ABSTRACT <i>(Maximum 200 words)</i> The U.S. Army Environmental Center tasked the Mandatory Center of Expertise for the Curation and Management of Archaeological Collections (MCX) with the job of assisting the Army in complying with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), P.L. 101-601. The MCX was asked to locate and assess archaeological collections derived from Army lands, to identify the Native American or Native Hawaiian organizations culturally affiliated with the collections, and to draft Section 6 summary letters for each installation. A two-stage process was used to identify, locate and assess the contents of the collections, consisting of archival research and telephone interviews with the repository personnel. This report conveys the results of the collection research completed for the compliance with Section 6 of NAGPRA

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OBJECTIVES AND METHODS

The U.S. Army Environmental Center (AEC) tasked the Mandatory Center of Expertise for the Curation and Management of Archaeological Collections (MCX) with the job of assisting Army installation personnel in complying with the requirements of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (P.L. 101-601, NAGPRA). The MCX was asked to locate and assess archaeological collections derived from Army-owned lands, to identify the federally recognized Native American tribes most likely culturally affiliated with the collections, to draft Section 6 Summary Letters for each installation, and to conduct physical inventories of any collections that contain human skeletal remains. This report conveys the results of the collections research completed to assist Fort Stewart in complying with the Section 6 Summary requirements of NAGPRA.

The MCX used a two-stage process to identify, locate, and assess the contents of archaeological collections from the installation. First, archival research was performed to review all archaeological site records and reports for the installation. Second, telephone interviews were conducted with personnel at installations, universities, museums, and archaeological contractors that were identified during the archival research as possible repositories of Army collections.

Archival research for Fort Stewart began with a search of the National Archeological Data Base (NADB) for references pertaining to the installation. This was followed by a thorough examination of all archaeological site forms and a literature review of all pertinent archaeological reports and manuscripts on file at the Riverbend Research Lab, University of Georgia in Athens, Georgia. The records search was performed at the records center in January 1995 and sought to identify any work on Fort Stewart that may have produced archaeological collections.

Subsequent telephone interviews to potential collections repositories ascertained whether the materials were present and the range of objects in each collection. Once the collections were located and assessed, MCX personnel identified federally recognized Native American tribes that are likely to be culturally affiliated with the materials in the collections. A draft Section 6 Summary letter to the tribes is enclosed (Appendix I), as well as a listing of the current tribal chairpersons (Appendix II).

artifacts, and associated documentation (e.g., field notes, maps, photos, data analyses, correspondence), produced as a result of an archaeological investigation or project at a single site or multiple sites. In some cases, the same archaeological site may have been investigated by various individuals or organizations. Depending on where the resulting collections are curated, they may be stored and identified as separate collections or separate components of a single collection. In cases where the artifacts and records have become separated, we list the records collections repository as well.

Every attempt has been made to locate all collections cited on available archaeological site records or in published and unpublished references to archaeological investigations on the installation.

The artifact collections currently stored in the 24th Infantry Division Museum on Fort Stewart have not been accessioned into the museum's collections registration system and the museum is not responsible for federal compliance requirements for these collections. Lacking any permanent storage facility, the collections have been moved from place to place on the installation. They were previously stored in the attic of a WWII barracks and are currently stored in an unused lavatory at the Museum. Thirty-nine boxes were originally placed into storage, however, a recent count by Mr. Dave McKivergan, the Fort archaeologist, accounted for only thirty of these boxes. It is unknown whether the difference in totals is a result of consolidation of the collections as some of the older boxes have been recently replaced, or whether collections are missing.

Approximately 2 ft³ of collections have been recently submitted to Fort Stewart upon completion of an archaeological investigation. They are currently stored in Mr. McKivergan's office on the Fort.

REFERENCES TO ARCHAEOLOGICAL INVESTIGATIONS

Three sets of references regarding archaeological work conducted on Fort Stewart are attached: Appendix IV contains the list of references reviewed by the MCX during its archival research; Appendix V is the list of references contained in the National Archeological Data Base (NADB); and Appendix VI provides the references cited in the literature but not available for review by the MCX.

NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBES ASSOCIATED WITH FORT STEWART

Two federally-recognized tribal groups, the Creek and the Seminole tribes, have been identified as the likely descendants of the aboriginal inhabitants of coastal Georgia and the area surrounding Fort Stewart. The earliest European explorers reported that the Guale, Yamasee, and Yuchi tribes occupied the southern and coastal regions of Georgia (Swanton:1922), and, historically, these groups merged with the Creek and Seminole tribes (Waldman:1988). The Creek and Seminole tribes currently claim aboriginal lands in southern Georgia and northern Florida (U.S.G.S. n.d.).

Human skeletal fragments from site 9BN39 have been associated with the Guale Tribe by Fort Stewart Archaeologist Dave McKivergan (telephone conversation: July 20, 1995). Skeletal fragments from site 9BN33 have not been associated with any specific cultural group. No other human remains, sacred objects or objects of cultural patrimony have been identified in the collection through a review of the site files and associated literature.

SECTION 6 COMPLIANCE

P.L. 101-601 (NAGPRA) requires that federal agencies engage in active consultation with Native Americans with federally recognized tribes and/or lineal descendants who may be culturally affiliated with the archaeological collections from the installation. Enclosed are a draft NAGPRA Section 6 Summary letter (Appendix I) and a list of the tribal chairpersons (Appendix II) from the federally recognized tribes which may be culturally affiliated with the collections. Of the tribes referenced above, only the Seminole and Creek are federally recognized.

Three Native American groups have attained state recognition in Georgia via the Georgia Council on American Indian Concerns (telephone conversation, John Morgan, Historic Preservation Division, Georgia, 17 August 1995). These three groups, the Georgia Tribe of Eastern Cherokee, the Cherokee of Georgia Tribal Council, and the Lower Muskogee Creek Tribe are not federally recognized and therefore do not fit the legal description of tribe as defined for NAGPRA purposes.

Initial consultation should be conducted on a government-to-government basis. Refer to P.L. 101-601 (NAGPRA) for specifics on required Native American consultation and the legal definitions of items subject to NAGPRA.

I am writing to inform you of collections held by Fort Stewart that may contain Native American cultural items, as defined by the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), that are, or are likely to be, culturally affiliated with the [Tribe]. Fort Stewart has documented these archaeological collections in a Summary in accordance with the requirements of Section 6 of NAGPRA.

Fort Stewart is responsible for collections that include 10 boxes housed at one repository: Fort Stewart 24th Infantry Division Museum. These archaeological collections were generated from surveys and excavations conducted from 1980 to the present on Fort Stewart by Southeastern Archeological Services, Inc., Athens, Georgia; Southern Research, Ellerslie, Georgia; Carolina Archaeological Services, Columbia, South Carolina; and Cultural Resource Management, Inc. contracted by Professional Analysts, Eugene, Oregon. The collections consist of both prehistoric and historic artifacts. Prehistoric collections include numerous stone lithics, ceramic fragments, animal bones, small amounts of human skeletal remains, and shell. Historic artifacts include ceramics, glass, metal, bone fragments, cloth, slag, and other miscellaneous materials.

We are notifying [Tribe] because some of these materials were found near the area thought to be part of the territory occupied or used aboriginally by the [Tribe]. In accordance with Section 6 of NAGPRA, we are inviting you to consult with us regarding these archaeological collections. Upon your written request, we will provide you access to review our records, catalogues, relevant studies, or other pertinent data for the purpose of determining the geographic origin, cultural affiliation, and basic facts surrounding acquisition and accession of these collections.

In the process of completing the Section 6 Summary, the following potential Native American human remains were identified in Fort Stewart's collections. Our research thus far
