- Rise of China

- An old cause of new wars
- Test of “the world community”
- Why this is a threat we cannot manage
- Probable consequences

Threat 3

Uneven Development

- Problems of modernization
- Die-hard resistance to modernity
- Globalization and exploitation
- Moral issues
- Strategic consequences

Threat 4

Overpopulation, Migration, Pandemics

- Climate change means overpopulation
- Mass migrations are unstoppable
- Migrations mean conflict and war
- Pandemic conditions

Threat 5

Resource Shortages

- Water
- Food
- Energy
- Land

Threat 6

Another Nuclear Century

- Nuclear proliferation is unstoppable
- There will be nuclear wars
- Consequences very uncertain

Threat 7 Terrorism

- The last and least major threat
- Al Qaeda is in decline
- Religiously motivated terrorism is a problem of modernity for Islam
- Only Islamic moderates can beat fanatics
- There is no single, dominant solution

Today - A Golden Age?

- So much for the very bad news
- The very good news is that most of these threats have yet to mature
 - China is still only rising
 - Climate change hasn't gone critical

Today - A Golden Age?
