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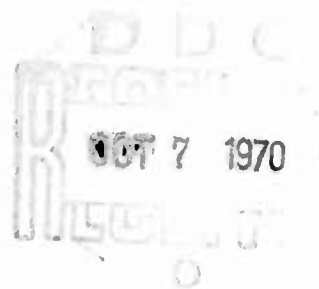

**1. (C) Section 1. Operations: Significant Activities**

**a. On 8 April 1970, three North Korean Agents were killed in the 97th Regimental Combat Team (97th RCT) sector of the 2d Infantry Division. Korea National Police (KNP) and Homeland Reserve Force (HRF) personnel had been on the alert for enemy agent activity since 7 April due to a sighting of a UI and the subsequent discovery of wetsuits in the 5th ROK Marine Brigade Sector on the 2d Infantry Division's left flank. The three agents were initially sighted by civilians in the area. Approximately 950 personnel from 97th RCT, KNP, and HRF were deployed in the area. In addition, two helicopters (One OH-23 for Command and Control and one UH-1 to transport a Quick Reaction Force (QRF)) from 2d Aviation Battalion were instru-**

mental in the elimination of the agent team. All three agents were killed by HRF and KNP personnel within one hour and twenty minutes of the first sighting. Five friendly personnel (one KNP, two HRF and two civilian personnel) were wounded, and a UH-1 was struck by an incoming round of small arms fire with no significant damage. It is believed that two of the agents were escorts for the third, who was to set up a business in Inchon dealing in automobile repair parts, which would have been used as a base for subversive activities. Significant among the equipment found on the agents was a North Korean 7.62mm pistol with silencer. This was only the second time such a weapon has been recovered from an agent in South Korea.

b. I Corps (Gp) General Order Number 45 dated 17 March 1970 assigned the 56th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog) to the 2d Infantry Division. The platoon is under the operational control of the 1st Bde, and has been used in conjunction with DMZ patrols and rear area searches since 20 March 1970.

c. On 14 February, the 2d Infantry Division Air Control Point was moved from the helipad at Division Headquarters to Hill 126 (Charlie Block), coord CS 073 893, which is more centrally located within the Division sector. This relocation has enhanced the ground controller's surveillance of the airspace within the division, improved communications and provided more positive control of aircraft in the Restricted Zone adjacent to the DMZ.

d. During the reporting period the 2d Aviation Battalion received two additional UH-1 aircraft. The Division's aviation assets now include 19 OH-23G and 21 UH-1 aircraft, including three OH-23G and three UH-1 aircraft assigned to D Troop, 4-7th Cavalry Squadron. To increase the air-mobile and airlift capabilities and to provide the Division with added flexibility in the performance of its mission, an extensive training program has been initiated. Aircraft are also now utilized in rear area security missions to airlift patrols into search areas and in anti-infiltration operations for reconnaissance and surveillance missions and to transport Quick Reaction Forces (QRF) to areas of possible enemy activity.

e. The 2d Infantry Division is currently replacing the M-14 rifles with M-16 rifles. This program began in late CY 68, involves the training of individuals and issue of new weapons, and the technical inspection, repackaging and turn-in of more than 7,000 M-14 rifles. The conversion is scheduled for completion in late May 1970.

f. During the reporting period the reorganization of the Counter Agent Company (CAC) continued. The mission of the CAC will be to conduct anti-infiltration, counterespionage, countersabotage, and security operations,

and, in the event of hostilities, to enter specified areas within enemy held territory to observe and report enemy dispositions, installations, and activities.

g. Installation of the Line Sensor System, consisting of Balanced Pressure Systems, Unattended Seismic Detectors, Multipurpose Concealed Intrusion Detectors, and Infrared Intrusion Detectors, was begun in late 1967, and became operational in January 1968. The system was installed to test its effectiveness as a deterrent to enemy infiltration efforts. Due to excessive maintenance requirements and the adverse effects of Korean weather and ground conditions on the components of the system, the devices were removed in April 1970 and are being prepared for shipment to CONUS.

h. From 3 - 5 March the 2d Infantry Division conducted a communications exercise to evaluate the adequacy of the Division Tactical Communications System. The exercise indicated that further training is required in the operation of Division high frequency nets; however, the reliability of these nets has improved since a similar evaluation in November.

i. To maintain its readiness posture, the 2d Infantry Division now provides continuous voice communications with all subordinate units of company size or larger which are operating outside the Division TAOR. Direct voice communications to the Division TOC as well as parent units is provided for Armor, Artillery and Cavalry Squadron units conducting operations or training outside the division area.

j. As a supplement to the IMJIN River Barrier described in the Operational Report, Lessons Learned for the period ending 31 January 1970, the Division proposed to install a "flying ferry" in the IMJIN River near the Southern boundary of the DMZ. The "flying ferry" will consist of a floating platform anchored in the river to provide more adequate observation of the IMJIN River. The "flying ferry" will be manned continuously by armed personnel and allowed to float across the width of the river.

k. To supplement the two permanent bridges across the IMJIN River in the 2d Infantry Division sector, a tactical bridge was installed in the Spoonbill area on 11 March 1970. This bridge is installed when river conditions are favorable and is constructed from four Armored Vehicular Launched Bridges and 380 feet of M4T6 Bridging. A CH-47 helicopter from the 19th Aviation Company was used to transport the M4T6 sections to the bridge site from the assembly site four miles away. The bridge will remain until monsoon rains cause the river to rise.

l. Rehabilitation of guard posts, which had been halted in December 1969 due to adverse weather conditions, resumed in March 1970. The overall project includes construction and camouflage of sleeping quarters, command bunkers, fighting positions and trenchlines, installation of chain link perimeter fencing and improvement of fields of fire. Work has been completed on two of the eleven guard posts, and work on the remaining guard posts is from 15 to 75 percent complete.

m. In March 1970, the 2d Engineer Battalion completed construction of two air observation posts (AOPs) in the 1st Brigade sector along the IMJIN River, giving the Division four permanent AOPs. These installations consist of small buildings on prominent terrain features. The AOPs have plexiglass roofs to permit better aerial observation.

2. (C) Section 2, Lessons Learned: Commanders' Observations, Evaluation and Recommendation:

a. Personnel

(1) Observation: During the period 1 February to 30 April 1970, the assignment level of middle grade commissioned officers was augmented by an additional 60 captains and 11 majors, thus giving the Division 78% of captains and 55% of majors authorized.

(2) Evaluation: Although imbalances still exist, especially in the grade of major, the increases in middle grade officers has improved the experience level and the readiness posture of the Division.

(3) Recommendation: That emphasis be continued on the acquisition of additional middle grade commissioned officers for the 2d Infantry Division.

c. Operations:

(1) IMJIN River Anti-Infiltration Operations.

(a) Observation: Improved barrier operations have channeled enemy

agent infiltration/exfiltration attempts toward the Han River Estuary and the IMJIN River, where prevailing tides can carry agents into and out of the Division sector. Current anti-infiltration operations in this area are concentrated on visual detection of infiltrators from permanent positions along the river bank.

b. **Evaluation:** A more efficient system for denying North Korean agents access to the Division sector through the IMJIN River would significantly enhance the 2d Infantry Division's anti-infiltration operations.

(c) **Recommendation:** That a physical barrier supplemented with better observation be integrated with current anti-infiltration operations (see para 1j).

**(2) 56th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog)**

(a) **Observation:** The 56th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog), assigned to the 2d Infantry Division in March 1970, has provided the Division with improved capabilities to detect enemy personnel and ambush sites as well as recently emplaced caches and mines or booby traps during tactical operations.

(b) **Evaluation:** Although tactical elements utilizing scout dog teams on operations have not encountered hostile individuals, their use has increased the overall effectiveness of patrol operations, especially during hours of darkness and periods of low visibility. The dog teams have made numerous detections, all of which were found to be animals or friendly personnel.

(c) **Recommendation:** That a Scout Dog Platoon remain assigned to this Division.

**(3) Aircraft Utilization:**

(a) **Observation:** Detection of small groups of enemy agents is difficult in lightly populated areas.

(b) **Evaluation:** During the search for the three enemy agents killed on 8 April 1970, (para 1a above) the infiltrators took evasive action and attempted to conceal themselves when aircraft flew overhead. In addition, the presence of aircraft restricted the movement of the infiltrators and caused them to take evasive action. The fact that local indigenous personnel did not take evasive action permitted the infiltrators to be more easily identified by ground forces.

(c) Recommendation: That units be advised that the use of aircraft can be instrumental in restricting movement of hostile individuals until blocking forces can move into position, and can permit more rapid identification of hostile individuals.

e. Training: None

f. Logistics:

(1) Observation: Certain major assemblies that have the same end item application are stored and shipped in different type containers. One major assembly may be shipped in a metal container, but assigned a different Federal Stock Number when shipped in a wooden container. For example, a five ton truck engine, FSN 2805-724-9412 is shipped in a metal container. The same five ton truck engine when shipped in a wooden container has FSN 2805-973-4975.

(2) Evaluation: Non issue of some high dollar value items due to identification difficulties can result from the use of different Federal Stock Numbers for the same item.

(3) Recommendation: That Federal Stock Numbers for the same end items be standardized regardless of type of container used.

(C) This headquarters has reviewed subject report. The following comments supplement the report.

a. Reference item concerning personnel, page 4, paragraph 2a. Concur. Shortages of middle grade officers, senior NCO's and enlisted personnel were noted in the I Corps (Gp) Command Summary Evaluation of Unit Readiness for the 3d Quarter FY70 as having a serious impact on capabilities for sustained operations.

b. Reference item concerning operations: Imjin River Anti-Infiltration Operations, pages 4-5, paragraph 2c(1). Concur. A floating barrier concept was prepared by the 2d Infantry Division. This concept was reviewed by this headquarters and forwarded to Eighth U.S. Army on 1 June 1970 for approval. The barrier can be constructed by the 2d Infantry Division if technical assistance and materials are provided from other than divisional and/or Corps assets.

c. Reference item concerning operations: 56th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog), page 5, paragraph 2c(2). Concur. The scout dog teams have been a great asset in supplementing the defenses in the 2d Infantry Division sector. However, the Scout Dog Platoon has not been assigned long enough to make a complete evaluation as to its usefulness in detecting unidentified individuals.

d. Reference item concerning operations: Aircraft Utilization, pages 5-6, paragraph 2c(3). Concur. The incident which occurred on 8 April 1970 has proven that light observation aircraft can be a most effective means to detect enemy personnel and direct friendly forces to the enemy's location.

e. Reference item concerning logistics, page 6, paragraph 2f. Concur. KORSCOM is being advised by separate correspondence of the alleged difference in FSM's. Non issue of high dollar items, due to being identified by different

FSN's, is doubtful. In the 5 ton truck engine example mentioned, the Management Data List shows that one FSN can be listed as a replacement FSN for the other. Standardization in any event is desirable.

1. (U) This headquarters has reviewed subject report and forwarding indorsement. The following comments supplement the report.
2. (U) Reference item concerning Personnel, page 4, para 2a; and 1st Ind, page 7, para a. Concur. Eighth Army's Projected Requisitioning Authorities (PRA) for the grades of captain and major remain at approximately 55 percent of TOE authorization. The 2d Inf Div, because of its high priority, receives a higher percentage of these middle grades than the command as a whole. This headquarters, will continue to monitor 2d Division strength in these middle grades to insure that officers are assigned in accordance with the division's priority.
3. (C) Reference item concerning IMJIN River Operations, page 4, para 2c(1); and 1st Ind, page 7, para b. Concur. The floating barrier concept proposed by 2d Infantry Division is being staffed for feasibility of implementation and availability of resources.
4. (U) Reference item concerning 56th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog), page 5, para 2c(2); and 1st Ind, page 7, para c. Concur.
5. (U) Reference item concerning Aircraft Utilization, page 5, para 2c(3); and 1st Ind, page 7, para d. Concur. Utilization of Army aircraft should be exploited in future counterinfiltration operations to detect and restrict maneuver by enemy agents.
6. (U) Reference item concerning Logistics, page 6, para 2f; and 1st Ind, page 7, para e. Concur with the rationale that the federal stock number should identify the end item rather than the type of package. However, nonconcur with the assumption that non-issue would occur due to the difference in stock numbers identifying the package, because federal stock numbers are readily cross-referenced for positive identification.
