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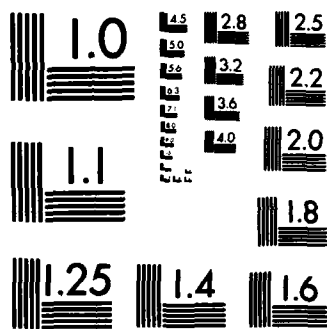
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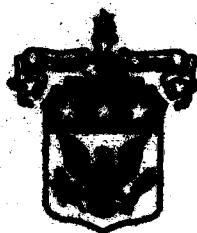

SUBJECT: The Military Family: A Selected Bibliography; 1982 Edition

1. The military family portion of the US Army War College curriculum has two major objectives. The first is to examine the relationship between military family issues and Army Readiness in the context of General Meyer's recognition that "We recruit soldiers, but we retain families." The second objective is to provide the students and their wives the knowledge and skills required to productively cope with these issues in future assignments. To accomplish these objectives, a series of lectures, seminars, and workshops will be presented throughout the academic year.

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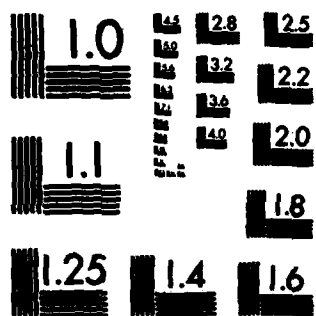
