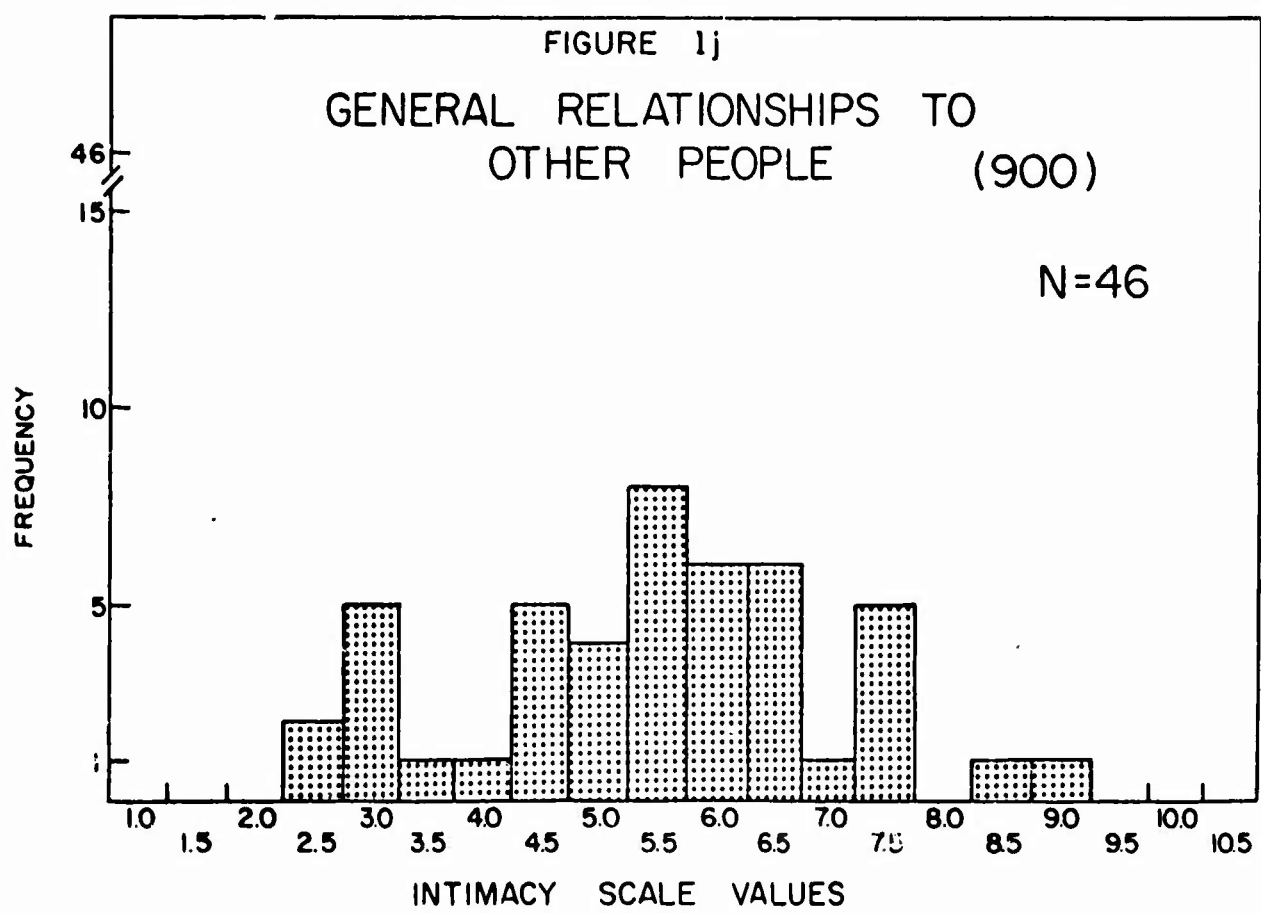
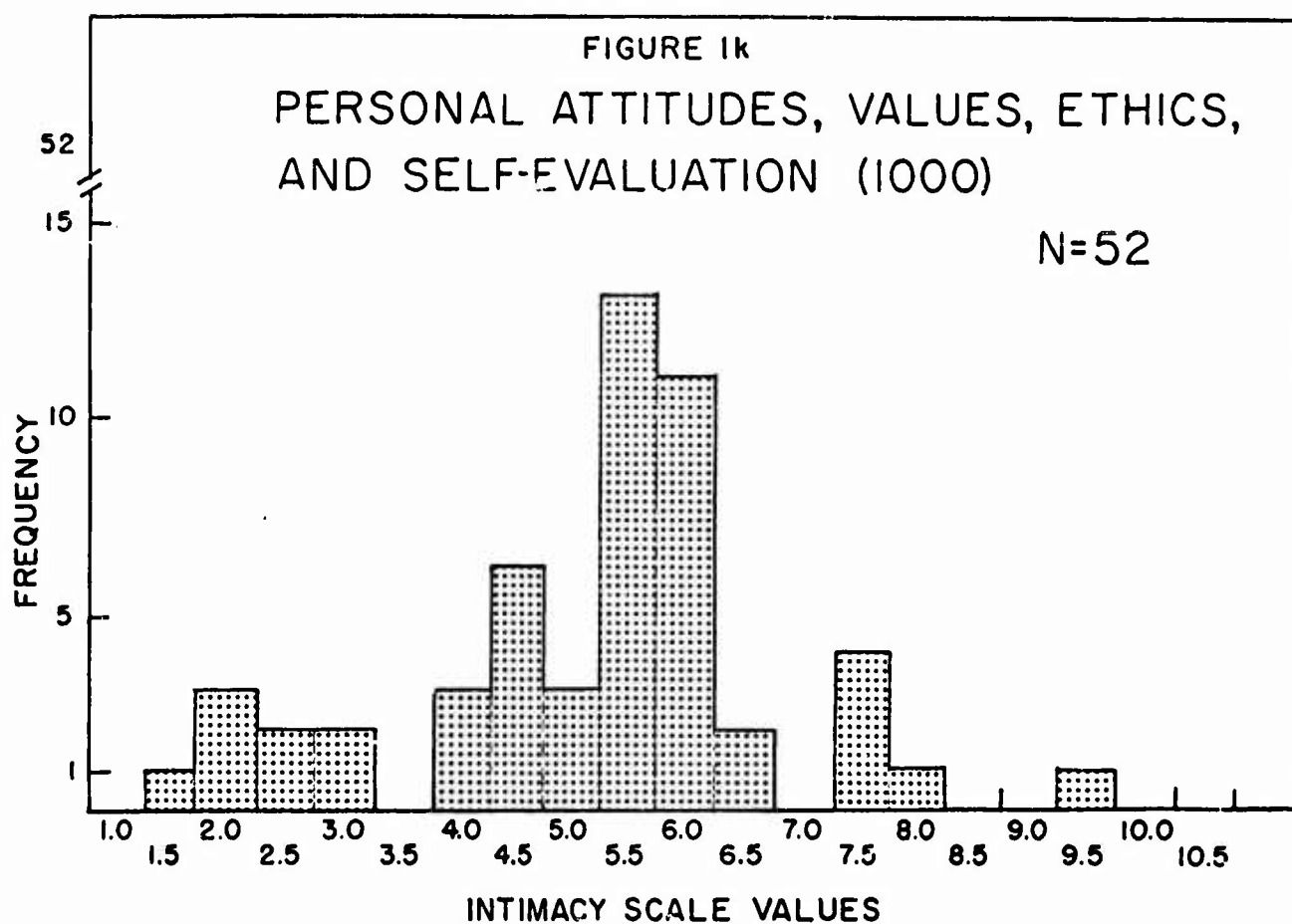


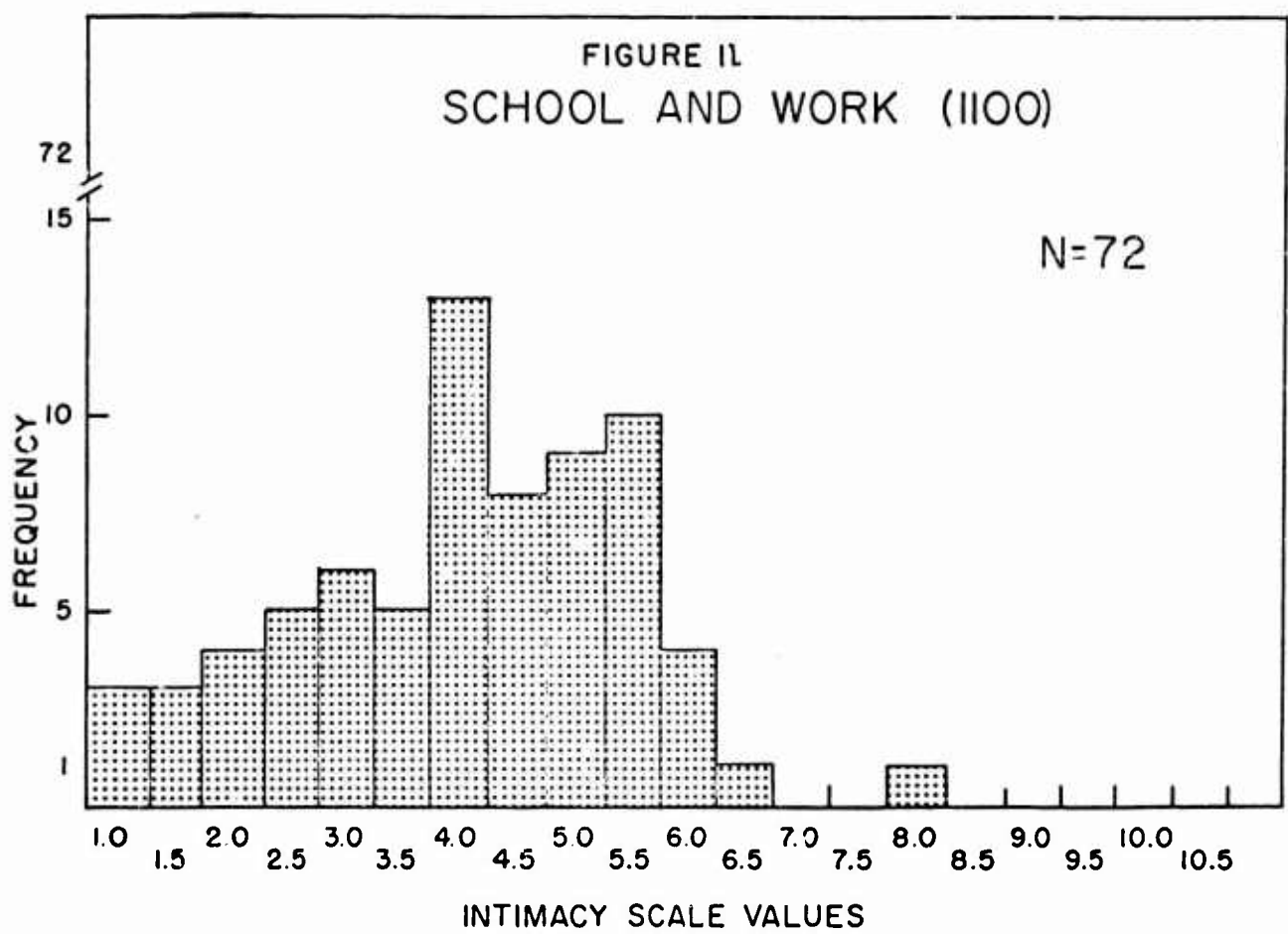

EMOTIONS, FEELINGS (700)

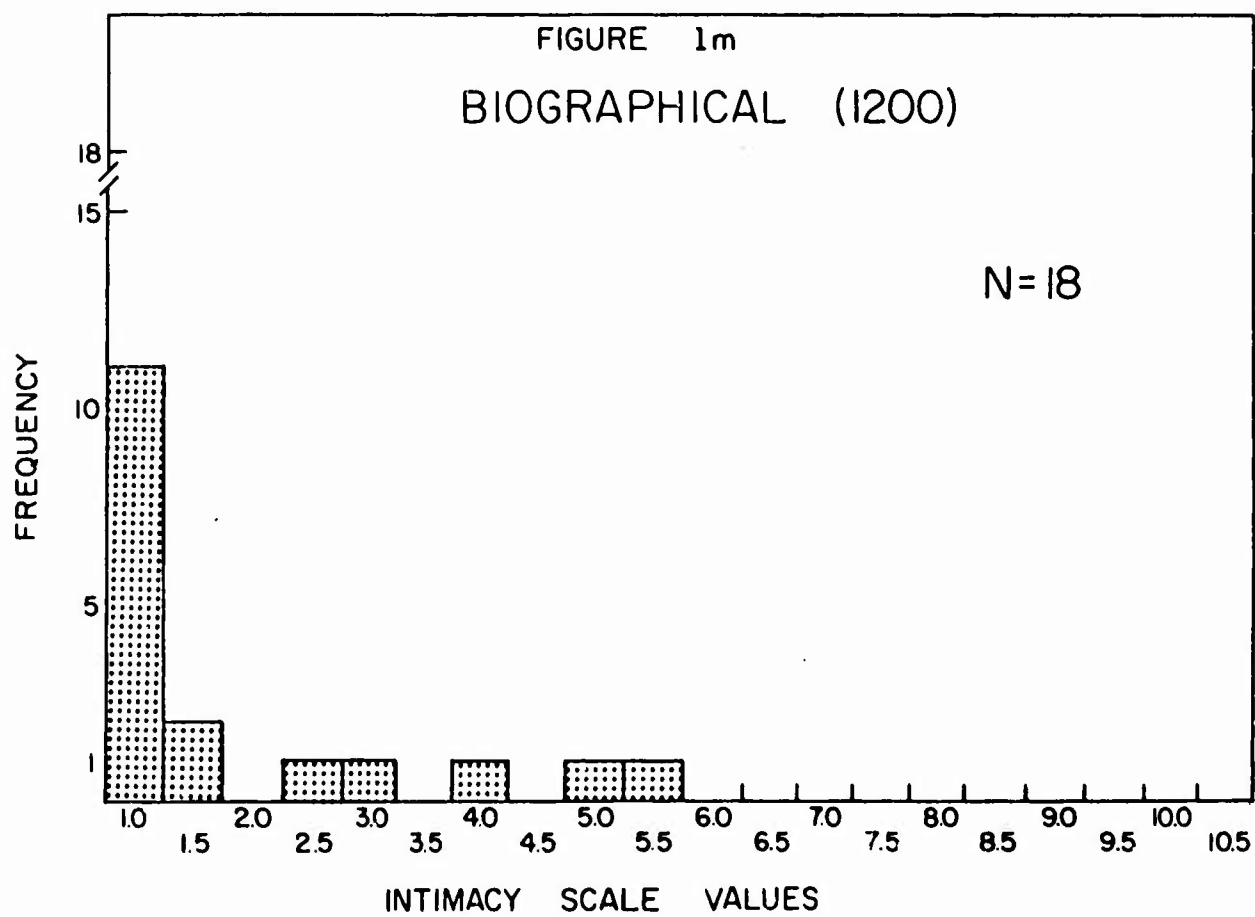


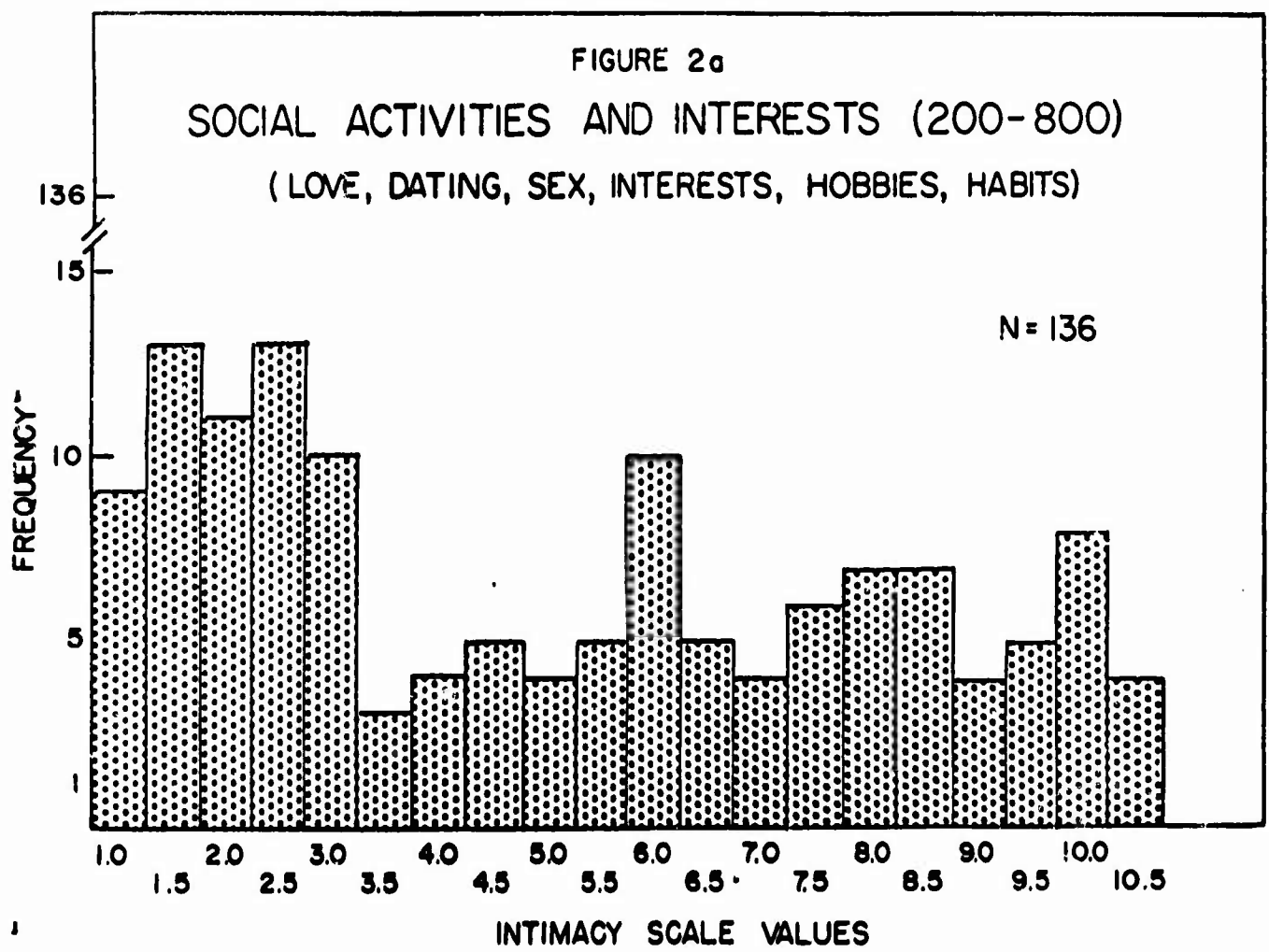












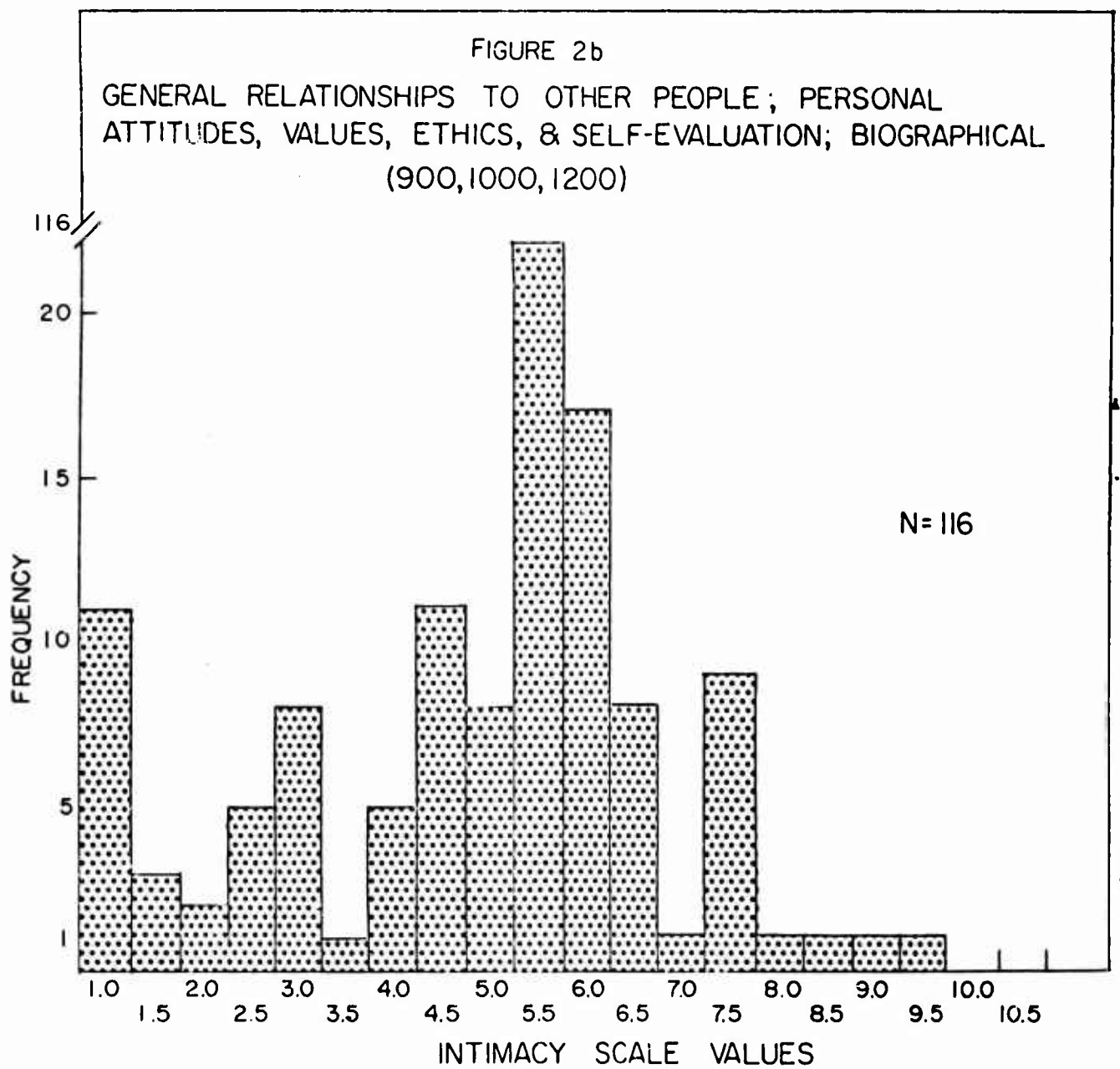

agreement than Navy Ss, as evidenced by generally low Q-scores for the college Ss (see Appendix).

Original nomenclature for category grouping of items was, for the most part, logical and apriori. However, efforts were made to validate empirically these decisions by computing percent agreement among judges in

locating each item in one of the 13 categories. From these judgements, three levels of item-category fit were identified: 1) high (62.5 - 100% of the judges agreed on category location for items), 2) Moderate (50 - 62.4% agreement among judges), and 3) Low (less than 50% of the judges agreed on an item's category location). This information is listed in the Appendix following each series of items within a topical category. Instances in which judges agreed in their disagreement with the apriori designations are also listed.

APPLICATION OF THE MATERIALS

So far we have dealt with the development and construction of a battery of structured stimulus materials for use in social psychological research. Now it might be appropriate to turn to some possible applications of this material. In connection with our own research interests, these items can be used to develop self-disclosure questionnaires. The large pool of items and the psychometric scaling described above offer obvious advantages over existing questionnaires. Self-disclosure information can be elicited from respondents on two relevant parameters--topical areas of disclosure and level of intimacy within topical areas. Additionally, several alternate forms can be developed, thereby eliminating or minimizing sensitization with repeated testing. Our research on split-half and alternate-form reliability for 35-item questionnaires yielded reliability coefficients between .82 & .85. Obviously, effort must also be given to the question of validity.

Another way in which these statements could be used is in a structured

social encounter. With the help of a live confederate, pre-written messages or even a computer search procedure, social exchange paradigms could be experimentally programmed so that pre-arranged alternative responses could be selected from the pool, contingent on freely selected statements from the pool by a naive S. These statements and their relevant psychometric data can also be used to develop techniques for coding unstructured, freely occurring social exchanges, in the form of a modified behavior observation system. Obviously, a common danger to such applications is the assumption of equivalence of scale values for similar but not identical statements. Associated with this difficulty is the danger of generalizing beyond the "identical element" of a response to its entire context, especially in amplifications and qualifications that might be made by Ss. It should also be pointed out that the concept of "intimacy" is probably too global and requires considerable conceptual and empirical refinements. There are probably more molecular and multidimensional components of the concept which might profitably be explored through multidimensional scaling or other related approaches. This will be a future direction of our research. However, until undertaken, we consider these stimulus materials to be extremely useful in social psychological research.

SUMMARY

This report described the development and construction of psychometric materials for use in research on interpersonal exchange and self-disclosure. The materials included 671 statements about various aspects of the self which were scaled for "intimacy" and topical categories by judges from two different populations.

The item pool was developed in connection with a research program now being conducted on social penetration processes which occur in the development and dissolution of interpersonal relationships (Altman and Haythorn, 1965; Frankfurt, 1965; Taylor, 1965). A general hypothesis of the theoretical approach is that interpersonal relationships develop systematically over time, with gradually increasing mutual interpersonal exploration by dyad members via exchange of personal information and affect, engaging in joint social activities, etc.

Addressing ourselves to a critical problem in experimental social psychology--the lack of well-structured stimulus material--we have conducted Thurstone scaling on a battery of 671 statements dealing with various aspects of the self. Additionally, the statements were sorted by judges into one of 13 topical categories including Religion, Sex, Family, Interests, etc. Intimacy and category judgements were made by two independent populations (college students and sailors) using IBM Porta Punch Boards. Equal appearing interval analysis (Thurstone and Chave, 1929) was employed to obtain intimacy scale values and Q-scores. Agreement in scale value placement between the two populations was quite good, as reflected in a pooled Pearson product moment correlation ($r = .90$) and correlations ranging from .76 - .94 for the 13 categories considered individually.

The results of this psychometric scaling makes it possible to construct questionnaires directed at assessing inter- and intrapersonal events, with advantages not offered by existing self-disclosure questionnaires. Interpersonal information can be elicited from respondents on two relevant parameters--topical area of information and intimacy level within topical

areas. In addition, a variety of alternate forms can be developed in an effort to eliminate or minimize sensitization with repeated testing.

Structuring social exchange in a laboratory through a live confederate, written messages, or computer simulation are other ways in which these statements can be used. Obviously, such usage restricts freely occurring social exchange but in turn provides more rigorous experimental control. In situations where this degree of control is not possible or desirable, taped transcriptions can be coded using the scaled statements as an observer manual.

In conclusion, the scaled stimulus materials resulting from the psychometric procedures described above should contribute to the improvement of the general metric problem in experimental social psychology. These materials have the advantage of providing greater control, more rigorous measurement, and a facility of data collection and analysis heretofore not offered by other attempts to code interpersonal behaviors. Scales developed from these statements, like any others, will obviously have to be validated against independent behaviors.

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APPENDIX

This Appendix contains the 671 scaled statements listed by category. The first number before each statement designates the category code and ordinal position of the statement within the category. The second number, in parenthesis, indicates the questionnaire sheet and item position in which the statement was scaled. Following each statement is its intimacy scale value and Q-score for both Navy and college Ss.

Empirical agreement among judges regarding topical category is indicated at the end of each category listing. The statements are divided into high, medium, and low agreement, and a fourth grouping identifies statements in which judges agreed on a category other than the apriori designated one.
