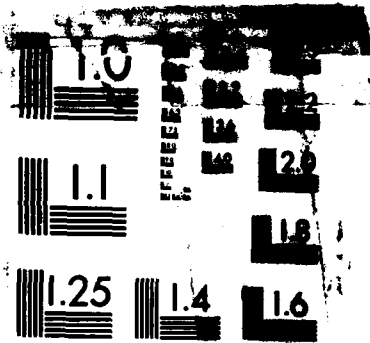

What is DTIC?

The Defense Technical Information Center (DTIC) is the central point within the Department of Defense for acquiring, storing, retrieving, and disseminating scientific and technical information. It is the centralized DoD data base for publications prepared by DoD employees, DoD contractors, and colleges and universities under DoD contract. Publications in DTIC are announced to registered DTIC users and are made available to those with an appropriate clearance and "need-to-know."

Why Should You Send A Publication to DTIC?

- Personal and professional recognition of your work. This can be either work that you have performed or work that you have had performed by a contractor.
- Publications helpful for promotion and/or awards.
- DTIC provides a method to publish information that cannot be published in the open literature. Publications in DTIC can be classified (confidential or secret), unclassified limited (distribution statements B through F or X), or unclassified unlimited (distribution statement A). Statement A publications are made available to the public through the National Technical Information Service.
- Contribution to literature in your professional area.
- Interaction with professionals in your area of research.
- Information in DTIC ensures continuous and steady exchange of information.
- Information in DTIC guards against duplication of effort and resource expenditure.
- DoD, Navy, and NOSC directives and instructions require that publications be submitted to DTIC.

How to Determine if A Publication Should Be Sent to DTIC

- Will the publication be distributed to organizations other than your sponsor? For example, distribution to contractors, Navy commands, or Navy laboratories?
- Does the publication contain
 - information of immediate interest
 - timely information
 - approach, results, and recommendations of a single project, task, work unit, contract, grant, or closely related effort
 - information beneficial to DoD laboratories, contractors, and academic institutions?
- Is the publication of historical significance? For example, does it provide information as to why significant decisions concerning weapon systems were made?
- Should the publication be put in the archives where it can be retrieved for later use?
- Does the publication contain information for which no preceding references can be found?
- Does the publication contain statistical or management information that has an audience beyond NOSC?
- Is the publication a study or analysis? For example, does it include military scenarios, assessments made using operational research techniques, systems analysis techniques, or similar technology?
- Is the publication a thesis, bibliography, dissertation, or reprint of a journal or symposium article sponsored under DoD money?

A positive response to any of the above questions indicates that the publication should be included in the DTIC data base.

Types of Information to Send to DTIC

- Research, development, test, and evaluation reports.
- Logistics data, e.g., test plans, test results, R&M plans, safety plans, ILSPs, and specifications.
- Software documentation (special procedures exist for the software itself).
- Publications prepared by DoD employees, DoD contractors, and college and university personnel working under DoD contract.

Protection of Information in DTIC

DTIC's secondary distribution of classified and unclassified publications is controlled by several elements: security clearance and need-to-know of the requester and security classification and the distribution statement of the publication. The distribution statement, determined by the controlling office, denotes the availability of the publication for distribution, release, and disclosure without additional approvals or authorizations. The distribution statement is distinct from and in addition to the security classification.

Publications (both classified and unclassified) must carry a distribution statement (A through F or X). This statement is used by DTIC to determine if an agency is authorized to receive a copy of a publication.

DTIC distributes publications only to those agencies authorized by the distribution statement. It requires written approval of the controlling office before distribution to other requesters.
