EXERCISE DIRECTIVE NR 1
OPERATION FRATERNIDAD

1. GENERAL:

a. Republic of Honduras Military Forces, reinforced by airborne airlanded and overland units of Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Peru and the United States, will conduct a joint-combined training exercise (Operation FRATERNIDAD) near TEGUCIGALPA, Republic of Honduras, during the period 3 - 6 September 1962.

b. The command and control of combined forces will be under the Commander, Combined Task Force (Combined Task Force (Commanding General, USARCARIB).

c. The Combined Task Force (CTF) will consist of approximately fifteen hundred personnel.

d. The Republic of Honduras, as host country, extended invitations to North, Central and South American countries to participate in the training exercise or to send observers. The Republic of Honduras is also providing facilities for conduct of the exercise.

2. OBJECTIVES:

a. To demonstrate the cooperation and the capabilities of Western Hemisphere Nations to respond to a request by the Organization of American States (OAS) to assist a member nation in the conduct of operations against an Aggressor.

b. To provide training experience to staff officers of participating nations in Joint/Combined planning and in the conduct of a tactical training exercise.

c. To provide realistic training for participating military units.

d. To practice the rapid assembly of tactical forces of different countries by air and land movement to a common objective area.

3. PARTICIPATION:

a. Government of Honduras provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry battalion of approximately 400 personnel.

(2) Tactical air forces consisting of one fighter squadron (9-F4U).

(3) Token Aggressor forces consisting of approximately 50 personnel. This force will be integrated with U.S. Aggressor forces.

(4) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(5) Administrative and logistical support as required in support of operations

b. Government of Colombia provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry company (-) of approximately 50 personnel.

(2) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(3) Airlift support for Colombian tactical forces from designated staging area to objective area and return to Colombia.

c. Government of El Salvador provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry company (-) of approximately 50 personnel.

(2) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(3) Airlift support for El Salvador tactical forces from designated staging area to objective area and return to El Salvador.

d. Government of Guatemala provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry parachute company (-) consisting of approximately 50 personnel.

(2) Representation on a combined Combat Control Team (CCT) of not less than 2 nor more than 4 personnel for the purpose of ground-air control of the parachute assault.

(3) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(4) Airlift support for Guatemala tactical forces from designated staging area to objective area and return to Guatemala.

e. Government of Nicaragua provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry company (-) of approximately 50 personnel.

(2) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(3) Ground tactical transport to deliver forces from designated staging area to the objective area and return to Nicaragua.

f. Government of Peru provides:

(1) Tactical ground forces consisting of one Infantry parachute company (-) consisting of approximately 50 personnel.

(2) Representation on a combined Combat Control Team (CCT) of not less than 2 nor more than 4 personnel for the purpose of ground-air control of the parachute assault.

(3) Staff representation on the Combined Task Force staff for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(4) Airlift support of Peru tactical forces from designated staging area to objective area and return to Peru.

g. United States provides:

(1) USAFSTRIKE will provide:

(a) Troop carrier airlift for US tactical forces and designated tactical forces of other participating nations from designated staging (marshalling) areas, to the objective area and return.

(b) Administrative troop carrier airlift for material, equipment, and designated personnel, from departure airfields in the Canal Zone to the objective area and return.

(2) USARSTRIKE will provide:

(a) Tactical ground forces consisting of two (2) Airborne Infantry rifle companies of approximately 240 personnel each.

(b) Representation on a combined Combat Control Team (CCT) of not less than 2 nor more than 4 personnel for the purpose of ground-air control of the parachute assault.

(3) US Army Caribbean (USARCARIB) will provide:

(a) Tactical ground forces consisting of two (2) Infantry companies of approximately 140 personnel each.

(b) Command and staff representation on the Combined Task Force for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

(c) Administrative and logistical support as required in support of the operation.

(d) An Administrative Base Camp in the vicinity of Toncontin Airfield, Tegucigalpa, Honduras to support observer and press personnel.

(e) Departure airfield support for marshalling and staging of designated tactical units.

(f) Aggressor forces consisting of two Infantry platoons of approximately 30 personnel each, which will be integrated with Honduran Aggressor forces.

(4) Caribbean Air Command (CAIRC) will provide:

(a) Administrative airlift for personnel, material and equipment as required in support of the operation.

(b) Air-sea rescue support during the airlift phase of the operation.

(c) Air evacuation for casualties from the objective area to hospital facilities in the Canal Zone.

(d) Air support for the Combat Control Team (CCT) in the objective area.

(e) Air weather support and information as required.

4. COMMAND RELATIONSHIPS:

a. The command of this exercise will be divided into two phases:

(1) Phase I: The tactical commander of all ground forces in the Republic of Honduras from D-2 to D-Day will be the Chief, Armed Forces of the Republic of Honduras. The tactical commander of all ground forces in the Republic of Honduras on D-Day until arrival of the Commander, CTF will be the Chief, Armed Forces of the Republic of Honduras.

(2) Phase II: The tactical commander of all ground forces in the Republic of Honduras, Tegucigalpa area, from D-Day until D+1 will be the Commander, CTF.

b. U.S. liaison officers, one of whom will be with each participating country, will be under command and control of Commander, CTF with the mission of providing liaison between CTF staff and participating units.

c. The Armed Forces of the Republic of Nicaragua will remain under command and control of Commander, Nicaraguan Military Forces until link-up is effected with CTF, at which time command and control of Nicaraguan Military Forces will pass to Commander, CTF.

d. Command of armed forces participating in Operation FRATERNIDAD will revert to commanders of participating units upon termination of exercise on D+1.

e. The command and control of armed forces moving to Tegucigalpa area remains with commanders of participating countries until arrival in objective area.

f. Command relationships of air forces are outlined in Annex D (Air Support Plan).

5. CONCEPT OF OPERATION:

a. Aggressor guerrilla forces threaten the city of Tegucigalpa and Toncontin Airport.

b. On D-2 (3 Sept 62) the Honduras Military Forces will occupy defensive and security positions around the city of Tegucigalpa and Toncontin Airport.

c. The Government of Honduras, in view of the increasing Aggressor threat, asks the Organization of American States for military assistance.

d. A Combined Task Force was organized, integrating the Armed Forces of the following countries: Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru and the United States.

e. On D-Day (5 Sept 62), the movement of military forces to Honduras will begin, by land and air.

f. At H-Hour minus 30 minutes, a squadron from the Honduran Air Force will harass the positions of Aggressor guerrilla forces.

g. At H-hour minus 15 minutes, the Combat Control Team (CCT) will parachute into the selected Drop Zone (DZ) area.

h. At H-hour, the first unit of paratroops (Guatemala) will execute a parachute assault on DZ, followed by the unit from Peru at H+15 and by the units from United States at H+30.

i. The units from Colombia, United States, and Peru will depart from Howard Air Force Base, Canal Zone.

j. Units from El Salvador, Guatemala, and Nicaragua will depart from home bases.

k. The Headquarters CTF, will airland at Tegucigalpa (Toncontin Airport) after the airhead line has been established at approximately H+3 hours.

1. GENERAL SITUATION:

a. Enemy Forces:

(1) Background: Aggressor forces are composed of one Airborne Parachute Regiment believed to be part of the 66th Airborne Division, and an unknown number of partisans. This Aggressor force has been conducting numerous raids throughout the area around the capital city of Tegucigalpa. Resupply of staple food products for Aggressor is accomplished by partisan groups. The recruiting of partisans by Aggressor has been quite successful. At present, the Aggressor forces are understrength and greatly overextended due to the area in which they are operating. Aggressor has no anti-tank, anti-aircraft, field artillery, or close air support capabilities, their armament being limited to small arms weapons. It is also estimated that there exists an acute shortage of transportation and normal POL supplies. It is felt that due to the lack of supporting weapons, Aggressor will continue to conduct guerrilla operations while awaiting reinforcement from the Aggressor Homeland.

(2) Recent and Present Significant Activities: Since February 1962, Aggressor has continually harassed the regular Army detachments in the Republic of Honduras. This harassment has been in the form of raids on vital installations and depots, ambushes of personnel and convoys and sabotage of vital government and civilian facilities. The Aggressor has continued to operate throughout the Republic of Honduras and has increased the frequency of operations in the area in and around Tegucigalpa and Toncontin Airport. It is strongly felt that the main effort of Aggressor will be directed toward the disruption of law and government agencies by concentrating forces in this area. The acquisition of Tegucigalpa and Toncontin Airport would greatly enhance the Aggressor bid to gain control of this Central American Republic.

b. Friendly Forces: Military forces of the Republic of Honduras have attempted to destroy and annihilate the Aggressor guerrilla force which has been constantly harrasing the regular Army. Intelligence reports indicate a large-scale attempt by Aggressor to take over the city of Tegucigalpa and the Toncontin Airfield. On 3 September 62, Commander, Honduras Military Forces moved his troops into defensive and security positions around the city and the airfield. He also has issued an appeal to Organization of American States for assistance. The OAS Military Commission recommended OAS force to assist the Republic of Honduras in reinforcing their Army and destroying Aggressor. Commander in Chief, Caribbean Command has been designated Commander of all OAS forces. Commander in Chief, Caribbean Command has passed operational control of all ground forces to Commanding General, US Army Caribbean. A force consisting of one USSTRICOM TF (2 Companies, 2nd. ABG, 501st. Inf), one Peruvian Parachute Company (-), one Guatemalan Parachute Infantry Company (-), one Colombian Rifle Company (-), one Rifle Company (-) from El Salvador, one Nicaraguan Rifle Company (-), and one USARCARIB TF (2 Companies, 1st. BG, 20th Inf.) will proceed into the Tegucigalpa area by parachute assault and airland on or about 5 September 1962 to assist the Honduras Military Forces. The Guatemalan Parachute Company will spearhead the parachute assault followed by the Peruvian Parachute Company, and the two Airborne Infantry Companies of USSTRICOM TF. The unit from Nicaragua will travel overland by vehicle for link-up with CTF. The forces of Colombia, El Salvador and USARCARIB TF will airland at Toncontin Airport. CINCARIB directs CG, USARCARIB to initiate the airborne assault at 051300Z September 1962. Until arrival of CG, CTF, the tactical command and control of all forces in the Honduras area will be under the Commander, Honduras Military Forces.

FIRST SITUATION

Commander, Combined Task Force (CTF) issues CTF Operation Order T-1-62 which directs participating units to move to designated marshalling areas in preparation for the conduct of a parachute - air landed and overland assault in the Tegucigalpa, Honduras area on 5 September 1962, at H-hour, to reinforce local Honduras military forces and to destroy or capture Aggressor guerrilla forces in the area.

FIRST REQUIREMENT

Participating units issue necessary orders and instructions to prepare units for movement to assigned marshalling areas. Personnel and equipment are made ready for the operation.

SECOND SITUATION

Participating units occupy assigned marshalling areas and make preparations for movement of forces by air-overland to the objective area in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. Honduras Military Forces continue to defend the capital city of Tegucigalpa and Toncontin Airfield against increasing pressures from Aggressor guerrilla forces.

SECOND REQUIREMENT

Final preparations are made for movement by air-overland from departure airfields (areas) to the objective area. All personnel are briefed on the situation and mission. Honduras military forces conduct aggressive counter-guerrilla action to delay aggressor action until reinforcements arrive.

THIRD SITUATION

Forces of the Combined Task Force commence movement by air-overland from assigned marshalling areas to the objective area.

THIRD REQUIREMENT

Airborne forces make final preparations for parachute assault and air-landed operations. Nicaraguan forces conduct overland move, by military vehicle, with emphasis on march security.

FOURTH SITUATION

Parachute assault forces deploy into the drop zone area with personnel and equipment and commence movement to assigned assembly areas.

FOURTH REQUIREMENT

Parachute forces recover equipment, clear the drop zone area rapidly, and move in tactical formation to assigned assembly areas.

FIFTH SITUATION

Airlanded elements deploy into Toncontin Airfield with personnel and equipment and commence movement to assigned assembly areas.

FIFTH REQUIREMENT

Personnel and equipment unload rapidly, clear Toncontin Airfield, and move in tactical formation to assigned assembly areas.

SIXTH SITUATION

Nicaragua military forces deploy overland into an assigned holding area outside the objective area. Following coordination with CTF elements, Nicaragua forces commence movement to assigned assembly area with personnel and equipment.

SIXTH REQUIREMENT

Nicaragua forces report arrival at initial phase line and arrival in assigned holding area. Local security is established. Coordination is made with CTF forces, liaison is affected, and movement through CTF positions is accomplished.

SEVEN SITUATION

Honduras military forces continue to defend assigned sector and support movement of other elements to expand the airhead.

SEVENTH REQUIREMENT

Honduras military forces conduct aggressive diversionary patrols to the North and West to detract attention of aggressor forces from activities in other areas.

EIGHTH SITUATION

Units occupy assigned assembly areas and make preparations for selection and occupation of defensive positions.

EIGHTH REQUIREMENT

Units establish local security within assembly areas and make plans for reconnaissance and selection of strong points and organization of defensive positions.

NINTH SITUATION

CTF Headquarters is established in the vicinity of Toncontin Airfield and assumes operational control of all forces in the objective area.

NINTH REQUIREMENT

Arrangement of CTF Command Post, establish communications and liaison with all tactical units, local security of Command Post area is established.

TENTH SITUATION

Tactical elements of Guatemala, United States, Colombia and Peru occupy selected strong points and defensive positions and prepare road blocks within assigned sectors.

TENTH REQUIREMENT

Actions and orders of units in occupying positions, coordination of observation and fires and lateral coordination with adjacent units.

ELEVENTH SITUATION

Tactical elements of El Salvador and Nicaragua affect relief of elements of Honduras military forces within assigned sectors.

ELEVENTH REQUIREMENT

Actions and orders of units to affect coordination and conduct of the relief.

TWELFTH SITUATION

Honduras military forces, relieved by elements of El Salvador and Nicaragua, move to assigned reserve assembly area to constitute CTF general reserve force.

TWELFTH REQUIREMENT

Actions and orders of unit to effect security of CTF CP; provide immediate ready force for reinforcement to any portion of airhead line.

THIRTEENTH SITUATION

Intelligence reports indicate extensive infiltration efforts by Aggressor guerrilla forces through CTF security positions in an effort to disrupt communications and sabotage military and civilian installations.

THIRTEENTH REQUIREMENT

Actions and orders to alert all units of situation, increase security around strategic installations, employment of CTF reserve force,

if applicable. All units initiate lateral security patrols along air-head line.

FOURTEENTH SITUATION

The extent of guerrilla infiltration in rear areas requires the preparation of plans for employment of CTF reserve forces (both local and general reserves) in a counter guerrilla operation.

FOURTEENTH REQUIREMENT

Preparation by staff of counter guerrilla plan and method of implementation.

FIFTEENTH SITUATION

Intelligence reports gathered from captured prisoners indicate that guerrilla forces are being supported by local civilians in outlying villages and towns. Certain towns and villages are being used as a base of operations for guerrilla forces.

FIFTEENTH REQUIREMENT

Actions and plans taken to relocate civilian populace who are assisting guerrilla forces, actions of civil affairs personnel in handling these civilians, logistical requirements for civilian personnel after relocation. Preparation of plans for and conduct of reconnaissance patrols in an effort to locate Aggressor Guerrilla Base of Operations.

SIXTEENTH SITUATION

Based on information gathered by reconnaissance and combat patrols indicating the location of the guerrilla base of operations, plans are developed for the conduct of a coordinated attack to capture or destroy guerrilla forces.

SIXTEENTH REQUIREMENT

Proper coordination between CTF headquarters and units for implementation of plan.

SEVENTEENTH SITUATION

At approximately 0530 hours on D / 1 the exercise is terminated on a signal from the Commander, Combined Task Force.

SEVENTEENTH REQUIREMENT

Participating units will move to previously designated areas on Toncontin Airfield for concluding ceremonies.

Annex C (Intelligence Plan) to Exercise Directive Nr. 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD

1. Enemy Forces and Dispositions.

See Annex B (Maneuver Scenario).

2. Friendly Situation. (Aggressor Forces)

See Appendix 1 (Aggressor Plan and Situation).

3. Release of Aggressor Information.

a. Aggressor information will be released to participating forces in accordance with Appendix Nr. 1 (Aggressor Plan and Situation).

b. Sufficient information will be released to participating units during the premaneuver phase in order to realistically portray the Aggressor situation. The objectives of the premaneuver phase are to familiarize the participating forces with the Aggressor situation prior to D-day; provide for timely dissemination of intelligence; promotion of security; and stimulation of interest in the exercise.

c. Periodic intelligence reports (PERINTREPS); daily intelligence summaries (DISUMS); and spot intelligence reports (SPIREPS); will be released as required.

d. During the maneuver phase, release of Aggressor intelligence information to participating units will be in addition to that which normally will be obtained by each participating unit during the operations.

4. Aggressor Representation.

a. Aggressor representation will be on a ratio of ten to one. Each Aggressor represents ten (10) soldiers. The actual ground which one Aggressor occupies represents that which would be occupied by ten men.

b. All Aggressor Forces will be attired in a complete Aggressor uniform with appropriate unit markings as indicated in Tab A (Conversion List) to Appendix 2 (Instructions to Aggressor Forces). Under no circumstances will Aggressor personnel be injected into the exercise who are not fully attired in a complete Aggressor uniform.

5. Prisoners of War.

a. Physical contact between Aggressor Forces and participating troops will be avoided, except for the orderly search of Prisoners of War when a surrender has been effected.

b. All Prisoners of War, Aggressor and friendly forces, will be treated in accordance with the Articles of the Geneva Convention Relative to the Treatment of Prisoners of War.

c. When searching Prisoners of War, the ^{RIGHT} ~~left~~ pocket only of the shirt or jacket will be searched.

d. Under no circumstances will personal equipment or possessions be removed from a Prisoner of War.

Appendix 1 (Aggressor Plan and Situation) to Annex C (Intelligence Plan) to Exercise Directive Nr. 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

REFERENCE: Map, TEGUCIGALPA, HONDURAS, 1:50,000 Sheet Number 2758 II, 2d Edition; Esso Road Map, The Republic of HONDURAS.

1. Situation:

a. Enemy Forces. See Annex B (Exercise Scenario) to Exercise Directive Nr. 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

b. Friendly Forces. (Aggressor) Tab A (Aggressor Situation Overlay).

2. Mission. To conduct raids, infiltration, ambushes, and acts of sabotage against military detachments in different parts of the Republic, and to organize a guerrilla force using ex-aggressor soldiers and dissident civilians, with the mission of conducting large-scale guerrilla activities in the area.

3. Concept of Operations.

a. Aggressor activities during requirements one (1) through five (5), Annex B (Exercise Scenario), will consist of a training exercise for the Aggressor Forces, written and conducted by the Honduran Army Forces.

b. On D-day, one (1) Aggressor platoon (five (5) men) will be pre-positioned vicinity grid coordinates (783497) for the purpose of conducting an ambush against the Nicaraguan Forces moving overland into the maneuver area. The remainder of the Aggressor Forces are located in the Aggressor Headquarters at EL HATILLO (817625); and occupying avenues of approach into the maneuver area.

c. First Situation. (Sixth Situation, Exercise Scenario). Nicaraguan Forces deploy overland into an assigned holding area.

First Requirement. Five (5) Aggressor soldiers, prepositioned, coordinates (783487) ambush leading elements. When Nicaraguan Forces are deployed, Aggressors will surrender. Nicaraguan Forces will escort Aggressors to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point located near the CTF Base Camp.

d. Second Situation. (Seventh Situation, Exercise Scenario). Honduran Forces conduct two (2) diversionary patrols. Patrol Nr. 1 will use the TEGUCIGALPA - EL HATILLO road. Patrol Nr. 2 will use the unimproved road from cemetery at coordinates (766588), northwest to RJ (748592).

Second Requirement. Two (2) Aggressor patrols of three (3) men each will be prepositioned along the patrol routes and will attempt an ambush. Aggressor patrols will surrender and return with the Honduran patrols where they will be escorted to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point.

e. Third Situation. (Eighth Situation, Exercise Scenario). CTF units occupy assigned assembly areas and prepare for selection and occupation of defensive positions.

Third Requirement. One (1) Aggressor platoon, represented by three (3) men each, will occupy each assembly area. Aggressor platoons will fire white star parachute flares as the leading elements arrive at assembly area. After CTF units deploy, Aggressors will surrender. After a brief interrogation, Aggressors will be escorted to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point.

f. Fourth Situation. (Tenth Situation, Exercise Scenario). Tactical elements of GUATEMALA, US, COLOMBIA and PERU occupy selected strong points and defensive positions and prepare road blocks within assigned areas.

Fourth Requirement. Aggressor Forces launch limited attack (with three (3) men each) on the defensive positions of GUATEMALA, US, COLOMBIA and PERU units and fire white star parachute flares. Attacks will not effect a penetration and Aggressor is forced to withdraw to previous positions.

g. Fifth Situation. (Eleventh Situation, Exercise Scenario). Tactical elements of EL SALVADOR and NICARAGUA effect relief of elements of Honduran Forces within assigned areas.

Fifth Requirement. Aggressor Forces launch coordinated attack on Honduran positions during relief by EL SALVADOR and NICARAGUA. Attacking force consists of two (2) platoons each (represented by five (5) Aggressors). Aggressor attack is unsuccessful and two (2) Aggressors surrender in each sector with the remainder withdrawing to previous positions. Aggressor prisoners accompany Honduran units to reserve area where they will be conducted to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point.

h. Sixth Situation. (Twelfth Situation, Exercise Scenario). Relief of Honduran Forces by EL SALVADOR and NICARAGUA units is effected. Honduran Forces constitute CTF general reserve.

Sixth Requirement. Aggressor Forces infiltrate HONDURAS' defensive positions with five (5) men and launch a surprise attack on the CTF reserve. The attack is limited and is conducted in order to force the Honduran Forces to commit their reserves. Once reserve forces are committed, Aggressor withdraws and evades to previously selected positions.

i. Seventh Situation. (Thirteenth Situation, Exercise Scenario). Security measures of all installations are increased, the general reserve of the CTF is employed for lateral patrolling of the air head.

Seventh Requirement. Aggressor Forces in EL HATILLO sector launch an attack with five (5) men in the direction of EL HATILLO - EL PICACHO (788608). Attack will not effect any penetration and two (2) Aggressors are captured, and escorted to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point. The remainder withdraw to previous positions.

j. Eighth Situation. (Fourteenth Situation, Exercise Scenario). Counter-guerrilla plans are being formulated by the reserve of the CTF for immediate employment in this sector because of continued guerrilla activity.

Eighth Requirement. Aggressor will increase infiltration in rear areas with small groups of two (2) or three (3) men each, and intensify limited attacks on all positions. In the sector of LA PRESA (793544) the Aggressor will detonate an explosion (simulated by firing a white star parachute flare). If CTF units deploy, Aggressors will surrender; otherwise, withdraw and evade to previously selected positions.

k. Ninth Situation. (Fifteenth Situation, Exercise Scenario). The tactical units will conduct reconnaissance patrols in an effort to locate the Aggressor base of operations.

Ninth Requirement. The Aggressor Forces occupying EL HATILLO (817625), resist all efforts of CTF patrols to locate Aggressor Headquarters. Aggressor Forces will increase their patrols in the vicinity of EL HATILLO (817625). Aggressor patrols will attempt to ambush CTF patrols. If ambushes are unsuccessful, aggressor patrols will conduct delaying action and withdraw to EL HATILLO.

l. Tenth Situation. (Sixteenth Situation Exercise Scenario). Coordination effected by CTF Headquarters and all units for plans to attack Aggressor Headquarters.

Tenth Requirement. The Aggressor intensifies infiltration in all sectors with all forces available; infiltrating in small groups of two (2) or three (3) men. Aggressor patrols in the EL HATILLO (817625) sector will attack CTF patrols forcing them to halt their advance. Two (2) Aggressor soldiers will surrender and will be escorted to the Prisoner of War Collecting Point. Remainder withdraw to EL HATILLO.

m. Eleventh Situation. (Seventeenth Situation, Exercise Scenario). At approximately 0530, D+1, the exercise is terminated by the Commander, Combined Task Force.

Eleventh Requirement. Aggressor Forces will move to previously designated areas on TONCONTIN AIRFIELD for concluding ceremonies.

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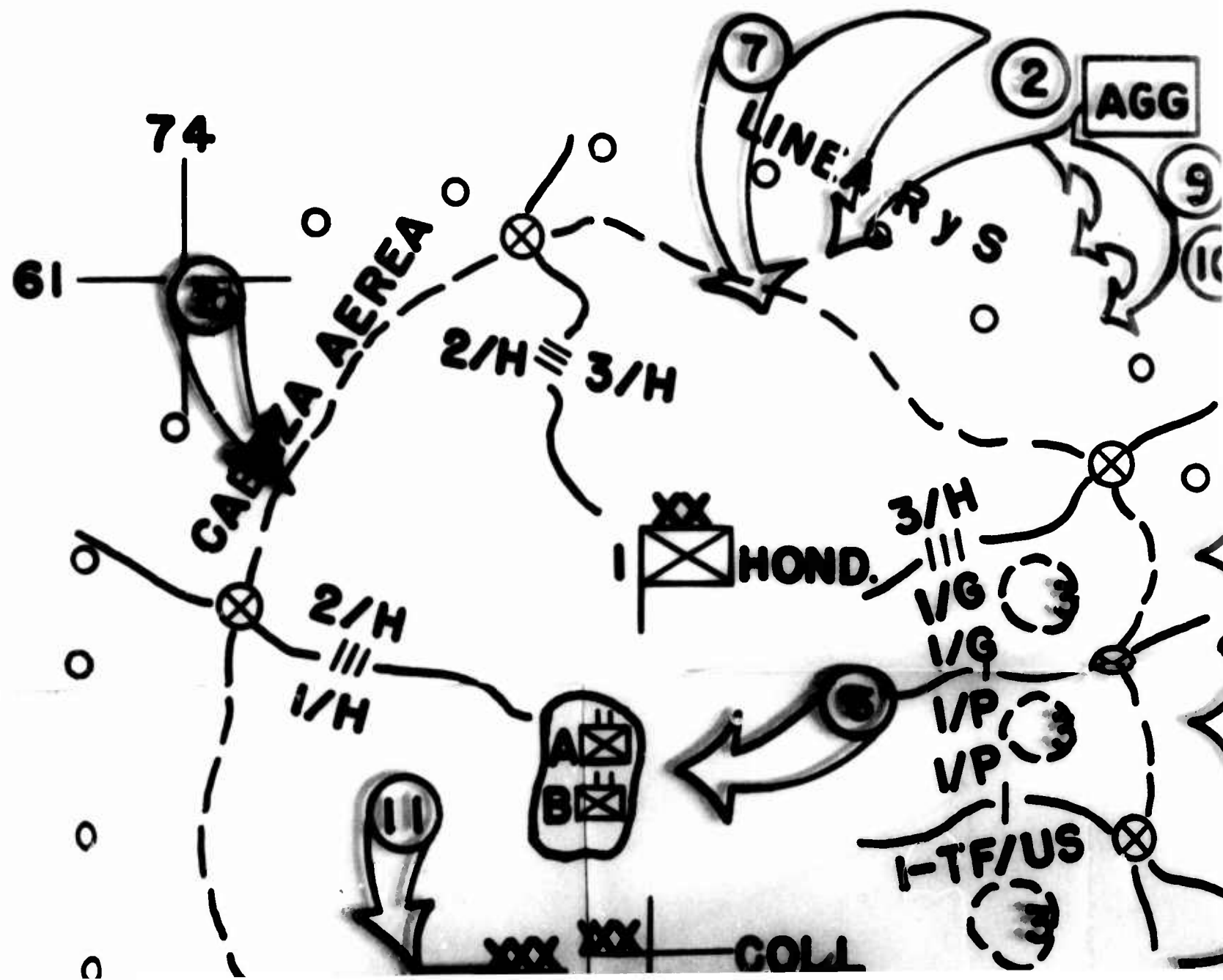

1. General.

a. Aggressor Forces will be represented by the following units:

(1) Counterguerrilla platoon, 1st Battle Group, 20th Infantry, Fort
Kobbe, Canal Zone, (approximately one Officer and 30 EM).

(2) Counterguerrilla platoon, 4th Battle Group, 10th Infantry, Fort
Davis, Canal Zone, (approximately one Officer and 30 EM).

(3) Company A, 2nd Infantry Battalion, 1st Infantry Regiment; 10th
Division, Honduran Army Force, Tegucigalpa, Honduras, (approximately two
Officers and 50 EM).

b. The Aggressor Forces will be integrated in the maneuver area prior to
the conduct of the exercise. The composite Aggressor Force, representing an
Airborne Parachute Regiment, will conduct training exercises in the maneuver
area prior to D-day. This training exercise will be conducted by the Honduran
Army Forces. This exercise should include a rehearsal of the Aggressor scenario
and a complete check of communications.

c. During the conduct of Operation FRATEERNIDAD, the composite Aggressor
Forces must perform such actions, which if observed, reported and processed,
will give participating unit commanders indications of the Aggressor's intentions.

2. Specific Instructions.

a. Aggressor Forces will be completely integrated prior to D-day.

b. Tab B (Aggressor Order of Battle) provides unit designations, names and
ranks of key personnel of the Aggressor. Personnel occupying positions in
the Aggressor organization will assume the rank and name provided for that
position.

c. Where no Aggressor name and rank are provided, names will be given
arbitrarily to all personnel. Spanish and German names are most appropriate.

d. Marking of all clothing will be in accordance with Tab A.

e. NO ammunition will be used during the exercise. White star parachute
flares will be used to signify Aggressor action.

f. Personnel captured by Aggressor Forces will be interrogated briefly and escorted to the Prisoner of War Collective Point located near CTF Base Camp.

Annex D (Air Support Plan) to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation
FRATERNIDAD

1. GENERAL: This exercise will be controlled by Commander, Combined Task Force (COMCTF) consistent with the concept of operations as outlined below. Control will be maintained through the media of orders and messages issued by COMCTF to each component commander. Situation will be portrayed by aggressor guerilla forces in the friendly country, Republic of Honduras.

2. COMMAND RELATIONSHIP

a. U.S. Air Force forces -- CONUS Air Force forces deploying to Canal Zone will remain under operational control of CINCSTRIKE until landing at Howard AFB when operational control will pass to CINCARIB. CINCARIB will exercise operational control through Commander, Combined Task Force until termination of the exercise. Redeployment of CONUS Air Force forces will be the responsibility of CINCSTRIKE.

b. Air Forces of Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, Peru: During the deployment and redeployment of Air Forces staging at Howard AFB, forces remain under the operational control of their respective commanders. During the employment and recovery phases all air lift forces will come under the operational control of the Commander, CTF. This control will be exercised through the Airlift Task Force (ALTF) Commander.

c. Tactical Air Forces will operate under the control of Commander, CTF.

3. DEPLOYMENT:

a. Commander USARSTRIKE and USAFSTRIKE will, under the direction of CINCSTRIKE, deploy USSTRICOM forces utilizing Tactical Air Command (TAC) C-130 aircraft from bases in the United States to the Canal Zone. These forces will deploy to Howard AFB, Canal Zone so as to arrive not later than 2000 Z, 1 September 1962.

b. Colombian forces will deploy to Howard AFB, Canal Zone on 2 September 1962.

c. Guatemalan Army and Air forces will commence staging at LA AURORA Airport, Guatemala City on 4 September 1962.

d. El Salvador Army and Air forces will commence staging at ESCUELA DE ARMAS Y SERVICIOS and ILOPANGO Airport, respectively, in San Salvador on 4 September 1962.

e. Peruvian Army and Air forces will deploy to Howard AFB, Canal Zone on 2 September 1962.

f. On D-Day the forces listed in paragraphs "a" through "e" will conduct an airborne and airlanded assault in the Republic of Honduras in the area of the capital city, TEGUCIGALPA.

g. All forces involved will employ to the objective from their respective staging bases so as to reach their time over target and air land times precisely as published in the air movement table of Annex E (Air Movement Plan) to Operation Order T-1-62, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

h. Air lift involved by country and type is as follows:

i. At the completion of the tactical phase of the exercise, D+1, the respective Air Forces air lift will recover their ground elements from TONCONTIN Airport as published in air movement table of Annex E (Air Movement Plan) to Operation Order T-1-62, Operacion FRATERNIDAD.

j. The Caribbean Air Command, in co-ordination with appropriate Canal Zone FAA authorities, will establish necessary air space reservations for the support of this plan.

k. The Airlift Task Force Commander will provide personnel for and establish Combat Air Lift Support units at Howard AFB, Canal Zone prior to the arrival of the first deployment aircraft and at TONCONTIN Airport, Honduras, on D-1.

l. Honduran Air Force Fighter Bomber (F4U's) will stage on D-1 at TONCONTIN Airport and be prepared to provide support on D-Day as outlined in paragraph 5, this annex, and in Annex H to Operation Order T-1-62.

m. Caribbean Air Command Rescue Co-ordination Center will provide search and rescue operations as indicated in Operation Order T-1-62.

n. Caribbean Air Command will provide logistic support of air crews and Air Force components staging at Howard AFB, Canal Zone.

4. ADMINISTRATIVE AIR LIFT:

a. The Air Lift Task Force Commander will provide required administrative C-130 airlift to TONCONTIN Airport, Honduras, and the personnel and equipment to support the following functions:

- (1) Combat Airlift Support Unit Elements (CALSU)
- (2) Combat Control Team (CCT) and DZ Safety Elements
- (3) Aero Medical Evacuation Elements
- (4) Crash and Rescue Elements
- (5) Ground Support Elements
- (6) News Media and Official Observers
- (7) Base Camp Support Elements
- (8) Air Weather Support Elements

b. Commander Detachment #3, First Air Commando Group, will provide two (2) L-28 aircraft. One to be in position at Managua Airfield, Nicaragua, and one at Toncontin Airfield, Honduras on D-1 to conduct search and rescue operations if required. He will also provide one (1) C-46 aircraft to employ members of the assault CCT.

5. TACTICAL AIR SUPPORT PLAN:

a. The Honduran Air Force (FAH) will operate with tactical airplanes over the paratrooper's drop zone from H-hour minus 45 minutes, to H minus 20 minutes. The mission is to minimize the enemy resistance in the objective area, prior to the airborne assault. The landing time for these aircraft will be H-15.

b. From H+1:40 to H+2:00, the FAH will attack the enemy positions in the area surrounding the drop zone, in support of the airborne troops and upon request of the Commander, Honduras Military Forces, and will land at H+2:15 so as not to interfere with troop carrier air landed operations.

c. After the completion of the airlanded phase, the FAH will support the combined forces, on request, for the duration of the exercise.

6. AIRCRAFT REMAIN OVERNIGHT PLAN (RON):

a. Peru, Colombia and United States aircraft will stage from Howard AFB, Canal Zone. Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras aircraft will operate from home bases. After airdrop and airland operations, aircraft of the countries involved will land at, and remain overnight on D-Day as indicated in paragraph b below.

b. Remain overnight bases:

- (1) Guatemala - La Aurora, Guatemala City
- (2) El Salvador - Ilopango, San Salvador
- (3) United States - Howard AFB, Canal Zone
- (4) Colombia - Ilopango, San Salvador
- (5) Peru - La Aurora, Guatemala City
- (6) Honduras - Toncontin, Tegucigalpa

c. All aircraft will depart and operate from the remain overnight base on D+1 in accordance with Annex E to Operation Order T-1-62.

d. Two United States C-130 aircraft will depart Howard AFB, Canal Zone on D-1 for Honduras and will remain until relieved by Commander, CTF at Toncontin Airport. One aircraft will perform necessary Aero-Medical evacuation and the other will transport News Media and Official Observers. See Appendix 1 to Annex E (Air Movement Plan) to Operation Order T-1-62.

The U. S. Army Aviation Detachment (CARIB) (-), reinforced by elements of the Inter American Geodetic Survey (IAGS) will provide limited Army Aviation Support in the maneuver area. Support aircraft will include four (4) H-13 helicopters, one (1) H-19 helicopter and one (1) U-1A fixed wing aircraft.

2. MISSION

Army Aviation provides medical evacuation, visual reconnaissance and administrative flights as directed for assigned and attached units.

3. OPERATIONS

a. Movement

(1) On 26 August 1962 one H-19 and one U-1A will depart Howard AFB, CZ arriving Toncontin Airport, Tegucigalpa, Honduras 27 August 1962.

(2) On 27 August 1962 one H-13 will be airtransported from Howard AFB to Tegucigalpa by C-130.

(3) On 29 August 1962 one H-13 will be airtransported from Howard AFB to Tegucigalpa by C-130.

(4) One H-13, IAGS Guatemala, will be flown to Honduras, and will be operational 3 September to 6 September. U-1A based at Toncontin will fly cover from Guatemala to Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

(5) On 5-6 September 1962, one H-13 will be made available by IAGS, Honduras.

b. Control

(1) On D-Day all Army aircraft will be under control of USMCARIB surgeon until completion of air landed phase at which time control of one H-19, one U-1A and two H-13's will revert to J-3. Remaining two H-13's with litter pods attached will stand by vicinity IAGS to be immediately available for medical evacuation.

(2) Requests for reconnaissance missions will be communicated to J-2 by radio or messenger. Requests for evacuation missions will be communicated to J-4. All other requests will be directed to J-3.

4. LOCATION

All Army aircraft will be based vicinity IACS ramp Toncontin Airport.

3. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION

a. A dispensary type aid station will be operational at base camp effective 6 Aug 62.

b. Aid Station will be staffed by one (1) U.S. Army Medical Officer, and three (3) U.S. senior aid men.

c. In cases of serious injury or illness in which the patient can be moved, evacuation by air will be made to Gorgas Hospital, CZ.

d. In cases of serious injury or illness in which the condition of the patient prohibits evacuation, hospitalization will be at San Felipe Hospital, Honduras Medical Center or in the Surgical Medical Center in Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

e. Medical Officer Observers and assistance will be available from the Honduras Medical Corps.

4. PERSONNEL

a. Strengths: Assigned strength for operation of Base Camp Toncontin, Honduras is 9 US Army officers, 1 US Warrant Officer, 2 Honduras Army officers, 127 US enlisted personnel, 9 Honduras enlisted personnel.

b. Replacements: N/A

c. Morning Reports: A morning report (DA Form 1) will be prepared daily for US personnel in Base Camp. Such reports will be forwarded to the Headquarters Commandant, Operation FRATERNIDAD, Fort Amador, Canal Zone, via returning aircraft scheduled for Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. An information copy of each report will be forwarded by the Headquarters Commandant to the G-1 Section, Headquarters USARCARIB, Fort Amador, Canal Zone, Attention: J-1 Operation FRATERNIDAD.

d. Nonbattle Casualty Reporting (Actual Casualties)

(1) General. The requirement for prompt, complete and accurate casualty information can be met by following the procedures outlined in this annex and AR 600-67. Commanders must stress the responsibility of each individual to report essential information promptly and accurately. Unless such information is reported promptly, it may become distorted or lost entirely.

(2) Responsibilities

(a) Commanders of separate subordinate units on TDY within the Base Camp will report directly to the Base Camp Commander, submitting an information copy to COMUSMILGP Honduras, any case of nonbattle dead, missing, seriously ill or injured personnel assigned or attached to their organization. They will also provide such additional information and personnel data as may be required by the Base Camp Commander in preparation of the casualty report referred to below. Casualties among Honduran Forces at the Base Camp will be reported to the appropriate Honduran Army Hq with information copies to the Base Camp Commander, COMUSMILGP Honduras, and AG USARCARIB.

(b) The Base Camp Commander will submit a casualty report as required by AR 600-67, to Headquarters USARCARIB for US Military personnel. During duty hours (0715-1600 R, Monday-Friday) casualty reports will be submitted to Personnel Administration Branch, MPD AG Section, Headquarters USARCARIB, tel. 82-2292. During non-duty hours (1600-0715, Monday-Friday) and on holidays and week-ends casualty reports will be submitted to the Staff Duty Officer, Headquarters USARCARIB, tel. 82-2100.

(c) In cases of non-battle US dead or missing, the Adjutant General, USARCARIB, upon receipt of a casualty report from the Base Camp Commander will notify the commanding officer of the individual's parent unit in the Canal Zone. The commanding officer of the individual's parent unit in the Canal Zone will prepare, sign and forward to Headquarters USARCARIB (Attention: AGMPA), a letter of sympathy to the next of kin or emergency addressee for review for clarity, comprehension and accuracy, within 24 hours after the initial notification from Headquarters USARCARIB.

(d) Commanders of medical units at the Base Camp will inform the appropriate unit commander and the Base Camp Commander whenever death or serious illness of an individual occurs while hospitalized.

(e) AG Section, Headquarters USARCARIB, will inform the Headquarters Commandant, Operation FRATERNIDAD, Fort Amador, Canal Zone, of all casualty reports received from the Base Camp Commander.

(3) Reports: Initial US casualty reports from the Base Camp Commander will include information as required in Appendix I, II, or III AR 600-67, as appropriate. However, initial reports will not be delayed when complete information is not immediately available. When an incomplete report is submitted, the missing information will be procured as soon as possible and furnished to Headquarters USARCARIB. Honduran casualty reports will contain as much of the information required by AR 600-67, as is available.

(4) Release of Names of Non-battle casualties. The names of US non-battle casualties will not be released to the public or press. The Adjutant General, Department of Army, alone has this authority, except that in cases where military personnel are involved in accidents outside military jurisdiction, where names of persons involved are already available to the public or press, names of fatalities may be verified immediately when queried by the local public press. Release of Honduran casualties will be as prescribed by the appropriate Honduran Hq.

e. Locator Service

(1) Locator service has been established for Base Camp personnel. Primary means of communications between Base Camp and the Canal Zone will be by Radio Teletype. The AG, USARCARIB, is the releasing agency for all message traffic from the Canal Zone to the Base Camp, Toncontin, Honduras.

(2) Locator service for VIP's and observers during the exercise will be the responsibility of the Visitor's Bureau, Base Camp, Operation FRATERNIDAD (tel. Base Camp operator).

f. Emergency Leave (US Army Personnel)

(1) Requests for emergency leave which are substantiated by reports from the American Red Cross or other recognized agencies, may be approved by Base Camp Commander.

(a) Base Camp Commander in coordination with COMUSMILGP will prepare necessary emergency leave orders for personnel desiring to leave by civilian aircraft from Honduras.

(b) Base Camp Commander will approve necessary travel orders from Honduras to Canal Zone for personnel desiring to leave via MATS. Headquarters USARCARIB will prepare necessary space required orders.

g. Discipline, Law and Order

(1) One US Military Police, working in conjunction with Honduran Military Police Patrol from 1700-0500 daily, will turn over to Base Camp Commander any Base Camp military personnel apprehended.

(2) The Guardia Civil de Honduras will turn over to Base Camp Commander any military Base Camp personnel apprehended.

h. Prisoners of War N/A

i. Morale and Personal Services

Mail

(1) General. All mail received in Canal Zone for Base Camp personnel will be forwarded to the 518th Eng. Co., Fort Kobbe. Mail will be dispatched to Base Camp via military aircraft on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

(2) Dispatch of Mail. Official and personal mail to be dispatched from Base Camp will be placed in mail container provided by Adjutant, Base Camp. Honduras postage is required for personal mail.

(3) Clubs. Officer and N.C.O. Clubs will be established and operated in the Base Camp by the Fort Amador N.C.O. Club. The Honduran Air Force Officers Club at Toncontin will also be available to officers.

(4) Exchange Service. N.C.O. Club, Fort Amador will operate an exchange service. Normal N.C.O. Club prices will prevail during this period.

(5) Motion Picture Service. Movies will be provided by the Base Camp Commander.

(6) Cash Payroll. Base Camp; all organizations and units having officer and enlisted personnel at Honduras on 31 August 1962, and who are normally paid on a cash payroll, must submit individually certified military pay vouchers on these personnel to the Finance and Accounting Office prior to 22 August 1962. These MPV's will be identified by a notation "Operation FRATERNIDAD" in item 11. These vouchers will then be consolidated at Finance, a Class A agent will be appointed by Headquarters USARCARIB, and all personnel will be paid by the appointed agent.

5. CIVIL AFFAIRS

a. It is recommended that personnel be encouraged to use all local public facilities whenever possible.

b. Intramural athletics between Host Government and US Military Forces are encouraged.

6. MISCELLANEOUS

a. Recovery Air Items of Equipment, (See Appendix "3").

b. All supplies and equipment stockpiled in Bldgs 2 and 2A, Ft Kobbe. Air shipped to Base Camp as per prescribed priority. (See Appendix "4") (Schedule of Air Shipments).

c. All requests for unprogrammed supplies and equipment through Base Camp C.O. to USARCARIB G-4, Operations Division, for approval and necessary action.

d. Contracting Officer in Honduras is Commanding Officer, 518th Engineer Company, as appointed by Hq USARCARIB.

e. Payment for supplies, equipment and labor by Class "B" Disbursing Agent, IAGS Project Officer, Honduras.

f. See Annex "F", Signal, for equipment to be issued to El Salvador; Nicaragua; COMUSMILGP, Honduras and to Aggressor forces prior to exercise.

g. See attached overlay, Base Camp Location.

h. Local Security. The Honduran Military Police will provide local security by:

(1) Posting guards at all entrances and exits to Base Camp.

(2) During the hours of darkness provide a roving patrol around the perimeter of the Base Camp.

Appendix 3 (Recovery of Air Items of Equipment) to Annex E (Administrative and Logistical Support Plan) to Exercise Directive, No. 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD

1. GENERAL: This appendix prescribes procedures to be utilized in the recovery of parachutes and other air items of equipment employed in the parachute assault phase, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

2. EXECUTION

a. The Honduras Army will provide security for the Drop Zone to insure that unauthorized personnel do not enter the Drop Zone and remove equipment.

b. Peruvian, Guatemalan and USSTRICOM units will mark equipment with colored strips of cloth for identification purposes as follows:

Peru - Red

Guatemala - White

USSTRICOM - Blue

These markings to be affixed to equipment, parachute harness and reserve parachute, prior to parachute assault phase, in a conspicuous location on equipment, parachute harness and reserve parachute.

c. Each individual will, after landing on Drop Zone, release parachute, place harness and reserve chute on top of main parachute and move without delay to designated assembly area for his unit.

d. After the departure of observers from the area, unit commanders will have details report to Drop Zone, rigger-roll parachutes and place in kit bags. Kit bags will be marked as in para 2b, above. Following the recovery of parachutes, the following action will be taken:

(1) USSTRICOM representative will be provided with two (2) 2 1/2-ton trucks by Base Camp Commander and will load parachutes and heavy drop kits and move to Toncontin Airfield for loading aboard designated aircraft.

(2) Base Camp Commander will provide a detail and transportation for securing parachutes and other air items of equipment of Peru and Guatemala. This equipment will be moved to base camp and stored, by unit, in tents designated by Base Camp Commander and secured until departure of troops on D/ 1.

e. As soon as possible, after the termination of the exercise and the Ceremony on D/ 1, Peruvian and Guatemalan units will have details report to Base Camp Commander, secure equipment and load aboard appropriate aircraft for return trip to permanent station.

3. MISCELLANEOUS:

a. USSTRICOM, Base Camp detail and transportation for recovery of air items of equipment will execute recovery operation as soon as parachute assault phase and heavy drop phase is completed and spectators have departed Drop Zone area.

b. Equipment will be kept segregated, by unit, at all times.

c. Storage area, Base Camp, will be covered, secured and arranged so as to expedite pick-up by Peruvian and Guatemalan units on D/1.

d. Transportation will be provided by Base Camp Commander for moving air items of equipment from base camp storage location to designated aircraft.

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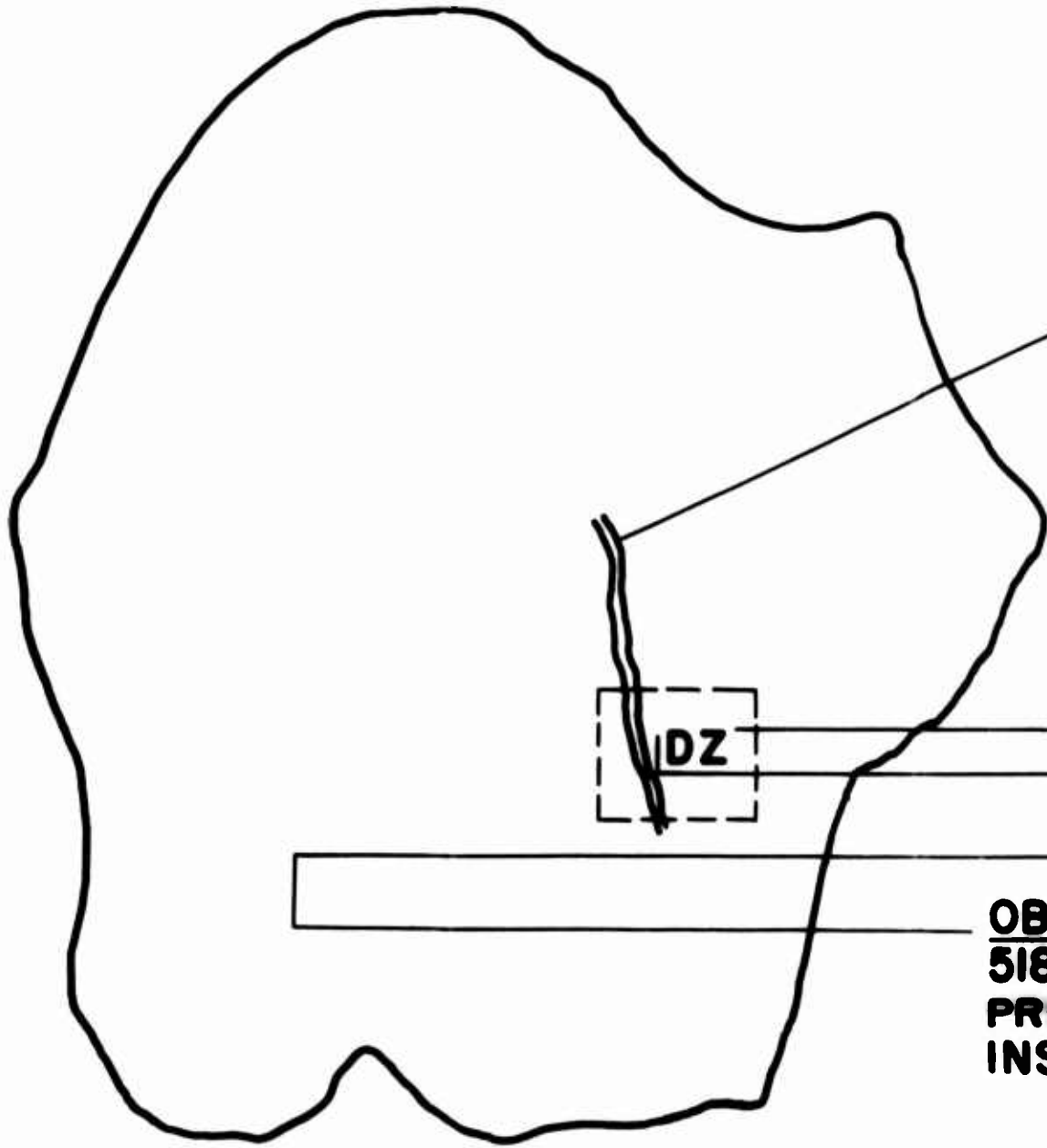

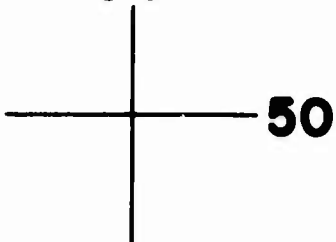

Appendix 7 (Visitors Bureau) to Annex E (Administration and Logistics Support Plan to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

1. The Visitors Bureau, Operation FRATERNIDAD, is organized with the following personnel:

- a. One (1) Lieutenant, Army of Honduras
- b. One (1) Non-commissioned Officer, Army of Honduras
- c. One (1) US Army Captain

The Visitors Bureau will be located at Base Camp, under the supervision of the Headquarter Commandant.

2. The Visitors Bureau is responsible for the following:

- a. Reception of all official visitors; to include meeting at point of arrival and escorting to point of departure.
- b. Billeting of all Official Observers, Official Visitors and Press.
- c. Messing facilities.
- d. Provide local transportation and confirm reservations on commercial airlines as required.
- e. Preparing, assembling, and distributing the official brochure of the exercise.
- f. Preparation and distribution of name tags for Official Visitors, Press, and Base Camp Personnel.
- g. Providing Liaison Officers at hotels, Airport and Observers Area.
- h. Establishing an Official Observer, Visitor and Press Locator Service.

3. Liaison and Escort Officers will be provided as follows:

- a. The Army of Honduras will provide:
 - (1) Nine (9) officers to meet, and act as military assistants to participating countries' delegations. These officers will remain with their assigned delegation throughout their stay in Honduras.
 - (2) One (1) NCO assigned to each hotel where Official Observers

and Visitors Bureau and provide any assistance that may be required.

b. The US Army will provide:

(1) One (1) Spanish speaking officer to act as Liaison at each hotel.

(2) Three (3) officers to meet and escort US visitors to their assigned billets.

4. Categories of visitors: Visitors may be grouped as follows:

(3) A hot meal will be served at Base Camp for Official Observers, Visitors and Press Personnel at the completion of the airlanding phase of the exercise.

d. (1) Official Observers' meals, billeting and transportation expenses will be borne by the host country.

(2) US Personnel will defray their own expenses for meals and quarters.

(3) Press Personnel billeted at Base Camp will be charged for meals consumed at the Field Ration Mess.

6. Transportation

a. All transportation will be procured locally. The Visitors Bureau will coordinate the transportation for Official Observers, Visitors, and Press as follows:

- (1) Sedans for all Official Observers.
- (2) Sedans for senior US Official Visitors.
- (3) Buses (9 passenger) for all other Official Visitors and Press Personnel.

7. Visitors Brochure

a. An official Operation FRATEMID.D brochure will be prepared, assembled and distributed. This brochure will contain the following items:

- (1) Schedule of events for Official Visitors.
- (2) General information for visitors.
- (3) Roster of Official Observers, Visitors and Press Personnel.
- (4) Closing Ceremony.
- (5) Maps of Tezucit'alpa and Honduras.
- (6) Telephone listing.
- (7) Name tag.

8. Name Tags

a. Name tags will be prepared in three colors: blue for Official Observers and Visitors; green for Base Camp; and white for the Press.

b. Names, rank and country will be printed on each name tag.

9. Locator Service

a. A locator service will be established at the Visitors Bureau, Base Camp. As information on visitors becomes available, a card will be prepared and filed on each visitor. This card will have the following information:

- (1) Name and rank

- (2) Country and/or Parent Organization.
- (3) ETA and ETD; Mode of Travel.
- (4) Billets and Transportation.
- (5) Telephone number (if applicable).
- (6) Name of Escort Officer.
- (7) Remark as: Observer, Official Visitor, Press.

(3) Access into the commercial telephone system in Tegucigalpa, Honduras from the Base Camp provided by radio relay (4-channels). Operational effective 3 August (AN/GRC-10).

(4) Safety communications from the Drop Zone (DZ) to the Base Camp will be provided by radio relay (4-channels). Operational D-1 (AN/GRC-10).

(5) DZ internal communication - a SB-22 Telephone Switchboard will have circuits to DZ Safety Officer, Medical Collection Station, VIP Bleacher Location, and Air Force Evacuation Team (located at Toncontin Airfield). In addition a direct telephone circuit will be established between DZ Safety officer and VIP Bleacher location. Operational D-1.

(6) Message traffic will be the primary communication means between CZ and Base Camp. Radio teletypewriter (RTT) circuit from Base Camp to CZ will be established to handle message traffic 3 August.

(7) Public address systems will be established at the LZ Bleacher location and Toncontin Bleacher location.

2. LEGEND: COMMUNICATIONS CAPABILITIES

a. Base Camp can be contacted from CZ via US Army Mission Radio by calling one of the following telephone numbers: 82-5161, 85-2291, or 87-4269.

b. Base Camp may use US Army and US Air Force Mission Radio Stations, as required for back up voice radio communications.

c. An AM Radio Net (AN/GRC-9) will provide alternate communications between the DZ and Base Camp. Operational effective D-1.

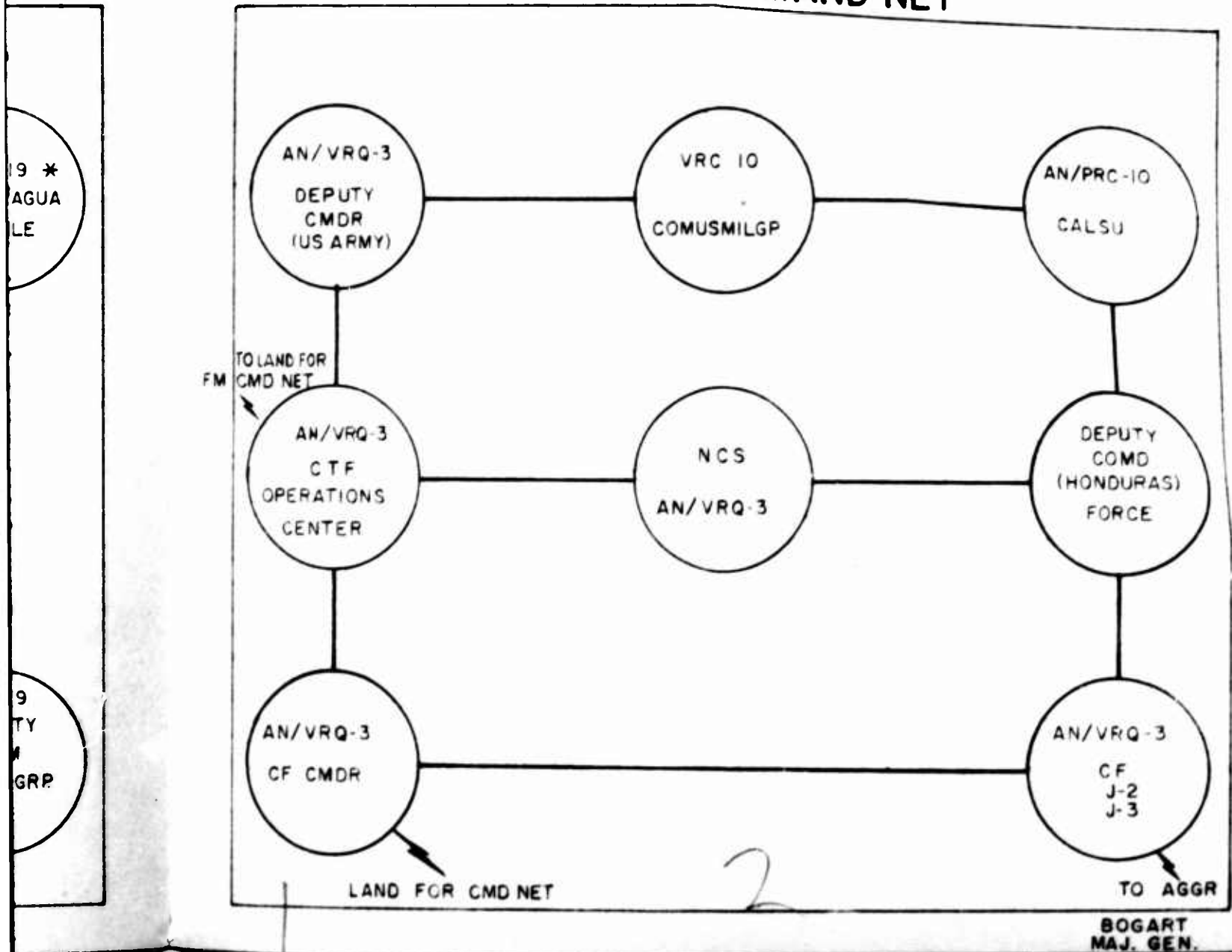
THE TACTICAL COMMUNICATIONS NETS

1. GENERAL. The purpose of this Appendix is to provide guidance and instructions for communications-electronics support of forces participating in Operation FRATERNIDAD.

2. SITUATION.

- a. Enemy: Annex C (Intelligence)
- b. Friendly: Annex A (Task Organization)

3. ASSUMPTION. Navigational aids presently in operation and listed in Flight Information publications will be adequate for movement of supporting forces except at Rio Hato, Republic of Panama. Navigational aids existing in the exercise area provide the necessary coverage for Operation FRATERNIDAD.

4. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS.

a. All communications used in support of this mission will be of a tactical type whenever possible and in keeping with necessary safety and budget limitations.

b. Tactical communications will remain installed and operating until released by the Combined Task Force Commander.

c. All time designations will be in Greenwich Mean Time (Zulu Time).

5. COMMUNICATION ELEMENT (C-E) MISSION. To provide necessary communications support for all operations as outlined in Appendix 3 to this annex.

6. C-E TASKS.

a. USAPC/FID will provide resources of the USAF to support this plan.

b. CAICG will obtain low frequency beacon to be positioned at Rio Hato for expediting recovery of aircraft return to Howard AFB.

c. Panama ATC Center and Honduras ATC Center will provide normal airway communications facilities and navigational aids.

d. Det. 3, First Air Commando Group will provide one (1) each air transportable radio set for use by the BZ Commander.

e. 1978th Communications Squadron (. FCS).

(1) Provide two each HF SSB radio sets transportable for communications from CTF Honduras to Albrook.

(2) Provide Ground/Air communications at Albrook AFB, CZ.

(3) Provide C-E operating personnel for Honduras terminal of Honduras-Albrook SSB voice circuit.

(4) Provide communications center service at Albrook and Howard AFB, CZ.

7. SPECIAL MEASURES.

a. Call Sign: AH-5AE

b. Frequencies: Tab A

c. Routing Instructions.

(1) All traffic originated outside the CTF Headquarters will not be passed over the HF SSB circuit to Albrook AFB, CZ.

d. Message preparation and handling.

(1) The words "Operation FRATERNIDAD" will be included at the beginning and ending of all exercise messages.

(2) Greenwich Mean Time (Zulu) will be used for message date/time groups.

8. C-E LOGISTICS.

a. All C-E units deployed during this exercise will be provided with normal operating spares.

b. A custody receipt will be made out to the responsible individual for such property as may be utilized in order to maintain control of equipment.

9. ADMINISTRATION.

a. Accurate detailed logs will be maintained on C-E facilities to provide data for evaluating the C-E support of this exercise.

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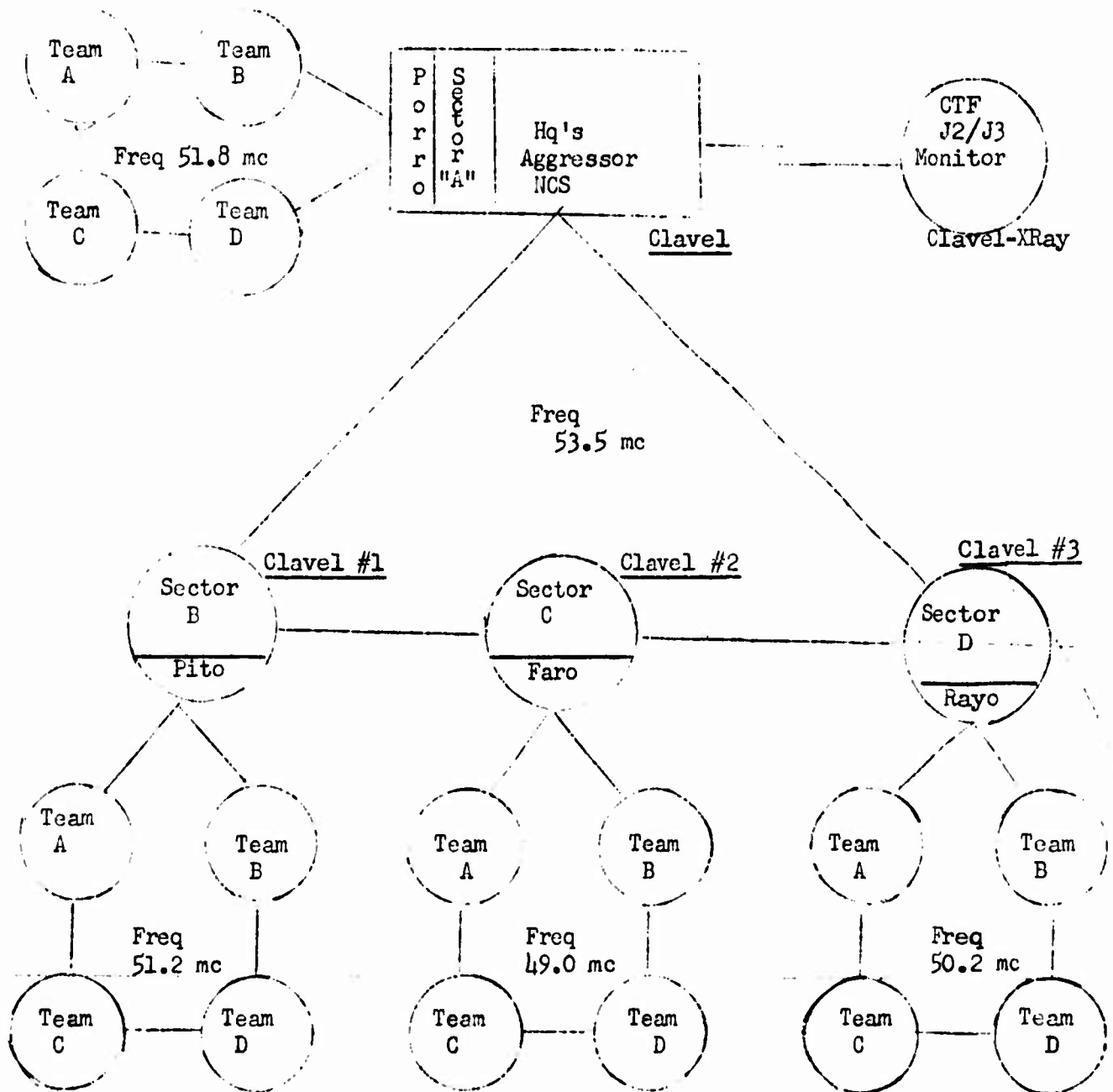

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OPERATION FRATERNIDAD
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Annex G (Liaison and Control Plan) to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

1. GENERAL:

- a. OPERATION FRATERNIDAD is a tactical exercise organized and conducted as a controlled maneuver. Control will be achieved by use of bi-lingual Liaison officers with each participating unit.
- b. No umpires or unit controllers will be utilized.
- c. CTF staff members and Liaison officers will familiarize themselves with the Exercise Plan and the Exercise Scenario in order to insure strict adherence thereof.

2. LIAISON PLAN:

- a. Exercise Control will be accomplished by use of US bi-lingual Liaison officers assigned to each participating country.
- b. Liaison officers will be moved to the exercise area on D-1 and will join units in the initial unit assembly areas on D-Day.
- c. Liaison officers will have the authority to stop all action in their respective areas in the event a situation arises which could result in physical contact between Aggressor and CTF forces or a situation endangering lives or property.
- d. Latin American unit liaison to the CTF will be through staff representation from each participating country on the Combined Staff.
- e. Liaison officers, in addition to other duties, will act as interpreters for the transmission of plans and orders, but will not assume any position of command nor render decisions of a tactical nature.

3. AGGRESSOR CONTROL PLAN:

- a. Control of Aggressor forces will be exercised through the means of an aggressor scenario and an Aggressor radio control net.
- b. Centralized control of Aggressor operations will be from J-2 at CTF Headquarters to an Aggressor base of operations (CP).
- c. The exercise area will be divided into sub-sectors for Aggressor operations. Each sub-sector will have an appointed sector commander who will control Aggressor operations within his sector and will report to the Aggressor base of operations (CP).

d. Aggressor action will be indicated by the firing of a white-star parachute flare by Aggressor forces. No blank ammunition, or other type munitions, will be used.

e. Direct contact between Aggressor forces and elements of the CTF will be avoided. Aggressor personnel will be instructed to surrender willingly in situations involving direct contact with CTF forces.

f. Annex F (Communications) to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

4. GROUND LINK-UP CONTROL PLAN:

a. Control of the overland movement of the Nicaraguan Military Forces (ground link-up unit) will be accomplished by use of Phase Lines and a Holding Area. (Appendix 1 to Annex B, Scenario Overlay).

b. Ground Link-up unit will report upon reaching all Phase Lines and arrival into Holding Area.

c. Ground Link-up unit will not advance north of Phase Line Red until physical contact is made with CTF forces.

d. Movement of Ground Link-up unit through CTF positions will be controlled by Liaison officers and designated guides from units through whom passage is to be made.

e. Once passage of lines has been completed, the Liaison officer will guide the Ground Link-up unit to its assigned assembly area.

5. EMERGENCY ACTION CONTROL:

a. Liaison officers and unit commanders will exert all efforts to prevent a situation from developing that could result in endangering the lives and welfare of personnel or damage to real property.

b. Direct contact between CTF forces and Aggressor forces will be avoided.

c. Should a situation develop, which in the best judgement of Liaison officers and unit commanders would endanger personnel or equipment, the emergency action signal will be given.

d. The Emergency Action signal to STOP ALL ACTION will be the firing of a Red-Star Cluster.

e. On this signal, all action in the immediate vicinity will cease and all personnel will assume the standing position until such time as the Liaison officer or unit commander has give the "ALL CLEAR" to continue the problem.

f. In the event of an actual casualty, the location will be marked with a Yellow-Smoke Grenade indicating the point for helicopter evacuation.

6. CONTROL OF CIVILIANS:

a. Control of civilian personnel in and around the Drop Zone area will be exercised by Honduran Military Police assisted by the Guardia Civil.

b. No civilian personnel other than official observers and press, will be permitted to enter the Base Camp area or the Combined Task Force Headquarters area.

c. No civilian personnel will be permitted to enter the Drop Zone area during the course of the problem on D-Day.

d. Movement of civilians will not be restricted except when their movement might interfere with the tactical play of the problem.

e. There will be no military personnel dressed in civilian clothing involved in the problem.

f. All civilian establishments will be considered "Off Limits" to all participating troops.

g. Established road blocks will be for control of aggressor movement only and no civilians will be detained.

h. Roads and trails will not be barricaded; material simulating the roadblock will be placed on shoulder of roads and trails.

i. Incidents involving participating troops and civilian personnel will be reported to CTF Headquarters, attention J-1, immediately.

7. REPORTING:

a. Unit commanders will report to CTF Headquarters:

- (1) When unit is completely assembled.
- (2) Upon closing into initial assemble area.
- (3) Upon closing into final assembly area.
- (4) Crossing of phase lines.
- (5) Seizure of objectives.
- (6) CP locations.
- (7) Contact with Aggressor.
- (8) Capture of prisoners.
- (9) Loss of personnel or equipment.
- (10) Location and nature of actual casualties.
- (11) Departure and arrival of patrols.

b. Aggressor Commander will report:

- (1) Arrival of Aggressor forces in pre-designated positions.
- (2) Contact with CTF forces.
- (3) Any deviations from Aggressor exercise scenario, with reasons.
- (4) Number of personnel captured.
- (5) Location and nature of actual casualties.
- (6) Loss of personnel and equipment.

8. EXERCISE TERMINATION:

a. All units will be notified by radio message when the exercise has terminated.

b. Upon receipt of notification, all units will fire a Green-Star Cluster to notify all troops of exercise termination.

c. After notification that exercise has terminated, at or about 0530 on D+1, participating units will proceed to Toncontin Airport for final ceremonies which will be conducted at approximately 0830, D+1. (Annex I (Official Ceremony)).

1. GENERAL: On termination of the ground maneuver phase of Operation FRATERNIDAD, an informal, official ceremony will be held on TONCONTIN Airfield near TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras.
2. PURPOSE: The purpose of this ceremony is to afford an opportunity for the President of the Republic of Honduras to review and address the assembled troops who participated in the exercise.
3. LOCATION AND TIME OF CEREMONY: The ceremony will be held, with troops in formation, on the airstrip at TONCONTIN Airfield at 0830 hours (local Honduras time) on D+1 (6 September 1962).
4. UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT: All troops in formation will be dressed in field uniform with individual weapons. Crew served weapons and other equipment will be placed in rear of each unit formation. Individual weapons will be carried at order arms with slings tightened. Steel helmets will be worn with chin straps fastened.

7. COLORS AND COLOR GUARDS:
 - a. National colors of all participating countries will be placed in formation with a color guard. Each participating country will provide

their own national colors, color bearer, and color guards as follows:

- (2) Colombia: Colors, color bearer, and 1 color guard.
- (3) El Salvador: Colors, color bearer, and 1 color guard.
- (4) Guatemala: Colors, color bearer, and 1 color guard.

- (6) Peru: Colors, color bearer, and 1 color guard.

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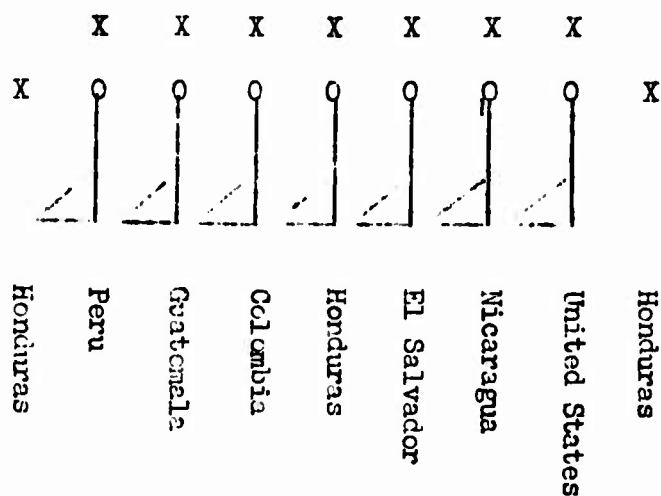

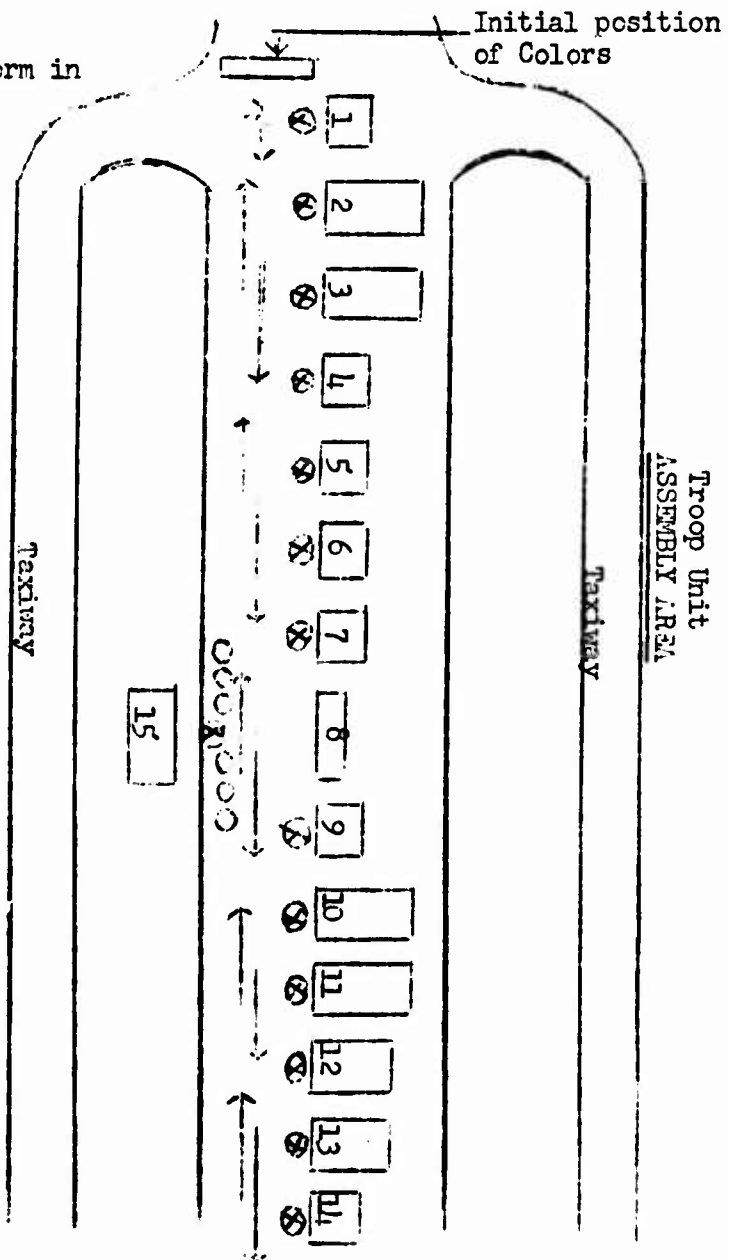

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Appendix 3 (Assembly Plan) to Annex I (Official Ceremony) to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

1. GENERAL. Units will assemble on TONCONTIN Airfield following termination of the exercise on D+1 (6 September).
2. TIME OF ASSEMBLY. All units will be assembled in the designated assembly area by 0600 hours (local Honduras time) on D+1.
3. ASSEMBLY AREA. Units will assemble on the West side of the taxiway at TONCONTIN Airfield, adjacent to positions to be taken for the ceremony. Appendix 2 (Troop Formation) to this Annex.
4. TRANSPORTATION. Annex E (Administrative and Logistical Support Plan) to Exercise Directive Nr 1.
5. SAFETY. For safety purposes, no troops will be assembled on taxiways or runway.

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Appendix 4 (Sequence of Events) to Annex I (Official Ceremony) to Exercise Directive Nr 1, Operation FRATERNIDAD.

1. GENERAL. During the conduct of the official ceremony at TONCONTIN Airfield on D+1 (6 September 1962) the following will be the sequence of events:

- a. All troops assume position in formation on the airfield.
- b. Commander of troops and staff take position on the airfield.
- c. Colors advance to position six (6) paces in front of and centered on commander of troops.
- d. Commander of troops directs "PRESENT ARMS".
- e. Unit commanders order troops to "PRESENT ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.
- f. Commander of troops faces colors and orders staff "PRESENT ARMS".
- g. Commander of troops orders staff "ORDER ARMS".
- h. Commander of troops faces troops and directs "ORDER ARMS".
- i. Unit commanders order troops to "ORDER ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.
- j. Colors execute right turn and move to position on line of troops.
- k. Commander of troops directs "PARADE REST".
- l. Unit commanders order troops to "PARADE REST".
- m. Reviewing party takes position on review stand.
- n. Commander of troops directs "ATTENTION" and "PRESENT ARMS".
- o. Unit commanders order troops to "ATTENTION" and "PRESENT ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.
- p. Commander of troops faces review stand and orders staff "PRESENT ARMS".
- q. Band plays honors to the President of the Republic of Honduras.
- r. Commander of troops orders staff "ORDER ARMS".
- s. Commander of troops directs "ORDER ARMS" and "PARADE REST".
- t. Unit commanders order troops to "ORDER ARMS" and "PARADE REST" starting with units to right and left of colors.
- u. Commander of troops directs band to "SOUND OFF".
- v. Honduras Army Band plays and marches "SOUND OFF".
- w. Commander of troops directs "ATTENTION".
- x. Unit Commanders order troops to "ATTENTION" starting with units to right and left of colors.
- y. Commander of troops faces review stand.
- z. Review vehicles (2- $\frac{1}{2}$ ton jeeps) move to position in front of review stand.

aa. Reviewing party board vehicles; the President of the Republic of Honduras and Lt. Gen. O'Neara in the first vehicle and Maj Gen Logart and Colonel Lopez in the second vehicle.

bb. Vehicles move to position in front of the Commander of troops and halt--the Commander of troops salutes, and boards the first vehicle (front).

cc. Reviewing party inspects line of troops from right to left moving between line of commanders and staff, around rear of units, returns to position of Commander of troops.

dd. Commander of troops dismounts, salutes, and assumes his position in front of staff.

ee. Review vehicles return to review stand, reviewing party dismounts and take position on review stand.

ff. Commander of troops directs "PARADE REST".

gg. Unit commanders order troops to "PARADE REST" starting with units to right and left of colors.

hh. Commander of troops faces review stand and orders staff "PARADE REST".

ii. The President of the Republic of Honduras addresses assembled troops.

jj. Following the address, the commander of troops orders his staff to "ATTENTION" and "PRESENT ARMS".

kk. Unit commanders order troops to "ATTENTION" and "PRESENT ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.

ll. Commander of troops faces review stand and orders staff "PRESENT ARMS".

mm. The Honduras Army Band plays one stanza of the National Anthem of each participating country, in order--Honduras, Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Peru, United States and Honduras.

nn. The commander of troops orders his staff to "ORDER ARMS" following the last note of the music. He then faces the troops and directs "ORDER ARMS".

oo. Unit commanders order troops to "ORDER ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.

pp. Commander of troops faces review stand--pauses a moment--faces troops and directs "PRESENT ARMS".

qq. Unit commanders order troops to "PRESENT ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.

rr. Commander of troops faces review stand and orders staff "PRESENT ARMS".

ss. Honduras Army Band plays departing honors to the President of the Republic of Honduras.

tt. Commander of troops orders staff "ORDER ARMS"--faces the troops and directs "ORDER ARMS".

uu. Unit commanders order troops to "ORDER ARMS" starting with units to right and left of colors.

vv. Commander of troops faces review stand.

ww. Reviewing party departs review stand.

xx. Commander of troops faces troops and directs "UNIT COMMANDERS TAKE COMMAND OF YOUR UNITS". Commander of troops and staff depart from review area.

yy. Unit commanders order troops "AT EASE".

zz. Honduras Army Band marches to Base Camp area playing marching music.

aaa. Units marched from field with guides to field kitchen areas.
