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Introduction

Interest in battle fatigue and related forms of disability has been high in recent years, spurred by the data coming out of recent conflicts in the Middle East and the emergence of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) as a diagnostic category in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-III). This bibliography of battle fatigue literature was compiled by the United States Army Medical Research Unit-Europe to assist anyone interested in exploring the published literature in the field.

The majority of the references come from the years 1940-1985. Foreign language articles were included if an English translation was available. No systematic effort was made to include articles on PTSD because a comprehensive bibliography of that literature is already available. A section at the end of the bibliography lists foreign bibliographies and English language bibliographies of battle fatigue and related topics.

The references cited were obtained primarily by tracing reference lists of published articles and from the files of personnel working in the area. We particularly wish to thank the librarians of the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research and the USAREUR Resource Library for obtaining many of the articles for us.

Although efforts were made to make this bibliography as complete as possible, there are undoubtedly some articles we have overlooked. Users of this bibliography are encouraged to submit additions and corrections to the authors for inclusion in updated editions of this document.

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
