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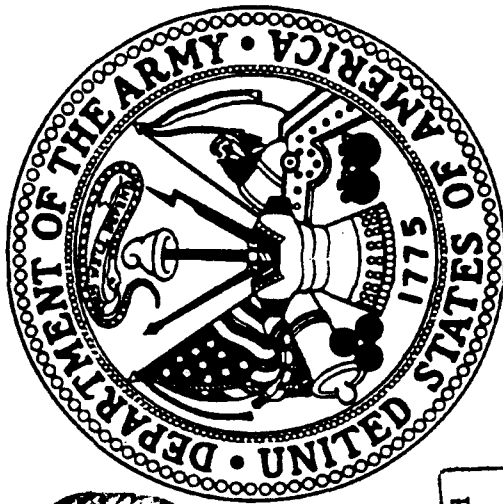

APPROPRIATION LANGUAGE

For construction, procurement, production, and modification of ammunition, and accessories therefore; specialized equipment and training devices; expansion of public and private plants, including ammunition facilities authorized in by section 2854, title 10, United States Code, and the land necessary therefor, for the foregoing purposes, and such lands and interests therein, may be acquired, and construction prosecuted thereon prior to approval of title; and procurement and installation of equipment, appliances, and machine tools in public and private plants; reserve plant and Government and contractor-owned equipment layaway; and other expenses necessary for the foregoing purposes; [\$1,369,080,000] \$823,600,000, to remain available for obligation until September 30, [1994] 1995, of which \$63,100,000 shall be available for the Army National Guard and Army Reserve.

Part 1 - PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The FY 1993 President's Budget contains an ammunition program that provides for worldwide training consumption to achieve near-term readiness, and combat sustainability through the acquisition of war reserve stocks. Families of hardware ammunition included in the request are small and medium caliber, mortar, tank, artillery, mines, rockets, other ammunition items and production base. A substantial portion of the request is for recently developed tank rounds and improved artillery ammunition.

Part 2 - JUSTIFICATION OF FUNDS REQUESTED

The FY 1993 program provides for worldwide training consumption and replaces losses to inventory through FY 1993 funded delivery periods, maintains U.S. Army readiness, buys selected items for war reserves through the FY 1997 authorized acquisition objective, and maintains the active ammunition production base at a reduced level from prior years. The following table depicts the ammunition program by major categories.

PROVISION OF INDUSTRIAL FACILITIES

Funds requested for Provision of Industrial Facilities provide for correction of environmental and safety deficiencies. Also included is funding for production support and equipment replacement at active plants. The majority of funds requested are for safety and environmental efforts.

The FY 1993 request of \$ 59.5 Million contains the following projects:

At Radford AAP, Radford, Virginia, \$6.1 million is requested for automated Dinitrotoluene (DNT) handling equipment. This equipment will be used for removing DNT from shipping containers and placing it into equipment for screening and measured distribution for use in the single base propellant mix house.

At Radford AAP, Radford, Virginia, \$5.9 million is requested to construct a replacement anhydrous ammonia storage facility. A leak or failure of the existing, deteriorated, 40 year old ammonia tank would expose approximately 300 people to life threatening ammonia fumes.

As part of a continuing effort to meet environmental laws and regulations, \$5.0 million is requested to restore land and equipment that have been damaged, contaminated, or disturbed by activities at the ammunition plants and to modify/expand production operations and processes to meet the requirements of various environmental laws and regulations.

Replacement of thirty existing deteriorated above ground primer dry and storage facilities at Lake City Army Ammunition Plant, Independence, Missouri, with thirteen new earth covered reinforced concrete modular buildings and one above ground mechanical building at a cost of \$7.6 million is requested. These new buildings will eliminate operating under existing safety and security waivers and the high costs of maintaining present structures.

At Radford AAP, Radford, Virginia, \$5.4 million is requested to replace the existing NO-X Abatement Systems located in B-Line Nitrocellulose area. The State of Virginia has issued a notice of violation due to chronic problems with the existing system.

At Milan AAP, Milan, Tennessee \$5.9 million is requested to provide a new plant operations support building that will replace three existing World War II temporary structures. The new building will improve safety, eliminate costly repairs and save energy.

To correct safety deficiencies at Iowa AAP, Middletown, Iowa and Louisiana AAP, Shreveport, Louisiana, \$ 1.1 million is requested. Casing and venting of 34 gas lines which cross under roads and railroads is required to meet Louisiana Pipeline Standards. Modification of the Explosive Waste Preparation Facility to eliminate double handling of waste explosive at Iowa AAP will improve safety.

Engineering design funds in the amount of \$12.1 million are required for initiation and/or construction criteria, equipment, and concept; final design, process design, and other design related work necessary to assure efficient and timely execution of facility projects.

Also included in the FY 1993 request is \$10.4 million for the necessary production support and equipment replacement for plants in active production.

The \$31.7 million in FY 1993 is for the protection and preservation of equipment and facilities no longer required for active production, but which must be retained for future peacetime or mobilization production needs.

Significant Layaway Efforts budgeted in FY 1993:

Continuation of layaway of lines at Indiana AAP, Longhorn AAP, Louisiana AAP and Kansas AAP as production ends; and selected double and triple base propellant production buildings at Radford AAP as a result of reduced workload.

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This program will modernize and upgrade existing test instrumentation to conduct production acceptance testing of Army ammunition components. This will also allow for earlier release of product, avoiding the requirement for additional storage facilities, and reduce waste and scrap resulting from stopping faulty production. Jefferson Proving Ground is on the proposed base closure list for Department of Defense installations. The mission performed at Jefferson Proving Ground will be transferred to Yuma Proving Ground and the equipment will be moved.

The funds provide for the maintenance of laidaway portions of active plants including utilities, buildings, nonserviceable plant equipment, administration, surveillance, inspection, protection, and maintenance and repair of buildings, grounds, railroads, and integral equipment. The program also supports retention, maintenance and protection of the government-owned, inactive plants and inactive lines of active plants which are needed to assure emergency production capacity for mission essential material. The program also supports maintenance, protection, repair, and rebuild of government-owned plant equipment packages including industrial plant equipment, other plant equipment, special tooling and special test equipment. These plant equipment packages are maintained in anticipation of future production and mobilization requirements of ammunition. Facilities maintained include ten inactive GOCO plants, inactive lines at 16 active plants (three GOGO and 13 GOCO), and inactive lines at 26 contractor plants.

CONVENTIONAL AMMUNITION DEMILITARIZATION

The conventional ammunition demilitarization program funds the demilitarization and disposal of hazardous, unsafe munitions for all four Services. It also funds the elimination of obsolete or uneconomically repairable ammunition for all four Services. As of March 1990, over 196,000 short tons of munitions was in the demilitarization stockpile awaiting demil. The demil account has experienced a growth of over 40,000 short tons since 1986. This growth has a negative impact on explosive safety and storage space availability. As large scale retrograde programs of ammunition from various theaters and retail locations occur, the growing storage requirements for munitions awaiting demilitarization could result in new military construction requirements or outside temporary storage of munitions. The demilitarization program will eliminate unsafe, hazardous munitions and free up vitally needed space. This will also allow for easier accommodation of large retrogrades, including some expected eliminations of rocket motors, despite storage space loss directed by Base Realignment and Closure.
