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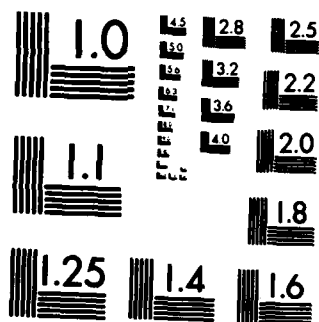

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OF COMPRESSIBLE VISCOUS AND HEAT-CONDUCTIVE FLUIDS

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ABSTRACT

→ The equations of motion of compressible viscous and heat-conductive fluids are investigated for initial boundary value problems on the half space and on the exterior domain of any bounded region. The global solution in time is proved to exist uniquely and approach the stationary state as $t \rightarrow \infty$, provided the prescribed initial data and the external force are sufficiently small. ↗

§1. INTRODUCTION

The motion of viscous compressible fluids is described by the system of five equations for the density ρ , the velocity $u = (u^1, u^2, u^3)$ and the temperature θ :

$$\begin{aligned} \rho_t + (\rho u^j)_{x_j} &= 0 \\ (1.1) \quad u_t^i + u^j u_{x_j}^i + \frac{1}{\rho} p_{x_i} &= \frac{1}{\rho} \{ (\mu(u_{x_j}^i + u_{x_i}^j) + \mu' u_{x_k}^k \delta^{ij}) \}_{x_j} + x^i, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \\ \theta_t + u^j \theta_{x_j} + \frac{\partial p_\theta}{\partial c_v} u_{x_j}^j &= \frac{1}{\rho c_v} \{ (\kappa \theta_{x_j})_{x_j} + \mathcal{V} \}, \end{aligned}$$

where p is the pressure, μ is the viscosity coefficient, μ' is the second coefficient of viscosity, κ is the coefficient of heat conduction, c_v is the specific heat at constant volume, all of which are known functions of ρ and θ , and $\mathcal{V}$ is the dissipation function:

$$\mathcal{V} = \frac{\mu}{2} (u_{x_k}^j + u_{x_j}^k)^2 + \mu' (u_{x_k}^k)^2.$$

We consider the initial boundary value problem of (1.1) in the region $t > 0$, $x \in \Omega$. The boundary condition is supposed

$$(1.2) \quad u \Big|_{\partial\Omega} = u \Big|_{\infty} = 0, \quad \theta \Big|_{\partial\Omega} = \theta \Big|_{\infty} = \bar{\theta}, \quad t > 0,$$

or

$$(1.3) \quad u \Big|_{\partial\Omega} = u \Big|_{\infty} = 0, \quad \frac{\partial \theta}{\partial n} \Big|_{\partial\Omega} = \frac{\partial \theta}{\partial n} \Big|_{\infty} = 0, \quad t > 0.$$

The initial condition is given by

$$(1.4) \quad (\rho, u, \theta)(0, x) = (\rho_0, u_0, \theta_0)(x), \quad x \in \Omega.$$

The local existence theorem for the initial boundary value problem (1.1)-(1.4) is proved by Tani [10] under full generality. Here we want to solve the problem (1.1)-(1.4) globally in time under the following assumptions.

A.1. The domain Ω is the half space $\mathbb{R}_+^3 = \{x \in \mathbb{R}^3, x_3 > 0\}$ or an exterior domain of any bounded region with smooth boundary. Here we note that the initial (-boundary) value problems on the whole space and on the interior domain are solved globally in time in [6], [7] and [8].

A.2. μ, μ', κ, p and c_v are smooth functions of $\rho, \theta > 0$, and $\mu, \kappa, c_v, p, p_\rho, p_\theta > 0$, $\mu' + \frac{2}{3}\mu > 0$.

A.3. The external force f is given by the potential $\phi(x) \in H^4(\Omega)$,

$$(1.5) \quad f^i = -\phi_{,x_i}, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \quad x \in \Omega,$$

where and in what follows we use the Sobolev space

$$H^k(\Omega) = \{f \in L_2(\Omega), D^k f = \{\partial^\alpha f / \partial x_1^{\alpha_1} \partial x_2^{\alpha_2} \partial x_3^{\alpha_3}, |\alpha| = k\} \in L_2(\Omega), 1 \leq k \leq l\}$$

with the norm $\|f\|_k = \left(\sum_{|\alpha|=0}^k \int_\Omega |D^\alpha f|^2 dx \right)^{1/2}$.

A.4. The initial data are smooth functions close to a constant state $(\bar{\rho}, 0, \bar{\theta})$, where

$\bar{\rho}$ and $\bar{\theta}$ (also appeared in (1.2)) are any positive constants, i.e.,

$$(1.6) \quad \begin{aligned} \rho_0 - \bar{\rho}, u_0, \theta_0 - \bar{\theta} &\in H^3(\Omega) \text{ and} \\ \|\rho_0 - \bar{\rho}, u_0, \theta_0 - \bar{\theta}\|_3 &\text{ is small.} \end{aligned}$$

A.5. The compatibility condition on the initial and boundary data is satisfied as follows:

$$(1.7) \quad \begin{aligned} u_0|_{\partial\Omega} &= 0, \quad \theta_0|_{\partial\Omega} = \bar{\theta} \\ -\frac{p_{0,x_1}}{\rho_0} + \frac{1}{\rho_0} \{ \mu_0(u_{0,x_j}^i + u_{0,x_i}^j) + \mu_0^i u_{0,x_k}^k \delta^{ij} \}_{x_j} &= \phi_{,x_i}|_{\partial\Omega} \\ -\frac{\theta_0(p_\theta)_0}{\rho_0(c_v)_0} u_{0,x_j}^j + \frac{1}{\rho_0(c_v)_0} \{ (\kappa_0 \theta_{0,x_j})_{x_j} + \eta_0 \} &= 0, \end{aligned}$$

where we used the notation $p_0 = p(\rho_0, \theta_0)$ etc. In the case of Neumann condition (1.3) for θ we need necessary change of compatibility condition.

We use the following notations for the function spaces:

$C^0(\bar{\Omega})$: Banach space of bounded continuous function on $\bar{\Omega}$,

$C^k(\bar{\Omega}) = \{f \in C^0(\bar{\Omega}), D^k f \in C^0(\bar{\Omega}), 1 \leq k \leq l\}$,

$C^k(t_1, t_2; B) = \{u(t) : l\text{-times continuously differentiable function of}$

$t \in [t_1, t_2]$ with values in a Banach space B , where the norm is given by

$$\max_{0 \leq k \leq l} \sup_{t_1 \leq t \leq t_2} \|(\frac{\partial}{\partial t})^k u(t, \cdot)\|_B,$$

$L_2(t_1, t_2; B) = \{u(t) : L_2\text{-function of } t \in [t_1, t_2] \text{ with values in } B, \text{ where the}$

norm is given by $(\int_{t_1}^{t_2} \|u(t, \cdot)\|_B^2 dt)^{1/2}\}$.

The stationary solution $(\bar{\rho}, \bar{u}, \bar{\theta})(x)$ of (1.1)-(1.3) in a neighborhood of $(\bar{\rho}, 0, \bar{\theta})$ in $H^2(\Omega)^3$ has the form (cf. lemma 2.1)

$$(1.8) \quad \int_{\bar{\rho}}^{\bar{\rho}(x)} \frac{p(\eta, \bar{\theta})}{\eta} d\eta + \bar{\theta}(x) = 0, \quad \bar{u} = 0, \quad \bar{\theta} = \bar{\theta}.$$

We can state the main

Theorem 1.1. Under the assumptions A.1 ~ A.5 there exists a constant $\varepsilon > 0$ such that

if $\|\rho_0 - \bar{\rho}, u_0, \theta_0 - \bar{\theta}\|_3 + \|\phi\|_4 < \varepsilon$,

then the initial boundary value problem (1.1)-(1.4) has a unique solution (ρ, u, θ)

globally in time and a unique stationary state $(\bar{\rho}, 0, \bar{\theta})$ which satisfy

$$(1.9) \quad \rho - \bar{\rho} \in C^0(0, \infty; H^3(\Omega)) \cap C^1(0, \infty; H^2(\Omega))$$

$$u, \theta - \bar{\theta} \in C^0(0, \infty; H^3(\Omega)) \cap C^1(0, \infty; H^1(\Omega))$$

and

$$(1.10) \quad \|\rho - \bar{\rho}, u, \theta - \bar{\theta}(t)\|_{C^0(\bar{\Omega})} \rightarrow 0 \text{ as } t \rightarrow \infty.$$

The theorem is proved by the energy method which is similar to [6], [7], [8], but it requires the estimates valid in the half space and in the exterior domain. We note that the solution decays as in (1.10), but the decay rate is not known, cf. [6], [7], [8]. In

the following we only mention the arguments for the Dirichlet boundary condition (1.2), because the Neumann boundary condition (1.3) for θ can be treated similarly.

§2. STATIONARY SOLUTION

Let us write the equations and conditions for the stationary solution $(\tilde{\rho}, \tilde{u}, \tilde{\theta})$:

$$(2.1) \quad (\tilde{\rho} u^j)_{x_j} = 0,$$

$$(2.2) \quad \tilde{\rho} u^j_{x_j} + \tilde{p}_{x_i} + \tilde{\rho} \theta_{x_i} - (\tilde{u} u^1_{x_j} + \tilde{u}^1_{x_i}) + \tilde{u}^1 u^*_{x_k} \delta^{ij}_{x_j} = 0, \quad i = 1, 2, 3,$$

$$(2.3) \quad \tilde{\rho} C_v u^j \tilde{\theta}_{x_j} + \tilde{\theta} \tilde{\rho} u^j_{x_j} - (\tilde{\kappa} \tilde{\theta}_{x_j})_{x_j} - \tilde{q} = 0,$$

$$(2.4) \quad \tilde{u}|_{\partial\Omega} = \tilde{u}|_{\infty} = 0, \quad \tilde{\theta}|_{\partial\Omega} = \tilde{\theta}|_{\infty} = \bar{\theta}, \quad \tilde{\rho}|_{\infty} = \bar{\rho},$$

where $\tilde{p} = p(\tilde{\rho}, \tilde{\theta})$ etc. The stationary problem (2.1)-(2.4) has a unique solution as

Lemma 2.1. Under the assumptions A.1 ~ A.3 there exist positive constant ε and C such that if $\|\theta\|_2 < \varepsilon$, $l = 3$ or 4 , the problem (2.1)-(2.4) has a unique solution $(\tilde{\rho}(x), 0, \tilde{\theta})$ in a small neighborhood of $(\bar{\rho}, 0, \bar{\theta})$ in $(H^2)^3$ satisfying

$$(2.5) \quad \|\tilde{\rho} - \bar{\rho}\|_2 < C \|\theta\|_2, \quad l = 3 \text{ or } 4 \text{ respectively,}$$

where $\tilde{\rho}(x)$ is determined by (1.8), i.e.,

$$(2.6) \quad \int_{\bar{\rho}}^{\tilde{\rho}(x)} \frac{p_{\rho}(\eta, \bar{\theta})}{\eta} d\eta + \theta(x) = 0$$

Proof. Since we consider a small neighborhood of $(\bar{\rho}, 0, \bar{\theta})$ in $(H^2)^3$, by Sobolev's lemma we may suppose $|\tilde{\rho} - \bar{\rho}|, |\tilde{u}|, |\tilde{\theta} - \bar{\theta}| < \frac{1}{2} \min(\bar{\rho}, \bar{\theta})$. Then we can estimate the equalities:

$$\int [2.1] \times \int_{\bar{\rho}}^{\tilde{\rho}} \frac{p_{\rho}(\eta, \bar{\theta})}{\eta} d\eta dx = 0,$$

$$(2.7) \quad \int [2.2]^1 \times \tilde{u}^1 dx = 0,$$

$$\int [2.3] \times (\tilde{\theta} - \bar{\theta}) dx = 0,$$

where $[2.1]$, $[2.2]^1$ and $[2.3]$ denote the terms on the left hand side of (2.1), (2.2)¹ and

(2.3) respectively. Take the sum of (2.7) and integrate it by parts using the mean value theorem and lemma 4.1. We obtain the inequality:

$$\begin{aligned} \|D\tilde{u}\|^2 + \|D\tilde{\theta}\|^2 &\leq C(\|D\tilde{\rho}\| + \|\tilde{u}\|_1 + \|\tilde{\theta} - \bar{\theta}\|_{C^0} + \\ &+ \|\tilde{\theta} - \bar{\theta}\|)(\|D\tilde{u}\|^2 + \|D\tilde{\theta}\|^2). \end{aligned}$$

Therefore if $\|D\tilde{\rho}\|$, $\|\tilde{u}\|_1$, $\|\tilde{\theta} - \bar{\theta}\|_2$ is small, we can conclude

$$(2.8) \quad \tilde{u} = 0, \quad \tilde{\theta} = \bar{\theta}.$$

If we substitute (2.8) in (2.2), we have

$$\left\{ \int_{\bar{\rho}}^{\tilde{\rho}} \frac{\rho(\eta, \bar{\theta})}{\eta} d\eta + \Phi \right\}_{x_1} = 0$$

which implies (2.6).

3. LOCAL AND GLOBAL EXISTENCE

Let us rewrite the problem (1.1), (1.2) by the change of variables

$(\rho, u, \theta) \mapsto (\rho + \tilde{\rho}, u, \theta + \tilde{\theta})$ using (2.6) as follows:

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \rho_t + u^j \rho_{x_j} + (\rho + \tilde{\rho}) u_{x_j}^j + \tilde{\rho}_{x_j} u^j = 0, \\
 & u_t^i + u^j u_{x_j}^i - \frac{1}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \{ \mu (u_{x_j}^i + u_{x_i}^j) + \mu' u_{x_k}^k \delta^{ij} \}_{x_j} + \\
 & + \frac{p_\rho}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \rho_{x_i} + \frac{p_\theta}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \theta_{x_i} = \left(\frac{\tilde{\rho}_\rho (\rho + \tilde{\rho}, \theta + \tilde{\theta})}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) p_\rho (\tilde{\rho}, \tilde{\theta})} - 1 \right) \theta_{x_i}, \\
 & \theta_t + u^j \theta_{x_j} + \frac{(\theta + \tilde{\theta}) p_\theta}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) c_\theta} u_{x_j}^j = \frac{1}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) c_\theta} \{ (\kappa \theta_{x_j})_{x_j} + \eta \}.
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{3.1}$$

$$(u, \theta) \Big|_{\partial \Omega} = (u, \theta) \Big|_{\infty} = 0. \tag{3.2}$$

$$(\rho, u, \theta)(0, x) = (\rho_0, u_0, \theta_0)(x). \tag{3.3}$$

Further we rewrite the problem (3.1)-(3.3) as follows:

$$L_u^0(\rho, u) \equiv \rho_t + u^j \rho_{x_j} + \tilde{\rho}_{x_j} u^j = f^0, \tag{3.4}^0$$

$$L^i(\rho, u, \theta) \equiv u_t^i - \hat{\mu} u_{x_j x_j}^i - (\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}') u_{x_i x_j}^j + p_1 \rho_{x_i} + p_2 \theta_{x_i} = f^i, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \tag{3.4}^i$$

$$L^4(u, \theta) \equiv \theta_t - \hat{\kappa} \theta_{x_j x_j} + p_3 u_{x_j}^j = f^4. \tag{3.4}^4$$

$$(u, \theta) \Big|_{\partial \Omega} = (u, \theta) \Big|_{\infty} = 0, \tag{3.5}$$

$$(\rho, u, \theta)(0) = (\rho_0, u_0, \theta_0),$$

where we denote the constant for the function g of ρ and θ by $\bar{g} = g(\tilde{\rho}, \tilde{\theta})$, and also

$\hat{\mu} = \bar{\mu}/\bar{\rho}$, $\hat{\mu}' = \bar{\mu}'/\bar{\rho}$, $\hat{\kappa} = \bar{\kappa}/\bar{\rho} \bar{c}_\theta$, $p_1 = \bar{p}_\rho/\bar{\rho}$, $p_2 = \bar{p}_\theta/\bar{\rho}$ and $p_3 = \bar{\theta}_\rho \bar{\rho}/\bar{\rho} \bar{c}_\theta$. The terms on

the right hand side of equations (3.4) are nonlinear and have the form:

 &\quad + \left(\frac{\mu + \mu^i}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} - \hat{\mu} - \hat{\mu}^i \right) u_{x_i x_j}^j + \frac{1}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \{ \mu_{x_j} (u_{x_j}^i + u_{x_i}^j) \\
 &\quad + \mu_{x_j}^i u_{x_k}^k \delta^{ij} \} + \left(p_1 - \frac{p \rho}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \right) \rho_{x_i} + \left(p_2 - \frac{p \theta}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \right) \theta_{x_i} \\
 &\quad + \left(\frac{\tilde{\rho} p_\rho (\rho + \tilde{\rho}, \theta + \bar{\theta})}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) p_\rho(\tilde{\rho}, \bar{\theta})} - 1 \right) \theta_{x_i}, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \\
 f^4(\rho, u, \theta) &\equiv -u^j \theta_{x_j} + \left(\frac{\kappa}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) c_\gamma} - \hat{\kappa} \right) \theta_{x_j x_j} \\
 &\quad + \left(p_3 - \frac{(\theta + \bar{\theta}) p_\theta}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) c_\gamma} \right) u_{x_j}^j + \frac{1}{(\rho + \tilde{\rho}) c_\gamma} (\kappa_{x_j} \theta_{x_j} + \Psi).
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{3.6}$$

Next we choose a constant E_0 by use of Sobolev's lemma such that

$$\|g\|_{C^0} < \frac{1}{2} \min(\bar{\rho}, \bar{\theta}) \quad \text{for any } g \in H^2, \|g\|_2 < E_0.$$

Then the solution of (3.1)-(3.3) is sought in the set of functions $X(0, \infty; E)$ for some

$E < E_0$, where for $0 < t_1 < t_2 < \infty$, we define

$$X(t_1, t_2; E) = \{(\rho, u, \theta) :$$

$$\rho \in C(t_1, t_2; H^3), \quad D\rho \in L_2(t_1, t_2; H^2),$$

$$\rho_t \in C(t_1, t_2; H^2) \cap L_2(t_1, t_2; H^2),$$

$$u, \theta \in C(t_1, t_2; H^3 \cap H^1), \quad D(u, \theta) \in L_2(t_1, t_2; H^3),$$

$$u_t, \theta_t \in C(t_1, t_2; H^1) \cap L_2(t_1, t_2; H^2) \quad \text{and} \quad N(t_1, t_2) < E \},$$

where

$$(3.8) \quad \begin{aligned} N^2(t_1, t_2) \equiv & \sup_{t_1 \leq t \leq t_2} \|\rho, u, \theta(t)\|_3^2 + \|\rho_t(t)\|_2^2 + \|u_t, \theta_t(t)\|_1^2 + \\ & + \int_{t_1}^{t_2} \|\rho(s)\|_2^2 + \|\rho_t(s)\|_2^2 + \|(u, \theta)(s)\|_3^2 + \|u_t, \theta_t(s)\|_2^2 ds. \end{aligned}$$

Here and in what follows we do not write Ω in $H^k(\Omega)$ and $L_2(\Omega)$.

We will obtain the global solution by a combination of a local existence theorem and some a priori estimates for the solution in X , namely that for the norm N .

Proposition 3.1. (local existence)

Suppose the problem (3.1)-(3.3) has a unique solution $(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(0, h; E_0)$ for some $h > 0$ and consider the problem (3.1)-(3.3) for $t > h$. Then there exist positive constants τ, ϵ_0 and $C_0(\epsilon_0 \sqrt{1 + C_0^2} < E_0)$ independent of h such that if $N(h, h)$, $\|\phi\|_4 < \epsilon_0$, the problem has a unique solution

$$(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(h, h + \tau; C_0 N(h, h)).$$

The proof is the same as that for the interior problem in [8] and is omitted. Although the local existence theorem by Tani [10] is more general, we need it in the form of Proposition 3.1 to extend the solution globally in time by use of L_2 energy method.

Proposition 3.2. (a priori estimates)

Suppose the problem (3.1)-(3.3) has a solution $(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(0, h; E_0)$ for given $h > 0$. Then there exist positive constants ϵ_1 and C_1 ($\epsilon_1 < \epsilon_0$, $\epsilon_1 C_1 < E_0$) which are independent of h such that if $N(0, h)$, $\|\phi\|_4 < \epsilon_1$, it holds

$$N(0, h) < C_1 N(0, 0).$$

If Proposition 3.1 and 3.2 are known, the global existence of unique solution can be proved as follows: Choose the initial data (ρ_0, u_0, θ_0) and the potential function ϕ so small that it holds

$$N(0, 0) < \min\{\epsilon_0, \epsilon_1/C_0, \epsilon_1/C_1 \sqrt{1 + C_0^2}\} \text{ and } \|\phi\|_4 < \epsilon_1.$$

Then Proposition 3.1 with $h = 0$ gives a local solution $(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(0, \tau; C_0 N(0, 0))$. Since $C_0 N(0, 0) < \epsilon_1 < \epsilon_0$, Proposition 3.2 with $h = \tau$ implies $N(0, \tau) < C_1 N(0, 0)$. Then

Proposition 3.1 with $h = \tau$ implies the existence of solution

$$(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(\tau, 2\tau; C_0 N(\tau, \tau)), \in X(0, 2\tau; \sqrt{1 + C_0^2} N(0, \tau)) .$$

Hence, since $\sqrt{1 + C_0^2} N(0, \tau) \leq C_1 \sqrt{1 + C_0^2} N(0, 0) \leq \epsilon_1$, Proposition 3.2 with $h = 2\tau$ gives $N(0, 2\tau) \leq C_1 N(0, 0)$, and Proposition 3.1 with $h = 2\tau$ gives

$$(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(2\tau, 3\tau; C_0 N(2\tau, 2\tau)), \in X(0, 3\tau; \sqrt{1 + C_0^2} N(0, 2\tau)) .$$

Repetition of this process yields

Proposition 3.3. (global existence)

There exist positive constants ϵ and $C(\infty < E_0)$ such that if $N(0, 0)$, $\| \theta \|_4 \leq \epsilon$, then the initial boundary value problem (3.1)-(3.3) has a unique solution

$$(\rho, u, \theta) \in X(0, \infty; CN(0, 0)) .$$

§4. A PRIORI ESTIMATES

First we recall some inequalities of Sobolev type.

Lemma 4.1.

(i) Let Ω be any domain with smooth boundary. It holds

$$(4.1) \quad \begin{aligned} \|f\|_{C^\sigma(\Omega)} &\leq C \|f\|_{H^2(\Omega)}, \quad 0 \leq \sigma < 1/2, \\ \|f\|_{L_p(\Omega)} &\leq C \|f\|_{H^1(\Omega)}, \quad 2 \leq p \leq 6. \end{aligned}$$

(ii) Let Ω be the whole space $\mathbb{R}^3$, the half space $\mathbb{R}_+^3$, or the exterior domain of a bounded region with smooth boundary. It holds

$$(4.2) \quad \begin{aligned} \|f\|_{L_6(\Omega)} &\leq C \|Df\|_{L_2(\Omega)}, \\ \|f\|_{L_2(\Omega')} &\leq C \|Df\|_{L_2(\Omega)}, \end{aligned}$$

where Ω' is any bounded subregion of Ω .

Proof. See for example [3], [4].

Next we note some estimates of elliptic system of equations for our domain, when we regard equation (3.4)ⁱ, $i = 1, \dots, 4$, as elliptic with respect to x variables, i.e.,

$$(4.3) \quad \begin{aligned} \hat{\mu} u_{x_j x_j}^i + (\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}') u_{x_i x_j}^j &= u_t^i + p_1 p_{x_i} + p_2 \theta_{x_i} - f^i, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \\ \hat{\kappa} \theta_{x_j x_j} &= \theta_t + p_3 u_{x_j}^j - f^4, \\ u|_{\partial\Omega} = u|_{\infty} = \theta|_{\partial\Omega} = \theta|_{\infty} &= 0. \end{aligned}$$

Lemma 4.2. Let Ω be the half space or any exterior domain. We have for $k = 2, 3$

The first estimate is well known, e.g. [1]. The last L_2 norm is contained on the right hand side because of the unboundedness of our domain. The second one is given in [5]. It contains the L_2 norm of the first derivative as the last term on the right hand side and is stronger than that containing the L_2 norm of the function itself such as (4.4).

The last estimate for an elliptic system concerns Stokes equation in Ω which comes from (3.4)¹, $i = 0, \dots, 4$.

where the last term on the right hand side is necessary in the case of exterior domain.

Proof. In the case of half space $\Omega = \mathbb{R}_+^3$ lemma is proved by Solonnikov [9] and Cattabriga [2], where the definition of the space $H^{k-1/2}(\partial\Omega)$ is also given. In the case of exterior domains Finn [3] and Heywood [4] obtain lemma provided $h = 0$. Thus we only need a slight improvement for $h \neq 0$. Let us extend the function $h \in H^1(\Omega)$ to a function $\tilde{h} \in H^1(\mathbb{R}^3)$ with the estimate

where the boundary of Ω' contains $\partial\Omega$.

Now we begin to obtain the energy estimate for solution of equation (3.4)¹,

(4.9) \quad A_1 &= \int \frac{P_1}{\rho} \rho_t (f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j})_t + u_t^i f_t^i + \frac{P_2}{P_3} \theta_t f_t^4 dx, \\
\frac{d\rho}{dt} &\equiv \rho_t + u^j \rho_{x_j} = f^0 - \frac{P_1}{\rho} u^j_{x_j}.
\end{aligned}$$

We have also for $k = 0$ and 1

$$\begin{aligned}
& \|D_t^k(u, \theta)(t)\|^2 + \int_0^t \|D_t^{k+1}(\rho, u, \theta)(s)\|^2 ds \\
(4.10) \quad & < C\{\|D_t^k(u, \theta)(0)\|^2 + \|D_t^k \rho(0)\|^2 + \|D_t^k \rho(t)\|^2 \\
& + \int_0^t \|D_t^k(u, \theta)(s)\|^2 + \|D_t^k(f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j})\|^2 + \|D_t^k f(s)\|^2 ds\}.
\end{aligned}$$

Proof. Compute the integral

where A_0 is defined by (4.9). If we use the notation $d\rho/dt$ in (4.9), we can obtain (4.8), $k = 0$ from this equality. The time derivative can be treated similarly, because it has the same boundary conditions. Next compute the integral

& + c \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} |D(u, \theta)(s)|^2 + |\tilde{f}|^2 dx dt,
\end{aligned}$$

where $\tilde{f} = (f^0 - u_{x_j}^j, f^1, f^2, f^3, f^4)$. If we use Schwarz inequality for the term $\rho u_{x_j}^j$, we obtain (4.10), $l = 0$. The estimate (4.10), $l = 1$ is obtained similarly.

In the following we first treat the case of half space $\Omega = \mathbb{R}_+^3$ which is simpler to explain the way of obtaining estimates than that for exterior domains treated later.

Since the tangential derivatives of the solution of (3.4) satisfy the same boundary conditions (3.5), we can obtain the estimates for these similarly to the above lemma 4.4. Let us denote the tangential derivatives by $\partial = (\partial_{x_1}, \partial_{x_2})$ and integrate the equality for each $k = 1, 2, 3$ by use of integration by parts

$$+ \hat{\mu} (u_{x_1 x_1}^3 + u_{x_2 x_2}^3) + \hat{\mu}' (u_{x_1}^1 + u_{x_2}^2)_{x_3},$$

where we note the second derivatives of u at the last two terms on the right hand side contain one tangential derivative. Multiply (4.14) by ρ_{x_3} and $(d\rho/dt)_{x_3}$ respectively and integrate them respectively. We obtain after integration by parts

$$+ \int_0^t \int \{-u_t^3 - p_2 \theta_{x_3} + \hat{\mu} (u_{x_1 x_1}^3 + u_{x_2 x_2}^3 + u_{x_1}^1 + u_{x_2}^2)_{x_3} +$$

$$+ \left(\frac{2\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} f_{x_3}^0 + f^3\right) \rho_{x_3} dx dt$$

$$< \frac{p_1}{2} \int_0^t \int \rho_{x_3}^2 dx dt + c(\|D\rho(0)\|^2 + \int_0^t \|B_{0,0}\| dt +$$

$$+ \int_0^t \|u_t\|^2 + \|D\partial u\|^2 + \|D\theta\|^2 + \|Df^0\|^2 + \|f^3\|^2 ds,$$

and

$$\begin{aligned}
& \int_0^t \int \frac{\hat{u} + \hat{u}'}{\bar{\rho}} \left\{ \left(\frac{d\rho}{dt} \right)_{x_3} \right\}^2 dx dt + \frac{p_1}{2} \int \rho_{x_3}^2 dx \\
&= \frac{p_1}{2} \int \rho_{0,x_3}^2 dx + \int_0^t \int \frac{p_1}{2} (-u_{x_3}^1 \rho_{x_3} + u_{x_3}^3 \rho_{x_3}) \rho_{x_3} dx dt \\
&+ \int_0^t \int \frac{\hat{u} + \hat{u}'}{\bar{\rho}} \left(\frac{d\rho}{dt} \right)_{x_3} \{ -u_t^3 - p_2 \theta_{x_3} + \hat{u} (u_{x_1}^3 x_1 + u_{x_2}^3 x_2 + u_{x_1}^1 x_3 + u_{x_2}^2 x_3) \\
&\quad + \frac{\hat{u} + \hat{u}'}{\bar{\rho}} \varepsilon_{x_3}^0 + \varepsilon^3 \} dx dt \\
&\leq \frac{\hat{u} + \hat{u}'}{2\bar{\rho}} \int_0^t \int \left(\frac{d\rho}{dt} \right)_{x_3}^2 dx dt + C \{ \|D\rho(0)\|^2 + \int_0^t \|B_{0,0}\| dt \\
&\quad + \int_0^t \|u_t\|^2 + \|D\theta\|^2 + \|D\partial u\|^2 + \|D\varepsilon^0\|^2 + \|\varepsilon^3\|^2 dx dt \}
\end{aligned}$$

respectively. Thus we have obtained the following

and here the summation is not taken for k and l .

Proof. For $k + l = 1$ and 2 we differentiate the equation (4.14) by $\partial^k \partial_3^l$ and multiply it by $\partial^k \partial_3^{l+1} \rho$ and $\partial^k \partial_3^{l+1} \frac{d\rho}{dt}$ respectively. (xiv) By lemma 4.7, $k = 0$, $l = 1$ and by (4.29), (4.30), (4.32) and (4.22) we have

$$(4.33) \quad \int_0^t \|D^3 u(s)\|^2 + \|D^2 \rho(s)\|^2 ds < \dots$$

(xv) Then by the equation (3.4)

$$(4.34) \quad \|\rho_t(t)\|_1^2 + \int_0^t \|\rho_t(s)\|_1^2 ds < \dots + \|f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}\|_1^2 + \int_0^t \|f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}(s)\|_1^2 ds.$$

Thus if we sum (4.20)-(4.34), we arrive at the H^2 energy estimate (4.19).

To elevate the differentiability once to obtain the estimate of norm $N(0,t)$ we can repeat the above argument beginning from lemma 4.4, $k = 1$ and by use of lemma 4.2, $k = 3$, lemma 4.5, $k = 3$, lemma 4.6, $k + l = 2$ and lemma 4.7, $k + l = 2$. Therefore we arrive at the estimate for $N(0,t)$.

$$\begin{aligned} N(0,t)^2 &\leq \|\rho, u, \theta(t)\|_3^2 + \|\rho_t(t)\|_2^2 + \|u_t, \theta_t(t)\|_1^2 \\ &\quad + \int_0^t \|\rho_t, D\rho(s)\|_2^2 + \|u_t, \theta_t(s)\|_2^2 + \|D(u, \theta)(s)\|_3^2 ds \\ (4.35) \quad &\leq C \{ \|\rho, u, \theta(0)\|_3^2 + \sup_{0 \leq s \leq t} (\|f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}(s)\|_2^2, \|f(s)\|_1^2 \\ &\quad + \int_0^t \|f^0(s)\|_3^2 + \|f(s)\|_2^2 + \|f_t(s)\|^2 + \|(u^j \rho_{x_j})_t\|^2 + \|u^j \rho_{x_j}\|_2^2 \\ &\quad + \sum_{k=0}^4 |A_k| + \sum_{k+l=0}^2 |B_{k,l}| ds \}. \end{aligned}$$

Last we have to show

Lemma 4.8.

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \sup_{0 \leq s \leq t} \{f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}(s)\|_2^2, \|f(s)\|_1^2\} + \int_0^t \|f^0(s)\|_3^2 + \\
 (4.36) \quad & + \|f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}\|_t(s)^2 + \|f_t(s)\|^2 + \|\tilde{f}(s)\|_2^2 + \sum_{k=0}^4 |A_k| + \sum_{k+l=0}^2 |B_{k,l}| ds \\
 & \leq C_2(N(0,t) + \|\Phi\|_4)N^2(0,t).
 \end{aligned}$$

It is proved by use of lemma 4.1 and integration by parts. We show only the term A_0 and omit the proof of the other terms which can be treated similarly. Let us recall (4.9) and compute the following

 & \leq \|D\rho\| \{ \|\bar{\rho} - \tilde{\rho}\|_{L_3} \|u\|_{L_6} + \|\rho\|_{L_3} \|u\|_{L_6} \} \\
 & \leq C \|D\rho\| \|Du\| \{ \|\Phi\|_3 + \|\rho\|_1 \} \leq C N(0,t)^2 \{ \|\Phi\|_3 + N(0,t) \}. \\
 & \left| \int u^i \left\{ \left(\frac{\mu}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} - \hat{\mu} \right) u_{x_j x_j}^i + \frac{1}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \mu_{x_j} u_{x_j}^i \right\} dx \right| \\
 & \leq \int |u_{x_j}^i| \left| \left(\frac{\mu}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} - \hat{\mu} \right) u_{x_j}^i \right| + |u^i| \left| \left(\frac{1}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \right)_{x_j} u_{x_j}^i \right| dx \\
 & \leq \left| \frac{\mu}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} - \hat{\mu} \right|_0 \|Du\|^2 + \left\| \left(\frac{1}{\rho + \tilde{\rho}} \right)_{x_j} \right\|_{L_3} \|u\|_{L_6} \|Du\| \\
 & \leq C N(0,t)^2 \{ \|\Phi\|_3 + N(0,t) \}.
 \end{aligned}$$

The remaining terms in A_0 can be treated in the same way as above.

Finally let us turn to the case of exterior domains. In this case, since we cannot generally designate a coordinate system all over Ω the directions of which are consistent with the normal and tangential directions on the boundary $\partial\Omega$ as in the case of half space, we have to modify the lemmas 4.5 through 4.7. To do that we shall separate the estimates of the solution into that over the region away from the boundary $\partial\Omega$ and that near the boundary $\partial\Omega$. Let $\chi_0(x)$ be any fixed cut-off function in $C^\infty(\Omega)$ such that support $\chi_0 \subset \Omega$ and $\chi_0 \equiv 1$ outside of a bounded region Ω' . Then we have the following as the estimate on the region away from the boundary.

Lemma 4.9. For $k = 1, 2, 3$, it holds that

 & \| \chi_0 D^k(\rho, u)(t) \|^2 + \int_0^t \| \chi_0 D^{k+1} u(s) \|^2 + \| \chi_0 D^k \frac{d\rho}{dt}(s) \|^2 ds \\
 (4.38) \quad & < C \{ \| D^k(\rho, u)(0) \|^2 + \int_0^t \| D^{k-1} f \|^2 + \| D^k f^0 \|^2 \\
 & + \| \chi_0 D^k \rho \|^2 + \| D(u, \theta) \|^2_{k-1} + |A'_{k+1}| ds \} ,
 \end{aligned}$$

where

$$A'_{k+1} = \int_{\Omega} \frac{p_1}{\bar{\rho}} \chi_0^2 (D^k \rho) D^k (f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}) dx ,$$

and here the summation is not taken for k .

Proof. Compute the integral

$$\begin{aligned} & \int_{\Omega} \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{2\hat{\rho}} \chi_0^2 |D\rho|^2 + \chi_0^2 u^i \rho_{x_i} dx \Big|_0^t + \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} p_1 \chi_0^2 |D\rho|^2 dx ds \\ &= \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} -2\hat{\mu} \chi_0 \chi_{0,x_j} u_{x_j}^i \rho_{x_i} + 2\hat{\mu} \chi_0 \chi_{0,x_i} u_{x_j}^i \rho_{x_j} + \chi_0^2 f^i \rho_{x_i} \\ &- p_2 \chi_0^2 \rho_{x_i} \theta_{x_i} + (2\chi_0 \chi_{0,x_i} u^i + \chi_0^2 u_{x_j}^j) (u_{x_j}^j - f^0 + \bar{\rho} u_{x_j}^j) dx + A_2' ds. \end{aligned}$$

Since the support of $D\chi_0$ is contained in Ω' , we can make use of (4.2) and consequently Schwarz inequality gives (4.37), $k = 1$. The other cases $k = 2, 3$, are obtained similarly. To prove (4.38), compute the integral

$$\int_0^t \int_{\Omega} \chi_0^2 \frac{p_1}{\hat{\rho}} (D\rho) D(L^0 - f^0) + \chi_0^2 (Du^i) D(L^i - f^i) dx ds = 0$$

Integration by parts gives

$$\begin{aligned} & \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} \chi_0^2 \frac{p_1}{\hat{\rho}} |D\rho|^2 + \chi_0^2 |Du|^2 dx \Big|_0^t + \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} \chi_0^2 \hat{\mu} |D^2 u|^2 + \chi_0^2 (\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}') |Du_{x_j}^j|^2 dx ds \\ &= \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} \chi_0^2 p_2 (Du_{x_i}^i) D\theta + 2\chi_0 \chi_{0,x_i} p_2 (Du^i) D\theta \\ &+ 2\chi_0 \chi_{0,x_i} p_1 (Du^i) D\rho - \chi_0^2 f^i u_{x_j}^j - 2\chi_0 \chi_{0,x_j} f^i u_{x_j}^i dx + A_2' ds, \end{aligned}$$

which implies (4.38), $k = 1$ after using Schwarz inequality. The cases $k = 2, 3$ are obtained similarly.

Next let us establish the estimates near the boundary. To do that we choose a finite number of bounded open sets $\{O_j\}_{j=1}^N$ in $\mathbb{R}^3$ such that

$$\bigcup_{j=1}^N O_j \supset \partial\Omega,$$

and in each set O_j we choose local coordinates (ψ, ϕ, r) as follows;

(i) the boundary $O_j \cap \partial\Omega$ is the image of smooth functions $y^i = y^i(\psi, \phi)$ satisfying (ex., take the local geodesic polar coordinate)

$$(4.39) \quad |y_\psi| = 1, \quad y_\psi^i y_\phi^i = 0, \quad |y_\phi| > \delta > 0,$$

where δ is some positive constant independent of $j = 1, \dots, N$.

(ii) any x in O_j is represented by

$$(4.40) \quad x^i = x^i(\psi, \phi, r) = r n^i(\psi, \phi) + y^i(\psi, \phi),$$

where $n^i(\psi, \phi)$ represents the external unit normal vector at the point of the boundary coordinated (ψ, ϕ) . Here and in what follows we omit the suffix j for simplicity. Let us define the unit vectors e_1^i and e_2^i by $e_1^i = y_\psi^i$ and $e_2^i = y_\phi^i / |y_\phi|$. Then Frenet-Serret's formula gives that there exist smooth functions $(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \alpha', \beta', \gamma')$ of (ψ, ϕ) satisfying

$$\frac{\partial}{\partial \psi} \begin{pmatrix} e_1^i \\ e_2^i \\ n^i \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 0 & -\gamma & -\alpha \\ \gamma & 0 & -\beta \\ \alpha & \beta & 0 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} e_1^i \\ e_2^i \\ n^i \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\frac{\partial}{\partial \phi} \begin{pmatrix} e_1^i \\ e_2^i \\ n^i \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 0 & -\gamma' & -\alpha' \\ \gamma' & 0 & -\beta' \\ \alpha' & \beta' & 0 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} e_1^i \\ e_2^i \\ n^i \end{pmatrix}$$

An elementary calculation shows that the Jacobian J of the transformation (4.40) is given by

$$(4.41) \quad J = |x_\psi \times x_\phi| = |y_\phi| + (\alpha |y_\phi| + \beta')r + (\alpha \beta' - \beta \alpha')r^2.$$

By (4.41) we can see the transformation (4.40) is regular choosing r small if needed.

Therefore the functions $(\psi, \phi, r)_{x_i}(x)$ make sense and is calculated as

where $A = |y_\phi| + \beta'r$, $B = -\alpha r$, $C = -\beta r$, $D = 1 + \alpha r$ and $J = AD - BC > 0$. Hence (4.42) implies

Thus in each O_j we can rewrite the equations $\{(3.4)^i\}_{i=0}^3$ in the local coordinates (ψ, ϕ, r) as follows:

$$\begin{aligned} L^0 &= \frac{d\rho}{dt} + \frac{\bar{\rho}}{J} ((Ae_1^i + Be_2^i) u_\psi^i + (Ce_1^i + De_2^i) u_\phi^i + J n^i u_r^i) = f^0, \\ L^i &= u_t^i + \frac{\hat{\mu}}{J^2} ((A^2 + B^2) u_{\psi\psi}^i + 2(AC + BD) u_{\phi\psi}^i + (C^2 + D^2) u_{\phi\phi}^i + J^2 u_{rr}^i) + \\ &\quad + \text{first order terms of } u \text{ and } \theta \\ &\quad + \frac{1}{J} (Ae_1^i + Be_2^i) \left(\frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} \frac{d\rho}{dt} + P_1 \rho \right) \psi + \frac{1}{J} (Ce_1^i + De_2^i) \left(\frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} \frac{d\rho}{dt} + P_1 \rho \right) \phi + \\ &\quad + n^i \left(\frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} \frac{d\rho}{dt} + P_1 \rho \right) r + \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} f_{x_1}^0 = f^i, \end{aligned}$$

where we note that $J^2 = (AC + BD)^2 - (A^2 + B^2)(C^2 + D^2)$. Let us denote the tangential derivatives by $\partial = (\partial_\psi, \partial_\phi)$ as before and let χ_j ($1 \leq j \leq N$) be any fixed cut-off function in $C_0^\infty(O_j)$. Estimating the integral for $k = 1, 2, 3$

$$\int_0^t \int_\Omega \chi_j^2 \frac{P_1}{\bar{\rho}} (\partial^k \rho) \partial^k (L^0 - f^0) + \chi_j^2 (\partial^k u^i) \partial^k (L^i - f^i) J d\psi d\phi dr ds = 0$$

in the similar way as in lemmas 4.5 and 4.9, we can get

Lemma 4.10. For any positive ϵ and $k = 1, 2, 3$, it holds that

$$\begin{aligned} &\| \chi_j \partial^k (\rho, u)(t) \|^2 + \int_0^t \| \chi_j \partial^k u(s) \|^2 + \| \chi_j \partial^k \frac{d\rho}{dt}(s) \|^2 ds \\ &\leq C (\| \chi_j \partial^k (\rho, u)(0) \|^2 + \int_0^t \epsilon \| D\rho \|^2_{k-1} + (1 + \epsilon^{-1}) \| D(u, \theta) \|^2_{k-1} \\ &\quad + \| f^0 \|_k^2 + \| f \|_{k-1}^2 + |A_{j,k+1}| ds), \end{aligned}$$

where $A_{j,k+1} = \int_\Omega \frac{P_1}{\bar{\rho}} \chi_j^2 (\partial^k \rho) \partial^k (f^0 - u^j \rho_{x_j}) dx$, and here the summation is not taken for k .

In order to estimate the normal derivatives we make use of the equation

$$\partial_r (L^0 - f^0) = 0 \quad \text{and} \quad n^i (L^i - f^i) = 0 \quad \text{which have the form}$$

& + \text{first order terms of } u = f_r^0, \\
(4.43) \quad & n^i u_t^i + \frac{\hat{\mu}}{J^2} \{ (A^2 + B^2) n^i u_{\psi\psi}^i + 2(AC + BD) u_{\psi\phi}^i + (C^2 + D^2) n^i u_{\phi\phi}^i + J^2 n^i u_{rr}^i \} \\
& + \text{first order terms of } u \text{ and } \theta \\
& + \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{p}} \left(\frac{dp}{dt} \right)_r + p_1 p_r = n^i f^i + \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{p}} f_r^0.
\end{aligned}$$

Eliminating $n^i u_{rr}^i$ from (4.43), we get

$$\begin{aligned}
(4.44) \quad & \frac{2\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{p}} \left(\frac{dp}{dt} \right)_r + p_1 p_r = -n^i u_t^i + \frac{1}{J^2} \{ (A^2 + B^2) n^i u_{\psi\psi}^i + 2(AC + BD) n^i u_{\psi\phi}^i + \\
& + (C^2 + D^2) n^i u_{\phi\phi}^i - J(Ae_1^i + Be_2^i) u_{\psi r}^i - J(Ce_1^i + De_2^i) u_{r\phi}^i \} + \\
& + \text{first order terms of } u \text{ and } \theta + n^i f^i + \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{p}} f_r^0.
\end{aligned}$$

If we apply $\partial^k \partial^l$ ($k + l = 0, 1, 2$) to (4.44), multiply it by $\chi_j^2 \partial^k \partial^l \left(\frac{dp}{dt} \right)_r$ and $\chi_j^2 \partial^k \partial^l p_r$ and integrate them respectively in the similar way as in lemmas 4.6 and 4.9, we can have

Lemma 4.11. For $k + l = 0, 1, 2$ it holds that

& < (C \|\rho(0)\|_{k+l}^2 + \int_0^t \|\chi_j \partial^{k+1} \partial_r^l \rho\|^2 + \|\chi_j \partial^k \partial_r^l u_t\|^2 + \\
& + \|D(u, \theta)\|_{k+l}^2 + \|f^0\|_{k+l+1}^2 + \|f\|_{k+l}^2 + |B_{j,k,l}| ds),
\end{aligned}$$

where

$$B_{j,k,l} = \int_{\Omega} \chi_j^2 (\partial^k \partial_r^{l+1} \left(\frac{dp}{dt} \right) - \partial^k \partial_r^{l+1} \rho_t) \partial^k \partial_r^{l+1} \rho dx,$$

and here the summation is not taken for k and l .

Last we have to get a lemma corresponding to lemma 4.7. Evidently the statement of lemma 4.7, $k + l = 0$ holds also for the case of exterior domains, if we add the term $\|Du\|$ on the right hand side of the inequality, (cf. lemma 4.3). Next operating $\chi_j \partial^k$, $k = 1, 2$ to Stokes equation (4.6) with (4.17) and $u|_{\partial\Omega} = 0$, we have

$$\begin{aligned} \bar{\rho}(\chi_j \partial^k u^i)_{x_1} &= \chi_j \partial^k f^0 - \chi_j \partial^k \left(\frac{dp}{dt}\right) + \bar{\rho} \chi_{j,x_1} \partial^k u^i, \\ -\hat{\mu}(\chi_j \partial^k u^i)_{x_l x_l} + p_1(\chi_j \partial^k \rho)_{x_1} &= -\chi_j \partial^k u^i_t - p_2 \chi_j \partial^k \theta_{x_1} + p_1 \chi_{j,x_1} \partial^k \rho - \hat{\mu} \chi_{j,x_l x_l} \partial^k u^i \\ (4.45) \quad &- \hat{\mu} \chi_{j,x_l} \partial^k u^i_{x_l} + \chi_j \partial^k f^i - \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} \chi_j \partial^k \left(\frac{dp}{dt}\right) + \frac{\hat{\mu} + \hat{\mu}'}{\bar{\rho}} \chi_j \partial^k f^0_{x_1}, \end{aligned}$$

$$\chi_j \partial^k u|_{\partial\Omega} = 0.$$

Thus we can apply lemma 4.3 to (4.45) and consequently we have

Combining the above lemmas 4.1-4.4 and 4.9-4.12 in the similar way as in (i)-(xv) for the half space, we can get the exactly same inequality (4.35) and the same lemma 4.8 if only replacing

$$\begin{aligned} \sum_{k=0}^4 |A_k| + \sum_{k+l=0}^2 |B_{k,l}| \\ \text{by } |A_0| + |A_1| + \sum_{k=2}^4 |A'_k| + \sum_{j=1}^N \left\{ \sum_{k=2}^4 |A_{j,k}| + \sum_{k+l=0}^2 |B_{j,k,l}| \right\}. \end{aligned}$$

Thus the proof of Theorem 1.1 is completed.

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
